

OUTREACH OFFERINGS

Christine Bedenbaugh, MAE, LDT, CALT, QI, Director Shelton Outreach/Training



This past year has been a rewarding one for the Outreach Department. House Bill 3 provides funding for public school children with dyslexia in the state of Texas. State funding has allowed several school districts to provide training that leads to certification for dyslexia specialists. Shelton offers three accredited teacher training courses for educators serving students with dyslexia:

- 1) Shelton Academic Language Approach (SALA), directed by Chris Bedenbaugh
- 2) Shelton Academic Reading Approach (SARA), directed by Nancy Coffman
- 3) Sequential English Education (SEE), directed by Joyce Pickering

Each is accredited by the International Multisensory Structured Language Education Council (IMSLEC). The three courses train teachers to become dyslexia specialists at both the Practitioner/Teaching and Therapy Levels. Graduates qualify to sit for the ALTA Competency Exam and, upon passing, can become certified at the Practitioner and Therapy Levels. Certified Academic Language Therapists (CALTs) holding master's degrees may become Licensed Dyslexia Therapists (LDTs) in the state of Texas. The Outreach Department is proud to announce that 85 teachers were trained this year in Texas, 25 in Arkansas, 55 in Alabama and one in Tennessee. Teachers who attend our courses through the Therapy Level can earn all but six credit hours toward a 30-credit hour Master of Arts degree in Multisensory Education through Dallas Baptist University (DBU). Shelton School is being recognized by DBU for its partnership with the College of Education through which the 85 earned master's degrees (see page 31).

This year, we partnered with Quantitative Research Evaluation & Measurement (QREM) to do an impacts study on teachers trained through our MSLE courses. Didi Fahey, President of QREM, stated in Shelton's 2018 Impacts Study, "Of the 218 teachers trained, nearly half were serving in various capacities within their schools. They were engaged with professional development for other teachers in their buildings and districts. As teachers trained by Shelton themselves often train, mentor, or guide other teachers, the reach of Shelton training extends well beyond the number of teachers who actually attended Shelton courses. Because each teacher mentors, directs, or guides an average of 8.3 other teachers and each year instructs an average of 139 students, the full reach of Shelton approaches over one million students per year."

As Director of SALA, I continued to enjoy training teachers in Keller ISD at the Teaching and Therapy Levels. A Therapy Level training was offered this summer, on site, to five teachers from Irving, five teachers from Keller and three teachers from Midlothian, Dallas and Plano ISDs. Three new Teaching Level cohorts were formed that included nine teachers in Lancaster, 13 in Midlothian, and seven in White Settlement ISDs.

This year I particularly enjoyed serving the Alliance for Accreditation and Certification of Dyslexia Specialists as co-chair of its inaugural conference in Charlotte,

Dr. Laure Ames, Director of Shelton's Evaluation Center (see page 8), taught two sections of Diagnosing Learning Different Children: Referral and Testing, a required five-day course for SEE, SARA, and SALA Therapy Level teachers in training, and two sections of the one-day Screening for Dyslexia workshop.

Outreach offers six workshops annually to new Shelton parents, all of which are open to the public free of charge. Teachers may also attend and earn continuing education units (CEUs). Topics include:

- Overview of Learning Differences
- Simulations of Learning Differences
- Social Skills / Organization and Study Skills
- Oral and Written Language: Decoding, Spelling, Comprehension and Composition
- Freedom from Chemical Dependency
- Math, Science and Social Studies

SHELTON OUTREACH IS EVERYWHERE

Services from the office of the Executive Director Emerita include the work of **Dr. Joyce Pickering**, who directs both Multisensory Structured Language Education (MSLE) in Sequential English Education (SEE) and Shelton Montessori Training (SMT) at the Early Childhood, Elementary I and II Levels. She also provides many professional development workshops for schools across the country.

