Although **Stephanie Da Cruz** comes from an international, multilingual family, she didn't speak any French before starting at FASRI at the age of three. But she soon settled into school life and, over the course of eleven years, she formed lasting friendships - distinguishing herself as a visual artist and writer.

"FASRI gave me an opportunity to experience and feel connected to a different part of the world through my bilingual upbringing." she says.

In middle school, her class wrote and directed their own play for the end of the year show with French teacher, Mr. Mugnier and the experience is still one of her fondest memories. "We wrote a comedic play about cruise-goers falling overboard and landing on a deserted island," she says. "We had a lot of fun writing the play together in class and laughing at our own jokes. Performing that play was an amazing experience for me."

She believes her international education has given her an ability to communicate well with others through language and teamwork, an awareness of her impact on her community, and a strong understanding of herself. "FASRI has given me both an appreciation for language, and also the ability to secure opportunities based on that knowledge," she says.

Since graduating from FASRI in 2015, Stephanie has had a succession of opportunities come her way. "I completed AP Spanish, rounding off seven years of studying Spanish at FASRI and PCD. I was ahead in my math studies from FASRI, allowing me to reach AP-level math in high school. I also had an incredibly solid base for writing and presenting to my teachers, along with a strong work ethic which made my assignments better coming in," she says. She also grew considerably through her participation in sports, co-founding the PCD volleyball team and working as a swim instructor at the JCC.

Thanks to her exemplary academic record, Stephanie was inducted into the PCD Cum Laude society. She also distinguished herself in the arts throughout high school, taking second place in David Cicilline's 2017 Congressional Art Competition, and receiving three Scholastic Art Awards (one silver and two gold keys).

Now a freshman at Brown University, Stephanie continues to look for ways to push herself to expand on what she can do. She is excited to pursue a fruitful creative career and leave a lasting impression on the world in some way. "Ideally, I'd like to work in animation for a large studio, along the lines of Pixar or Disney," she says. "My ideal project would be to create my own story through my own animation studio." She is considering learning another language and seeking ways to make a difference in her local community.

Stephanie still uses her French with her family, with foreign exchange students and to interact with members of her international language program at Brown. "I am in touch with other FASRI alumni from both elementary and middle school," she says, "It is always a pleasure to see them and how they've grown alongside me."




