

Strong foundations for success

Our Infant & Junior pupils enjoyed considerable success, reaping the rewards of our unique Learning Challenge curriculum, small classes and a high staff-to-pupil ratio.

In the Early Years (EYFS), the Government focuses on children achieving a 'good level of development' (GLD).

To achieve a GLD, each child must achieve at least the expected level in Early Learning Goals from the specific areas of Maths and Literacy, as well as from the prime areas of Physical Development, Communication & Language and Personal, Social & Emotional Development.


In 2019, 100% of King's pupils achieved a 'good level of development'.
Furthermore, 36% of pupils exceeded the levels of the Early Learning Goals and started working within the Key Stage 1 expectations, which is exceptional.

In the Key Stage 1 assessments taken by pupils at the end of Year 2, pupils have excelled compared with national norms.

- Reading: 93% of pupils are working at or better than the expected standard
- Maths: 97% of pupils are working at or better than the expected standard
- Writing: 87% of pupils are working at or better than the expected standard
- Spelling/Grammar: 90% of pupils are working at or better than the expected standard

In the Key Stage 2 assessments taken by King's Year 6 pupils, the following overall results were recorded (see graph):

- Reading: 95% of pupils are working at, or above, the expected standard (national average 73%)
- Maths: 97% of pupils are working at, or above, the expected standard (national average 79%)
- Writing: 88% of pupils are working at, or above, the expected standard (national average 78%)
- Spelling/Grammar: 90% of pupils are working at, or above, the expected standard (national average 78%)

Huge surge in GCSE results

King's students were jumping for joy after producing a record set of GCSE results, which saw a huge leap from the previous year.

- 35% of all grades are 9/8 (A*), up 8% on last year
- 61% of grades are at 9–7 (A*–A), up 12% on last year
- 82% of grades are 9-6 (A*-B)

Over a third of pupils got at least nine GCSEs at 9–7 grades (A*/A). Ten students achieved ten 9/8s (A*s) and over 60% of pupils got at least five 9–7 grades (A*/A). 25 students got a full set of 9/8 grades and pictured are an awesome eight students with the very best results.

King's Headmaster Dr Simon Hyde said: "These superb results are due to the hard work of a particularly impressive year group and to King's strong focus on contemporary pedagogy which aims to enable all our young men and women to realise their full potential.

"It is important to recognize that at the same time as achieving these impressive results, these young people are playing a full role in the sporting, musical and creative life of the school and many are representing clubs and their county in sport and contributing to choirs, concerts and orchestras too."



A Level results among best

King's A Level students produced another stunning set of results, which continue to put us amongst the top performing schools in the country.

- 40% of all grades A*/A
- 71% of all grades A*-B
- 25 students achieved three A grades or better
- A third of all students achieved A* in at least one subject

Headmaster Dr Simon Hyde said:
"Results day is always a wonderful
occasion, when we celebrate with
our students, their parents and staff the
culmination of two year's hard work.
Our talented students have achieved a

fantastic set of results, opening doors to their chosen courses and universities, and they too have achieved wonderful sporting, creative and musical successes and now have the skills and resilience to see them through the next stage of their learning journeys."

In the prestigious Extended Project Qualification (EPQ), which is valued by universities, 75% of all grades are A*/A, and 95% at A*-B. Students are going on to study a wide range of courses – from Art and Motorsport Engineering to Medicine and Law – at some of the country's most prestigious institutions including Cambridge, LSE and Imperial. Half of all students will join prestigious Russell Group universities, with others

choosing gap years, apprenticeships or other universities.

Nationally, these are the first results of the new 'tougher' linear A Levels introduced two years ago. As well as achieving excellent exam results, King's has been recognised for its excellent 'value-added' scores. Value-added is the difference between a student's expected outcome and their actual outcome, and demonstrates how much progress the student has made. At A Level, King's is in the top 15% of schools nationally for the quality of our value-added data with a large proportion of our students achieving better than their predictions. Our three year average for value-added results puts us in the top 10% nationally.

School Captains John Daly and Anna Kaczmarczyk have both been fantastic role models at the school. Talented musician and singer John achieved A*AAB and will study Politics at King's College London; while Anna, who is a qualified swimming teacher and has achieved her Gold DofE Award, achieved A*AA will study Psychology at Edinburgh University before hopefully going on to become a clinical psychologist.