Supervisory staff from this office include **Gulzar Babool** and **John Hodges**. **Pam Brockway** and **Danyle Duke** manage appointments, travel and record-keeping of all of the presentations and training done by this staff. **John Hodges** coordinates the Shelton Scholars program, is co-coordinator, with Dr. Pickering, of the SEE training program and presents the *Overview of Learning Differences* to many schools and districts in the metroplex. John also supervises a *Saturday Scholars* program at Wesley-Rankin Community Center in West Dallas. **Amy Kelton**, head of Shelton's Upper Elementary division, and Joyce Pickering provide training and make presentations in the U.S. and internationally.

MSLE-SEE Training

In June 2019 five individuals attended SEE Teaching Level and four attended the Therapy Level Training that was given on Shelton's campus. In September seven individuals attended the Teaching Level training. Saturday trainings continue for Teaching and Therapy Levels.

Literacy Instruction for Texas (LIFT) uses the new adult literacy version of the SEE multisensory structured language program. The SEE training will continue at Brighton School in Baton Rouge, Louisiana which has become a satellite training site.

Shelton Montessori Training

Gulzar Babool co-directs the Shelton Montessori Training (SMT) courses with Dr. Pickering. This year they have added Montessori Administrator Courses and the Montessori Inclusion Endorsement (MIE) from American Montessori Society (AMS).

Gulzar and Joyce have visited Montessori schools in which Shelton is training teachers, including schools in Dallas ISD, Garland ISD and Fort Worth ISD, as well as many private Montessori schools. Gulzar regularly visits and observes the trainees in the Elementary program. **Cathy Luby** is the Field Supervisor for the Early Childhood trainees. There are 115 trainees presently doing coursework and/or practicum. There are 29 in the Early Childhood course, 58 in the Elementary I course, 18 in Elementary II course, six in Administrator course and four in the AMS Inclusion Endorsement course.

Marija Roberson has joined SMT as the Montessori E-Learning Technology Assistant. She will be producing several online courses and supporting SMT's expanding program.

SMT hosted the Back to School Conference for the Institute of Montessori Education in October at Shelton, with more than 120 attendees. Joyce Pickering was honored as one of several leaders of

Montessori Education.

Several presentations will be made by Shelton staff at the AMS Annual Conference in Dallas in March 2020. Over 100 conference attendees will tour Shelton School for a pre-conference workshop.

Screening Program

Our Speech, Language, Reading, Hearing and Vision screening program is one component that is vital to fulfilling our mission. Early intervention is critical, not only for closing language learning gaps and providing a stable foundation upon which to build future language, but also for avoiding frustration and allowing a child to maintain self-esteem and confidence in his or her ability to communicate. Through the screening process, the Shelton Speech Program provides invaluable assistance to parents and educators by identifying young children with speech, language and reading delays. From individual conferences and professionally written results to recommendations for intervention, our therapists go alongside parents and teachers to support their children in a way that is unique to Shelton. For these reasons, we believe the Shelton Speech Program is the gold standard in the Dallas area for speech, language, and reading screenings.

Screenings begin in August and usually conclude in November. Upon conclusion each year, the Shelton Speech Program has screened approximately 1,200 children.



Therapy Services

The DaVinci School

Plano Preschool

The Speech Program therapists complete approximately 125 therapy sessions each and every week. We provide private speech, language, reading and social communication therapy not only to Shelton students, Early Childhood to high school, but to students in private schools across the metroplex, including Hockaday, Greenhill, Parish Episcopal, Episcopal of Dallas, Lamplighter School, St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic, Meadowbrook and Dallas International School. In addition, many community clients are seen on Shelton's campus. Therapy is provided for receptive and expressive language, articulation, language and auditory processing, phonological awareness and reading difficulties, reading comprehension, and social language. In addition, several of our therapists are trained in the multisensory reading methods that are used so successfully by Shelton School. Therapy is available year-round, Monday through Thursday, 7:30 am to 5:30 pm.

