I've noticed a fan favorite out on the playground is four square. I totally understand why! It's fun to play and easy to set up! While there does not seem to be a truly official set of four square rules, here are the rules we use at Palos East.


GAME RULES:

- Everyone must Hit UNDERHAND
- Ball must bounce ONCE and only ONCE in your square before you strike it (including on the serve).
- If someone makes a mistake you rotate up and that person goes to the back of the line (outside the #1 square).
- First person in line is the referee. If there is an argument, both players are out.
- Liners are out.
- You can move anywhere outside the square or in your section of the square
- If it bounces in your square you MUST strike it
- Server must make sure everyone's ready before serving.
- No Carrying, Stalling or Holding you must Strike or Hit the ball.

Just to Clarify: You are out if...

- The ball in your square bounces 2 times or you hit it before it bounces.
- You hit the ball out of bounds.
- You hit the ball on a line.
- You hit the ball overhand.
- You hit a ball that was another player's ball (it bounced in their square and you hit it before it bounced a 2nd time).
- A ball bounces in your square and you are unable to get to it before it bounces a second time.

Rebecca Caudill Book Challenge

Have you ever heard of the Rebecca Caudill Award? The greatest books ever! Rebecca Caudill said, "The first essential in any book is that it have something significant to say, a book that leaves the reader with bigger ideas than when he began reading, that stimulates his thinking, stretches his mind and deepens his feeling's. A good book sticks to your ribs."

Students in grades 4-8 can vote for their favorite Caudill book. Twenty books are nominated and students have to read three of the books in order to vote.

Books that are popular are Restart, Insignificant Events in the Life of a Cactus and All's Faire in Middle School. Another recommendation is a spooky book called Seraphina and the Black Cloak.

If you read 20 Caudill books you can earn coupons to the book fair, an invitation to the end of the year reading party and you can earn medals. Books on the Bluestem list are also accepted. Remember to talk about your book with Mrs. Curran. The contest ends on February 25th so make sure to report your books to Mrs. Curran.

"The Monarch Award created in 2005 by the Illinois School Library Media Association, also known as-ISLMA?" "Yes, correct."


The award is given annually, to a single author and illustrator by a collective vote of kindergarten to 3rd grade students in Illinois. ...cool.

one of each of these types of children's books; picture books, easy readers, and chapter books. Children then vote on their favorites every February. "Awesome!

Do you know why we have Daylight savings time? The idea of Daylight Savings Time also called "Summer Time" in many places is to advance the clock by one hour so that there is more sunlight in the evening and less in the morning. In the winter the clocks are turned back 1 hour so there is more sunlight in the morning.

In the United States there are two days a year when we change the clock. One is in the spring and the other in the fall. In the spring you move the clock one hour forward on the second Sunday in March. In the fall, you move the clock one hour back on the first Sunday in November. Two a.m. is the official time to change your clocks. Most people just change their clocks the night before or the next morning.

Many computerized clocks will automatically make the changes for you. This is also a good time to change the batteries in your smoke detector.

In the United States, everyone observes Daylight Savings Time except for Arizona, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, U.S. Virgin Islands, and American Samoa.

The easiest way to remember Daylight Savings Time is to "spring ahead and fall back."



Holiday Recipes

Chocolate Chip Pumpkin Bread By: Isabelle K.

Ingredients:

- 3 cups of all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 4 large eggs, room temperature
- 2 cups sugar in the raw
- · 2 cups canned pumpkin
- 1 ½ cups canola oil
- 1 ½ cups semisweet chocolate chips



- 1. In a large bowl, combine flour, baking soda, cinnamon, and salt. In another bowl, beat eggs, sugar, pumpkin, and oil. Stir dry ingredients until moist. Fold in chocolate chips.
- 2. Pour into 2 greased 8x4 in. loaf pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 60-70 minutes or until toothpick placed in center comes out clean. Let cool for 10 minutes before removing from pans onto a wire rack.

Rich Man Cookies By: Molly H.

- 1 stick melted margarine
- 1 cup graham cracker crumbs
- 1 package (heaping cup) coconut
- o 6 oz. Package butterscotch chips
- o 6 oz. Package chocolate chips
- 1 cup walnuts chopped fine
- o 1small can Eagle Brand milk



Mix margarine with graham cracker crumbs and press into the bottom of a 9x13 baking pan. Layer the chocolate and butterscotch chips, walnuts and coconut over the graham cracker crumbs. Pour the Eagle Brand milk over the layered ingredients. Bake of 30 minutes in a 350°oven. Let cool for 10 minutes, loosen the sides and cut into squares or finger length cookies.

Chocolate Mint Cake By: Addison W.

- 1 package devil's food cake mix
- 1 package instant chocolate pudding
- 3/4 cups of water
- ❖ ½ cup of oil
- ❖ 3-4 eggs
- 1 cup sour cream
- ♦ 6 oz. Frango mint candy or Fannie Mae mint melt aways.



Mix all ingredients together, then pour into greased 9x13 cake pan. Bake at 350° for 30- 35 minutes You can eat it plain or top it with your favorite frosting. Enjoy
