NEW ELEMENTARY BOUNDARIES - FALL 2020

The Parkland Board of School Directors has approved the boundaries and redistricting plan for the District's four southern elementary schools: Jaindl, Fogelsville, Cetronia, and Parkway Manor. The changes will take place this fall when Veterans Memorial Elementary School opens in Upper Macungie and new boundaries for the new school have also been announced.

The new boundaries were created to alleviate crowding at the District's southern elementary schools and generate equity among all nine Parkland elementary schools. During the fall, public presentations were made about proposed boundaries and town hall meetings were used to garner input from residents before boundaries were finalized.

Veterans Memorial will become the ninth elementary school in the District with Cetronia, Parkway Manor, Fogelsville, Jaindl and Veterans Memorial feeding into Springhouse Middle School. No changes were proposed for the northern elementary boundaries and Ironton, Schnecksville, Kernsville and Kratzer will continue to feed into Orefield Middle School.

Families can insert their address into the 2020 School Locator Tool to determine if their address is to be redistricted. The School Locator Tool is at the bottom of the District website home page at www.parklandsd.org.



OMS'S MONICA OULY-UHL NAMED PENNSYLVANIA ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL OF THE YEAR

Monica Ouly-Uhl, Assistant Principal of Parkland's Orefield Middle School, was selected as Pennsylvania's Assistant Principal of the Year. She received the award for the considerable contributions she has made to the profession, most notably for her leadership in establishing an anti-bullying program and a positive school-wide behavioral support program at Orefield Middle School.

Mrs. Ouly-Uhl was nominated by her supervisor, Todd Gombos, Principal of Orefield Middle School. At the beginning of each school year, an anti-bullying theme is launched during a day-long event that includes team building activities and class chats that discuss emotions, feelings and how to stand up

for kindness. Then, to culminate the day, a band of Orefield Middle School teachers and former students perform rock songs around the annual anti-bullying theme. Mrs. Ouly-Uhl organizes the events each year and creates a video that helps support the annual theme as part of the stage show. She infuses clips of famous individuals who speak about how bullying affected them when they were younger. They share how they overcame it and how their experience did not deter them from reaching their dreams. She has also been credited for starting a kindness initiative by working with students to raise funds to perform random acts of kindness. She takes the students to hand out gift cards to people at stores with notes that ask the receiver to "pay it forward" with kindness. She also designed community-minded Parkland Pride shirts for the entire community to wear in order to foster district-wide spirit among staff, students and families.

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

CETRONIA UNVEILS OUTDOOR CLASSROOM

Cetronia celebrated the grand opening of an outdoor classroom in September. The \$41,000 project was funded entirely by the Parents' Association of Cetronia (PAC) and allows teachers and students to learn in a designated outdoor instructional space.

Just like field trips, learning and student achievement can take place outside the four classroom walls. Exposure to natural settings can have an intrinsic effect on students' emotional and cognitive functioning. The Cetronia classroom was designed specifically to encourage the 4 C's of the 21st Century Learning as follows:

- Critical thinking: teaches students to question claims and seek truth.
- Creativity: teaches students to think in a way that's unique to them.
 Collaboration: teaches students that groups can graate compating bigg
- Collaboration: teaches students that groups can create something bigger and better than you can on your own.
- Communication: teaches students how to efficiently convey ideas.

Mr. Charles Klein, the Cetronia Principal from 1974-2003, loved Cetronia and was loved by the community. He was the Principal when current Principal Dr. Jamie Giaquinto attended Cetronia as a child. In Mr. Klein's memory 16 years ago, the Cetronia staff and community created a special paver memorial for him. The memorial is now the center of the outdoor classroom and was polished and restored during construction. His legacy and passion for the Cetronia staff, students and families will be remembered whenever the outdoor classroom is used.

The new learning space for Cetronia students and staff would not be possible without the planning, efforts and financial support of many people. PAC President Maraleen Shields was involved from the beginning, helping to find the architect and communicating with Principal Giaquinto throughout the process. Mrs. Wight, 5th grade teacher, and Mrs. Hardy, art teacher, were also instrumental with formulating the design and ideas for the outdoor space. They spearheaded communication with Cetronia faculty to share and gather ideas. Samantha Ciotti Falcone, owner of SCF Architecture and a 1990 Parkland graduate and former Cetronia student, was also instrumental. She donated her time to meet with the team at Cetronia and ultimately create the architectural renderings necessary for the landscaper. Mr. Dave Keppel, Director of School Services at Parkland, oversaw the quality, safety and permitting for the project. Special thanks to all!