Another important part of our work with students is our Social Communication program to those students with social cognition challenges. Our therapists have received specialized social cognition therapy training, some completing Social Thinking Clinical Training, which requires therapists to apply and participate in a selection process. Using a Social Thinking (Winner, 2000) model of therapy, groups and individuals are not simply taught to memorize social routines, but explicitly taught the thought process behind social interaction. Students practice using one's language skills to seek information; listening that involves not simply taking in auditory information, but integrating information for a deeper concept, when all messages cannot be taken literally; gaining skills for abstract and inferential language; and interpreting others' perspectives, thoughts and feelings across contexts.

Language Adventures

Our intensive therapy program for children ages two through six with receptive and expressive language delays has expanded from five to seven weeks. Each week language enriching activities are planned within a thematic framework, such as camping, sports, farm, space, and community helpers.

No Summer Speech Lapses

Therapy doesn't stop because it's summer. The Shelton Speech Program continues to offer speech and language camps, as well as private therapy.

Therapists, along with Speech Therapy graduate student interns from The University of Texas at Dallas and Texas Women's University, host children of all ages in therapeutic camps that are both impactful and fun.

iSocialize

Also taking place in the summer are our social groups, targeting Social Thinking and related social skills for elementary age children. This therapeutic group teaches the "why" behind social interaction including perspective taking, thinking about others, expected vs. unexpected behaviors, active listening, and language for conversation.

"Shelton's social group with Krista Norwood is the one activity that our daughter does that seems to make a noticeable difference. I see the difference at home when our daughter asks us, "How was your day today? What did you do today? Did you enjoy it?" My daughter has never thought to ask other people about their thoughts and experiences before, so this is a huge improvement. The teachers see the difference at school because she talks more with the other children and actually seeks them out on the playground. We see the difference because our daughter has started talking about friends and was even asked to play at a friend's house."

Professional Education for the Community

The Shelton Speech Program was honored to host Jennifer Simon Triandafilou, M.S., CCC/SLP, from Simon Says Speech in Rockville, Maryland in September. Ms. Triandafilou provided two days of training for area speech pathologists on the topic of Orofacial Myofunctional Disorders: The Simon Says Model, Assessment, Diagnosis and Treatment Strategies. Over 40 speech pathologists were in attendance from the Dallas/Fort Worth area and from other cities including Austin, Houston and El Paso.

SHELTON EVALUATION CENTER

Laure Ames, Ph.D., Director

The Shelton Evaluation Center has had another busy year and our staff has worked with clients from Nigeria, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Washington, Alabama, Hawaii, and all over Texas. When we evaluate a client through either a psychoeducational, psychological, Autism Spectrum Disorder, and/or ADHD evaluation, our goal is to obtain a comprehensive picture of the client's functioning so that we can make appropriate recommendations. If any student is struggling, we should want to know why. Correct diagnoses help guide how to best help the student be as successful as possible. The remediation and/or

accommodations that we recommend are tied to the diagnoses we make.

"It's a huge relief to now know how to help my child moving forward. I feel like for almost three years now I've been exhausting everything I know to do and I have felt so helpless, like I've failed my daughter. Everything makes so much sense now. One of the most common diagnoses that we make at the Evaluation Center is a diagnosis of dysgraphia. Texas state law requires public schools to identify students who have dyslexia and related disorders. The 2018 update of the Dyslexia Handbook: *Procedures Concerning Dyslexia and Related Disorders* lists dysgraphia as a distinct disorder

related to dyslexia. Dysgraphia is defined as a neurodevelopmental disorder manifested by illegible and/or inefficient handwriting. Characteristics of dysgraphia include:

- variably shaped and poorly formed letters
- excessive erasures, poor spacing between letters and words
- awkward pencil grip, heavy pressure
- hand fatigue
- slow writing and copying with legible or illegible handwriting

Dysgraphia impacts a student's ability to copy from the board, write quickly, and write a lot and can impact the ease of written expression. Remediation would be through occupational therapy, and accommodations might include:

- the use of a laptop or word processor during class lectures
- receiving copies of the instructor's lecture notes
- using a tape recorder during class lectures
- using worksheets that require minimal writing
- allowing the student to respond orally when possible
- grading only for content and not for spelling and penmanship
- reducing copying tasks and written work
- allowing the student to dictate essay questions

Dictation software may be utilized for writing tasks. The Evaluation Center uses multiple measures to diagnose this disorder with the goal of

recommending any therapy or accommodations the student needs.



