

where inquiry, imagination, & creativity come alive!

In the Fall of 2019, Wyndcroft unveiled the Learning Commons, a new creative learning space that combines the library and the computer lab with an open collaborative environment. The Learning Commons has been a project several years in the making, driven by a task force of Wyndcroft faculty across divisions and disciplines who attended conferences, visited several schools' STEAM labs and reviewed Tech Integration curriculums to create a vision that will drive Wyndcroft forward.

The Learning Commons was made possible by the generous donations of Wyndcroft families, including "Raise the Paddle" at the 2019 Auction. This enabled Wyndcroft to re-construct the existing structure and add new technology including 60 new iPads, new software, green screens, and robotics equipment. Mrs. Stone stated, "I am energized every day by our students and their ideas and I see my role as not only teacher but collaborator. The tools for teaching and learning continue to change and we continually evaluate the best resources needed to lead the way forward. The possibilities are endless."

Lisa Dunn, Assistant Head of School noted, "With the Learning Commons, Wyndcroft students have a flexible, welcoming space with the technology resources and guidance from faculty to experiment, collaborate, and create leaders in new tech-related disciplines."





Foundational to the vision for the Learning Commons is "Tech Integration." Tech Integration is both a class for every student beginning in Pre-K, but also a way of thinking about embracing technology in the classroom that has the purpose of enhancing and transforming the learning experience.

Tech Integration includes a curriculum of key elements such as computer literacy, cyber safety, and touch typing -- all important for lower and middle school students -- but extends into design thinking, programming, engineering, robotics, and cyber security. For example, the 7th grade recently designed and programmed Lego Mindstorm robots to complete a series of challenges including navigating pathways and obstacles.

Tech Integration also includes embracing new tools for teaching and learning, and helping students and teachers use technology to create experiences that were previously impossible without it. For example, first grade worked with Mrs. Rafetto in creating a page for their class story, "The Important Book." In Tech Integration, in collaboration with Mrs. Stone, students typed and recorded their page for others to enjoy. Fourth graders researched holiday traditions across the globe. In Tech Integration, they used a program to create a cartoon telling about the traditions they learned. These cartoons were produced as a QR code and sent to faculty with a link so other Wyndcroft students could learn about these holiday traditions in their classroom.



CELEBRATION OF THE ARTS




Thursday, January 30, 6:30-8:00 PM

The KWPDF supports the ongoing education of Wyndcroft's faculty and staff. Here's a look at some of the ways it was used this year.

Angi Harrison, David Johnson, Kim LaGuardia, Angelina Fickert, Brooke Musser, Lisa Dunn, and Alex Turock attended the International Society for Technology in Education (ISTE) conference. ISTE is home to a passionate community of global educators who believe in the power of technology to transform teaching and learning,

accelerate innovation, and solve tough problems in education.

Alex Turock attended the **Formative Assessment Conference** which provided practical guidance and research-driven strategies to activate all learners, delivered by some of the most notable names in formative assessment.

Lower School Teachers Julie Bell, Angelina Fickert, Melissa Griffaton, and Dana Mullen took the Responsive Classroom Advanced Elementary Course. The Responsive Classroom approach to teaching is comprised of a set of well-designed practices intended to create safe, joyful,



and engaging classroom and school communities. The emphasis is on helping students develop their academic, social, and emotional skills in a learning environment that is developmentally responsive to their strengths and needs.

Sue Rafetto attended an **MCIU Wilson Foundations seminar**. The Wilson Foundations provide all students in K-3 classrooms with a systematic program in the foundational skills for reading and spelling, emphasizing phonemic awareness, phonics-word study, high frequency word study, fluency, vocabulary, handwriting, and spelling.

Rachel Nisula virtually attended the Art of Education University's "Art Ed Now" Global Online Conference. This conference included lesson ideas, new materials, methods and classroom strategies to try with students, and suggestions for ways to expand the curriculum as an art educator.

Jill, her sister Carol Pollock Abrams '55, and her brother Mayer "Mickey" Pollock II '60 grew up in the lovely home that is now Wyndcroft's Highland House, containing our Early Learning Center and several administrative offices. She writes us: "I have so many fond memories of my years at Wyndcroft, starting when I was just 3 years old. I am very happy that my childhood home is now part of the campus, and I think that Wyndcroft did an admirable job in renovating it to meet the needs of the school while still preserving the beauty of the building. I was very fortunate to enjoy Miss Obie for both first and second grades. She was a wonderful teacher, and I loved her dearly! I can still envision her beautiful handwriting. Wyndcroft instilled in me a love of reading, starting at a very early age, which exists to this day. It is very reassuring to know that the excellence in education provided by Wyndcroft during my formative years is thriving so many years later. The campus has gone through many changes in the 72 years since I was first a student! Richard E. Ludwick, Jr., Ph.D., '65 completed his history of Ludwick Motors, his family's automobile dealership in Pottstown, and presented a copy to the Pottstown Historical Society. Chryslers, Plymouths, Dodges, DeSotos, Imperials, and other cars from Ludwick's were the vehicles of choice for many Wyndcroft families. The book is rich in detail and comprehensively illustrated. Dick Ludwick, Rick's father, shares memories of his 50 years in the business and selections from his treasure trove of archival material. The predecessor business was founded in 1915, and the successor dealership lives on today as Tri-County Chrysler Dodge Jeep Ram in Limerick. Rick would be delighted to send a digital copy of *The History of Ludwick Motors to anyone who's interested*.

CLASS OF 1966

We asked **Jane Estreicher '66** for a personal update, and she writes, "Wyndcroft serves as a wonderful nurturing environment in which children can be educated, grow, develop potential talents and skills, and achieve. ... Love Wyndchimes, the new student uniforms. The awards and secondary [school] placements are second to none! I think my many interests and lack of boredom are the result of the strong foundation I received at the Wyndcroft School."

Jonathan Evans `68 acted and sang in many Wyndcroft productions. When he got to the Hill School, he joined the Hilltones and had roles of increasing importance in the annual Gilbert and Sullivan operettas there. In his Sixth Form year he sang the roles of both Buttercup and Josephine in HMS Pinafore (the Hill was all-male in those days and boys sang the petticoat roles - it was part of the fun) because the guy who was to have played Josephine got kicked out at the last minute for missing rehearsals. Jon had learned Josephine's part by listening to recordings at home back in his Wyndcroft years, so he just wore a sign saying Buttercup on one side and Josephine on the other, flipping sides depending on which role he was singing at the moment.

Many years later Jon returned to performing Gilbert and



Sullivan when he became active in the Valley Light Opera of Amherst, Mass. His roles were bookended by performances in Yeomen of the Guard in 2002 and 2014. In 2002 he was Second Citizen and wore a close-fitting medieval-looking leather cap which, as he said, made you look even more oppressed. In the 2014 production of Yeomen he sang the lead role of Fairfax opposite Elaine

Crane, founder and executive director of the Greater Worcester (Mass.) Opera. He's pictured (prior page second from right) on New Year's Eve 2019 in one of the elegant costumes he wore in 2014. The occasion was the First Night celebration of the Valley Light Opera, when Jon and three other singers reprised their madrigal from the 2014 production. Jon's son Rhys says he wants the family to go out to dinner with Jon dressed this way. Offstage, Jon is an independent investment and financial services writer for Vanguard, MassMutual, and other major companies.