CHINESE AND STATS OFFERED AS NEW CREDIT OPPORTUNITIES

Come fall, Chinese will be offered for students in grades 8-12 as a face-to-face world language course opportunity (pending enrollment numbers and the ability to hire a certified teacher). Two levels will initially be offered. Chinese 1, the entry level course, will be offered at both Parkland Middle Schools and Parkland High School. In this course, students will be introduced to Mandarin Chinese through listening, speaking, reading and writing activities designed for those who are just beginning their studies on this language. Cultural studies will also be covered in an attempt to help students to better understand the language in relation to cultural history, geography and traditions. Chinese 2 will build on the skills and concepts taught in Chinese 1 and will include the study of the Chinese phonetic system, character writing, sentence structure along with an expanded knowledge of Chinese culture. Note: At Parkland High School, students will have the option of taking Chinese 1 and Chinese 2 for dual enrollment through LCCC. Students can earn 3 college credits per course. A tuition fee will apply.

Statistics AP, Statistics, and/or Trigonometry/Statistics will be offered as part of the required 3.0 math credits needed for a Parkland High School diploma. The courses would become available options for students upon successful completion of College Algebra. The courses have been offered in the past, but were not offered as core math credits towards graduation. The reason for the change it to expose more students to Statistics who might not otherwise consider taking the class and to better prepare students for college and career success.

The Pennsylvania Art Education Association (PAEA) recognized Parkland for its outstanding commitment to visual arts education with the endorsement Outstanding Visual Arts Community 2019.

Districts receiving this endorsement demonstrate rigorous and inclusive arts programs at every level by highly qualified and certified arts educators. Students at Parkland celebrate the importance of a well-rounded education with opportunities to engage in arts education courses at all grade levels, K-12. In addition to art classes that begin in Kindergarten, Parkland celebrates the Visual Arts with a K-12 Arts Festival each May at Parkland High School where all art teachers curate a year's worth of the best student art and put it on display for an adjudicated exposition. Additionally, Parkland High School houses its own Trojan Art Gallery, changing the display on a monthly basis during the school year, many times featuring student art. In the Administration Center, a rotating art collection dons the walls in a public setting that is celebrated annually with an artist's reception. At Parkland High School, the District is proud to offer 19 visual arts courses in painting, drawing, photography, computer art, graphics and animation, art history, jewelry and metals, traditional crafts and ceramics. For those who want to pursue art studies after graduation, the Art Department helps students prepare advanced level portfolio-quality work for course credit.

PROCEDURE FOR DISMISSAL DURING INCLEMENT WEATHER

The Administration makes every attempt to dismiss students before inclement weather affects the driving conditions of the roadways. Unfortunately, the weather can change after a decision has been made which makes transporting students home very challenging. When this happens, it is the School District's main responsibility to make sure every student arrives home safely. This often requires taking additional time when driving which may cause delays in the scheduled drop off times of the students.

During these events, we strive to keep the parents informed of any delays along the bus routes. Below are the steps we follow when dismissing students during inclement weather:

- The Transportation Department will monitor the progress of the buses and report any bus delays to the appropriate school.
- The schools' main offices should also monitor the buses through the bus radios located at each school.
- If a delay is greater than 10 minutes for any bus, school administrative assistants will send a School Messenger alert to the parents of the students riding that bus, informing them of the delay.
- The Administration, Transportation Department, and schools will communicate with each other and parents until all students arrive home, with the school taking on the primary responsibility of communicating with parents.

When school dismissal is disrupted by inclement weather, it is a very stressful time. The communication and cooperation of everyone involved is imperative for the safety of the students.

A MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Happy New Year! It is sure to be a big year here in Parkland as we will open a new school, celebrate new achievements and tackle new challenges. Below is a summary of what's happening across the District.

New Veterans Memorial Elementary School/Capital Projects

As reported on the cover of this newsletter, Veterans Memorial Elementary School will open this fall and the new boundary lines have been announced for Cetronia, Fogelsville, Jaindl, Parkway Manor and Veterans Memorial Elementary Schools. To determine if your house will be in a new elementary school sending area come fall, please go to the District website and type in your address in the School Locator Tool for the 2020-2021 school year that is found at the bottom of the home page. Veterans Memorial Elementary School is almost complete, and the last phase will entail road improvements which include the widening of Twin Ponds Road and the installation of a traffic signal at Schantz and Twin Ponds Roads. Veterans Memorial Elementary School is a wonderful building and we are excited to unveil it to the public in the coming months.