Shelton Spells Success

We've had a tagline around for a long time – At Shelton, we spell success. Have we told you how our students spell success lately? We are filled with pride every day with the many successes achieved by our students. Here are a few recent highlights that stand out:

- Last year's 66 graduating seniors were accepted to 111 colleges and universities. They earned \$5,856,028 in merit scholarships (see pg. 65). **Evan Antich**, our valedictorian, is today attending Darthmouth College and is majoring in English. He was a National Merit Commended Scholar and achieved a perfect score on his ACT composite. **Etan Cohn**, our salutatorian, is attending Carnegie Mellon, majoring in statistics. Etan was a National Merit Scholarship Finalist (see pg. 48) and had a perfect score on ACT English and Science. **Blake Moiles** had a perfect score on the ACT Reading.
- This year, senior **Fiona Dorward** is a Commended Student with National Merit Scholarship Corporation.
- The last week of school before winter break, two students returned to Shelton to visit, which speaks well of the tight Shelton community. **Blake Ghali**, a freshman attending Baylor University, said he is working on a design through apparel management and product development at school. Shelton to Host and Share Portal Space

Shelton has been approved by Shared_Studios to be a Portal site from January through May 2020. Portals are shared spaces set up at various sites around the world. They make possible live, full-body, audiovisual environments that enable face-to-face dialogues between people who would not otherwise meet. Inside, people can converse with someone on the far side of the world as if in the same room. Participants can make eye contact and converse in



real-time, and some have described feeling like they were "breathing the same air."

All of our students will get to participate at some level in this experience. They will be able to engage directly with other students and groups in such countries as Uganda, Bangladesh, The Netherlands or Jordan, to name but a few. Our students will learn something about different cultures from other students around the world, perhaps puncturing stereotypes as they reach beyond their own communities. We'll be teaching others about learning differences and some of our traditions.

We are thrilled to bring this opportunity to our campus, to enhance our curriculum and spark the curiosity and excitement of our students as they engage in experiential learning. Shared_Studios maintains a network of 40 Portals around the world, and Shelton will be one of them for five months. We will schedule several family / parent nights so that others can see what it's all about. We'll also be using our social media platforms to further share the information.

Faculty members **Christy Fowler** and **Courtney Dios** are spearheading the experience at Shelton. We look forward to sharing our students' experiences with you.

Makerspace Expands Creativity

A Makerspace gives children the opportunity to explore and create in three dimensions. It can be as simple as recreating a scene from a novel or building a wooden polygon after drawing one on paper, or it can be more complex, like making a working model of a windmill inspired by research on The Netherlands.

Children enjoy applying concepts they've studied to make creations relevant to their experience. For example, after studying electrical circuits, our students created a "campfire" with LED lights for use during afternoon meetings. The Makerspace creates opportunities for failure and how to take failure in stride. In the Makerspace children are learning to keep order, collaborate, plan and execute, and to express themselves in a way that two-dimensional work doesn't allow. Our Makerspace exposes talent in children who struggle in other areas - maybe a student



Ethics Everyday is this year's theme. Speaker and panel discussions include ethics and religion, education and technology.







Technology for Today and Tomorrow

Shelton continues with business as usual to equip its four entities—School / Evaluation Center / Speech Language Hearing Program / Outreach & Training—with technology, all the while making plans for the future. We continue to enhance technology for all our constituents—students, staff, parents, and the public at large. Here are highlights from each timeframe:

Staff Changes to Help Us Grow





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
