



The year in which a student will graduate is their 'peer year'.



Study Tips for Students and Parents

My son, a BGS Old Boy studying in Melbourne, recently sent me an article by Dr Jared Cooney Horvath from the University of Melbourne. The article provides excellent advice for students to improve study and for parents to support their children; I encourage boys and parents to read it here.

A key takeaway was the premise that studying smarter was more beneficial than studying harder.

For students, he suggests that the boys:

- Stop reviewing start recalling
- Mimic the exam environment
- Space it out
- Sleep, sleep, sleep

For parents, he suggests that you:

- Involve yourself ... but not too much
- Help construct a schedule
- Embrace error
- Model perspective

Director of Boarding

In this season of student leadership announcements, I would like to share the analogy of Roman society with the Boarding community. As we embark on the process of handing over responsibility in Harlin House, I am reminded of the systems or processes used by soldiers in the legions.

I'm from an area of west Wales that still bears a strong imprint of Roman life, some 1600 years after they are thought to have departed the country. A small outpost of the empire was a fort in the nearby village of Coelbren, set among the upper moorlands of the Brecon Beacons. Colebren, or Colfein as it was named in Roman times, was located on Sarn Helen, an ancient roadway that the Romans paved and modernised during their occupancy of large tracts of western Europe, and incredibly several stretches of the stone surface remain intact to this day.

The manner and intent in which the legions marched between the various forts and communities along Sarn Helen is a wonderful signpost to our residential community of what it means not only to be a leader, but also to take the lead. The strength of the Roman legions lay in how the individuals worked together for a common goal, how they marched as one, and supported each other in covering significant distances on foot. They are reputed to have covered 30kms or more each day while following the standard-bearer's lead.

In Harlin House, the lead is provided by all the boarders in Year 12. The 'senior cohort' have the responsibility to set the tone, to be leaders (or bigger brothers) to the junior boys and to uphold the values and virtues at the core of the residential experience. The strength of any boarding community is rooted in the actions of all the senior boys, and they are expected to lead by example.

That said, as in any legion, we also need standard-bearers who will be ambassadors for the boarders, whose commitment to boarding is clear and visible to all, and who give selflessly of themselves for the betterment of the community.

I am therefore delighted to announce that our Harlin House Prefects for 2020 will be Stephen Baronio, Aiden Frick, Mitchell Holt, Val Jara Melagrani, Alex MacGibbon, JT Manuofetoa and Cadmus Wang. We congratulate each and wish them all well in the sure confidence that they will be excellent standard-bearers for the coming year.

Of these seven young men we especially congratulate Alex MacGibbon on his appointment as both the Harlin House Captain and Vice-Captain of School, and to Stephen Baronio who will be the Vice-Captain of Harlin House and a School Prefect.

To all these young men I remind them of John C Maxwell's quote, which most succinctly sums up my vision for leadership in boarding: "A leader is one who knows the way, goes the way, and shows the way."

He was calm when it got hard and kept the group focused. His peers recognised his motivation and leadership during the campsite set up when everyone was tired.

Brian Wakista showed great perseverance on the high ropes course. He was willing to challenge himself and made an effort to lead others through the course. Alex Kennedy was a standout leader. He was confident in the outdoors and chose the appropriate leadership style for the situation, making sure his group members were involved and supported.

Alex Forbes demonstrated a mature approach to challenges. He showed care and consideration for others, especially when bushwalking on the mountain. Eshaan Raj put in a great effort on the high ropes course. During the expedition, he was a motivator, and his sense of humour maintained a positive and light-hearted atmosphere. Seig Mackellar was a reliable and mature student who added value to his expedition group.

Tom Gehrmann's reflected on his appreciation for the program and the relationships he formed, writing the following:

"Trotting past the Moogerah gate in Year 5, I gulped at the looming mountains and wobbly high ropes course. Outdoor Education has since fostered a sense of challenge while allowing me to connect with the environment. As a Year 10 student, I reflect on what the program symbolises for me. I have completed every adventure, challenge and activity that Moogerah has to offer. An offer of devotion, an offer of challenge, an offer of education. Perhaps most significantly, one Moogerah saying remains my biggest motivation - it's the effort put in that counts."

Drug and Alcohol Education

This week, the School welcomed Mr Paul Dillon to speak to boys in Years 10, 11 and 12 about drugs and alcohol. His talks were very engaging and well received by the boys. In the weeks ahead, boys will have the opportunity to continue discussions on the topics during their Student Wellbeing lessons.

Mr Dillon's presentations focus on harm minimisation and dispel some common myths about drug use and alcohol consumption. Topics covered in each year level's presentation are available **here**.

This information is helpful when starting or continuing the conversation with your son/s. Deciding when and how to talk to your sons about alcohol and drug use can be a big decision. Working these conversations into everyday interactions can help it feel more natural.

For parents who were unable to attend the information evening, you can access Mr Dillon's presentation and information on alcohol and the teenage brain via MyGrammar > Wellbeing > Wellbeing Curriculum > Drugs and Alcohol Education with Paul Dillon.

Based on current research, Mr Dillon's provides practical tips for parents to keep their teens safe around alcohol and other drugs, including his three golden rules:

- know where your child is
- know who they're with
- know when they'll be home



SchoolTV - Special Report: E-Cigarettes and Vaping

E-cigarettes and vaping are quickly gaining popularity, especially among teenagers. Manufacturers of these products are deploying sophisticated marketing campaigns to glamourise and promote smoking to young people.

Vaping is the act of inhaling and exhaling the vapour produced by the heated nicotine liquid of an e-cigarette or vape pen. Many teens believe that vaping is less harmful than smoking, as it is often formulated with flavourings to appeal to younger users. Be aware that e-cigarettes stating 0 mg of nicotine may still contain nicotine. It is a highly addictive substance that can slow the brain development in young people, affecting their memory, concentration, learning and mood. Because vaping is new, short and long-term health effects remain unknown.

Studies have shown that teenagers who have tried vaping are more likely to smoke tobacco products later in life than those who have not tried vaping. As e-cigarettes leave little odour, they are particularly easy to conceal and use discreetly in public places.

This **Special Report** provides the facts relating to e-cigarettes and vaping, including the potential dangers and current legislation.

Native Beehive

Last Wednesday, apiarist Dr Toby Smith from Bee Aware Kids gave a presentation about native bees to staff and students. His presentation was very informative and entertaining.

The tragic life and often gruesome death of princesses that pose threats to the queen was one of many intriguing facts about Australia's native bee population. There are almost 2000 native bees in Australia, with the smallest of them only 1.8mm in size. Dr Smith's images of bees with their rainbow colours, metallic green or even polka dots were breathtaking.

After the presentation, Dr Smith split the School's native beehive which was purchased by Greening Grammar last year. According to Dr Smith, our hive is very healthy, in a great position and it was ready to be split.

Native stingless bees produce sugarbag honey and rely on the limited amounts produced to survive during the winter months.

I hope Dr Smith's talk inspired students and staff to acquire a native beehive for their garden.


Striving for academic excellence by pursuing one's personal best is integral to academic progress. I encourage all students to work diligently over the next few weeks through the upcoming assessment period.