Financial Update

Our School Board approved a resolution declaring that the final General Fund Budget for 2020-21 fiscal year will be within the Act 1 Base Index (2.6%) assigned to Parkland School District as set forth by the State, which means Parkland will not be applying for exceptions to exceed the Index to balance its budget. While the short-term trends on the revenue side of the budget are trending positive, we need to remind you we will still have challenges to overcome and concerns we need to continue to address as we move forward. Among our challenges and concerns remains the uncertainty tied to our Commonwealth funding in the areas of Basic Education Funding (BEF) and Special Education Funding and increasing Cyber/Charter School tuition costs. The Pennsylvania Charter School Law is more than 20 years old and has grown increasingly obsolete in terms of its application to the current practices in charter school delivery services, especially cyber charter schools. The funding formula for charter schools must be changed to reflect the actual cost needed to educate students in these alternative environments. Charters must be held accountable for their performance in operations, finance and academics and be evaluated by the same measures as traditional public schools. More scrutiny and review must be applied to cyber charter schools, as their academic performance is significantly lower than brick-and-mortar charter schools and traditional public schools. Parkland's mandated tuition expenses paid to charter and cyber charter schools will be approximately \$5M in 2020-21. We remain committed to providing a comprehensive K-12 program at Parkland, but legislation to reform this obsolete Charter School Law remains elusive. Key dates for the Parkland budget planning process are listed in the box to the left, and the public is invited to contact me with concerns or attend any public meeting to gain greater insight into our budget preparations.

Parkland's debt service structure will allow the District to continue to address capital improvements that will enable the schools to handle anticipated growth and maintain quality educational environments in our schools over the next decade. Our School Board has been prudent in addressing recommended repairs and replacement of equipment so that our buildings stay well maintained and operate efficiently and safely. The School Board has thus decided to borrow \$10M in 2020 to handle needed repairs to roofs and flooring along with purchasing buses, vans and technology on our regular replacement cycle. Through this borrowing, the District will also continue renovating Schnecksville Elementary School, an aging building that needs new mechanical, plumbing, electrical and HVAC systems. The 3-year Schnecksville School plan is to refurbish the entire building, install the necessary new mechanical systems and replace a section of the building that was built in the 1920's. We also plan to rebuild the bus garage that burned down last year.

PA Future Ready Index/Full Day Kindergarten Results

Last year, the Department of Education launched the Future Ready PA Index (www.futurereadypa.org), a public website where families can find information about how schools and students are performing. Rather than focusing exclusively on standardized test scores, the new index emphasizes growth and promotes transparency around school and student group performance. Our data looks very good and Parkland is proud of the growth and achievement our students are demonstrating. In October, Kelly Rosario, Director of Curriculum, Instruction and Professional Development provided an update at a School Board Meeting regarding our current third graders who were the first to attend full day kindergarten in Parkland. The report showed that 88% of students are reading on grade level. Reading on Grade Level is a new On Track metric that is being used to calculate school ratings across the Commonwealth. Mrs. Rosario also reported that the number of students who need reading intervention/learning support services is decreasing, illustrating that more time spent on foundational skills in the primary grades is yielding stronger growth by students.

Character Counts

I am pleased to announce that Parkland was the recipient of a \$16,700 Safe Schools grant which will allow us to train 45 key staff members at Parkland High School this March in the CHARACTER COUNTS! Program. It will help our staff foster six pillars of character: Trustworthiness, Respect, Responsibility, Fairness, Caring and Citizenship. The CHARACTER COUNTS! Program helps instill a positive school climate and a culture of kindness, making schools a safe environment for students to learn.

School Board Update

In November, we celebrated and thanked Bob Bold for giving 20 years of service and Jef Reyburn for 8 years as they retired from the School Board. In December, the Parkland Board of School Directors held its annual organization meeting. Lisa Roth was approved to continue as President and David Hein to continue as Vice President. Board members Carol Facchiano, David Kennedy, and Lisa Roth were re-instated. We welcomed two new board members who were sworn in: Marisa Ziegler and Patrick Foose.

Do you know someone who might be interested in making \$124.28 per day as a full-time bus driver? PSD is looking for daily and substitute (drive when you want to) bus drivers. The full-time daily rate is \$124.28 and the substitute daily rate is \$106.48 after the probation period. A day is considered to be a morning run and an afternoon run. The hours are roughly 6:30-9:00 AM and then from approximately 2:30-4:30 PM. A full-time driver receives benefits consisting of 10 sick days, a personal day, pension, 6 paid holidays, and life insurance. Applications are being accepted until January 10th, 2020 for the free training classes that will start at the end of January. Application packets can be picked up at the transportation office in the Troxell Building at 2219 N. Cedar Crest Blvd., or on the District website of www.parklandsd.org under the "Jobs" tab. Applicants must complete all the necessary clearances and submit them with an employment application to be granted an interview. Come join our outstanding Parkland Transportation Department where we transport over 10,000 students every day to Parkland Schools and Non-Public Schools. PARKLAND TRANSITIONS PAINTING ON DISPLAY IN LCCC LIBRARY

A free-form painting created by students in the Parkland Transitions Program is now on display in the Lehigh Carbon Community College (LCCC) library lobby at the main campus. The Transitions program supports high school students with disabilities who are 18 to 21 years old, and is a partnership between LCCC and Parkland School District. It provides the students from Parkland the opportunity to interact with LCCC teacher education students who act as peer mentors, helping to provide the high school students with a socially engaging learning environment that helps instill self-confidence and independence as they move into adulthood.

As part of the program, the students attend several sessions per week at LCCC's main campus in Schnecksville. Through classroom experiences and real-world assignments, they work on developing the skills they need to be successful in their adult lives, both personally and professionally. ELEVEN PARKLAND HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS NAMED 2020 NATIONAL MERIT SEMIFINALISTS



The National Merit® Scholarship Program is an academic competition that recognizes the 50,000 highest Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®) scores in the nation out of approximately 1.5 million students who take the test each year. Of the 1.5 million entrants, approximately 50,000 with the highest PSAT/NMSQT® Selection Index scores qualify for recognition in the National Merit® Scholarship Program as either Commended Students (about 34,000) or Semifinalists (highest 16,000).

The following 11 Parkland High School students were selected as Semifinalists in the 2020 National Merit Scholarship Program. These scholastically talented seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for 7.600 Merit Scholarship awards worth \$33 million. They are pictured left to right from the top as follows:

VICKY CHEN is the President of the Future Educators of America and is a member of the National Honor Society, the French Honor Society, and the Mock Trial Club. She received the Principal's List Award and was awarded the Best Attorney at the PA Mock Trial Competition. She plans on studying Economics and pursuing a career as an attorney. She hopes to attend Brown University or New York University.

School and community personnel will be at registration to review your child's immunization record and to provide descriptive information about your school as well as answer questions you may have. The following checklist of things to bring should help you prepare for registration:

- Record of your child's birth date (i.e. registration of birth or birth certificate).
- Written immunization records for properly spaced doses of diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, polio, measles, mumps, rubella (German measles), hepatitis B, and the varicella (chicken pox) vaccine or proof that the child had the disease.
- Two (2) forms of verification that the child's legal parent(s)/legal guardian(s) reside(s) in the Parkland School District. These may include:
 - 1) a current real estate property tax bill for the residence
 - 2) a current lease agreement for residence
 - 3) a current utility bill showing the current address

Residents who are new to the School District shall provide the following as proof of residency in lieu of those previously mentioned:

- A copy of a lease or rental contract (must reflect names of all who
- reside there) A building contract for the residence
- A closing agreement or settlement agreement for the residence
- A utility bill for the place of residence

If a registrant is not the owner or lessee of the property, a Multiple Occupancy form must be acquired from the School District, completed and notarized. In the case of a student who is registered by someone other than his/her parent, documentation of guardianship must also be provided.

The Pennsylvania School Health Laws require that every child has a physical and dental examination upon entry to school. Forms for physical and dental examinations will be given at the time of registration.

The Pennsylvania Department of Health School Immunization Law requires that all students entering school for the first time at the kindergarten or first grade level be fully immunized as a condition of school attendance.

To register for kindergarten, a child must be 5 years of age or older, prior to September 1, 2020. There are no exceptions.


