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Chadwick Minis Overview

The Chadwick Minis program is designed to give 4- and 5-year-olds a positive early educational experience in relaxed and pleasant surroundings. We aim to create a stimulating, diverse, and supportive learning environment where students interact with mutual respect and trust. Our one-to-five teacher-to-student ratio facilitates a variety of enriching activities.

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Chadwick Minis Morning Activities

Our mornings begin with a “welcome,” followed by calendar, songs, and stories. The children then cycle through the following camp activities in small groups.

Centers

Centers are theme-related, hands-on activities led by a credentialed teacher or an assistant teacher. Indoor centers include structured play, science exploration, math games, and reading and writing skill development. Outdoor centers on the playground encourage fun while developing motor skills through games, rhythm and movement.

Art

Art lessons in our studio introduce students to basic art media such as paint, watercolor, and pastels, using a wide variety of materials. Projects allow for creative expression and growth.

Music

Music class fosters children's love for music by inviting Chadwick Minis to sing songs, play simple instruments, and participate in dance and movement activities.

Pool

Chadwick Minis enjoy swim time two to three times a week. Our goal is to help children feel safe and have fun in the water. Swim instructors give all children a swim test to determine their level of comfort in the water and then customize instruction based on their needs. The adult-to-student ratio is one-to-two, and lifeguards monitor the pool at all swim times. [All lifeguards are Red Cross certified, which includes lifesaving, CPR, and first aid.]

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Chadwick Minis Afternoon Activities

The following activities apply only to those students enrolled in the full-day program.

Lunch

Children eat lunch together with the Chadwick Minis staff. Please provide a healthy lunch and drink for your child or pre-order a lunch through the school's dining services. For more information about the dining program, see the "General Information" section.

Story/Rest Time

Time to take a break! During this quiet part of the afternoon children are encouraged to read, do puzzles, play quiet games and enjoy a little "down time." An afternoon snack is provided.

Art

Summer is the time for fun! Our campers will get to explore various paints, pastels, oil crayons, and clay, and we'll go outside for sun printing and other printing methods. We will combine many of our projects with found objects such as cardboard, string, feathers, googly eyes and anything else we can find. We will end our summer making tie-dye T-shirt's and have a fashion display.

Swimming

Chadwick's Aquatics Program offers children a range of basic swim skills, while adhering to strict safety rules. An initial assessment matches each camper to his/her appropriate swim level. Students also enjoy supervised "free swim" time in the pool two days each week. [All lifeguards and swim instructors are Red Cross certified, which includes lifesaving, CPR, and first aid.]

Computer Lab

Campers navigate both software and web-based applications in one of Chadwick's several computer labs. The programs explored include Microsoft Word, KidPix and Pixie, Google Earth, Math Blaster, Mavis Beacon Typing Software, and many more.

Games

Game on! Campers use logic, reasoning, social skills, and critical thinking to play strategic board games. They will discover how game developers create board games in order to design their very own. Campers choose a theme, establish rules, directions and even design a board and game pieces. Then, we play!

Sports

Campers participate in both gym and field sports. In the gym campers play basketball, handball, jump rope, and more.

LANGUAGE ARTS

Creative Writing [GRADES 1 & 2]

Learning to write is one of the most important skills children can develop. Please join us as we learn to express ourselves through writing. Students will write short stories while exploring elaboration strategies such as dialogue and descriptive language.

Get Your Motor Running [GRADE 2]

Vroom, vroom! Students will strengthen their fine motor skills and reading in this class. Crafting stories in Writer's Workshop will strengthen students' writing and editing skills. Reading activities will focus on expanding vocabulary and comprehension. Students will be assessed during the first week and leveled accordingly.

The Bakery [GRADES 2 & 3]

This thematic class is designed to help students understand and integrate the complexities of starting and running a bakery business. This course will integrate language arts, science, math, and visual arts skills. Reading and writing are key components in this class. The culminating activity will be a bake sale on campus with the proceeds donated to a charity of the class' choosing.

Into the Blue: All About the Ocean [GRADES 3 & 4]

Have you ever wondered what lurks below the surface of our oceans? Uncover the great mysteries of the ocean in this class. Students will explore different ocean environments and the creatures that live there. Through a mix of science and language arts, students will learn about the environment that occupies most of our planet.

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Grades 1-5 (as of Fall, 2020)



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Rainforest Rally [GRADES 3 & 4]

Discover the many plants and animals that call the rainforest their home. Students will read and write short stories and reports, strengthening research and language skills. Library and Internet searches will provide plenty of ideas. Students will gain knowledge about the rainforest and share that knowledge with one another. Each child will benefit from the warm and supportive environment.

Smartworks [GRADE 4]

This class will support students who need an extra boost in reading comprehension and inferential meaning in order to prepare them for the next grade level. Process-writing and short story reading is the basis for this class. While learning mechanics, form, and style, students will discover the joy of writing.

Prep Gazette [GRADES 4 & 5]

Students combine creativity, interview skills, and language arts skills to create an original newspaper for summer school. Working collaboratively, students write articles, interview people and take photos, documenting their work in the newspaper for summer school. In so doing, students learn to organize creative ideas into informative and editorial writings, as well as practice and develop public speaking skills.

Reading & Study Skills [GRADES 4 & 5]

This course is designed to help students improve the way they read and study academic material. Maximizing students' abilities to comprehend and retain what they read is emphasized, as are note-taking skills. Students learn a variety of techniques that they will be able to utilize in their classes next fall.

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Research Skills

[GRADES 4 & 5]

Learning to gather information, organizing one's thoughts, and presenting findings effectively are critical life skills. Students will practice their research, writing, and speaking skills through fun-filled projects such as book talks, speeches, and debates.

MATH

One Shoe, Two Shoe

[GRADE 1]

Students will dazzle their friends, thrill their parents, and amaze their teachers next year when they return to class with a whole new "bag of tricks" for solving math problems. Using manipulatives, games, and a variety of "tricks," students will review addition and subtraction of one and two digit numbers, count money, tell time, and explore geometry.

Creative Math

[GRADE 2]

Not everyone is a math person, right? WRONG! In this class, students learn that EVERYONE can be a math person if they have the right mindset. Students will learn about how having a growth mindset, the idea that your mind grows when learning and facing challenges, can help them become more flexible learners. Students will go on a math adventure to build their number sense and problem solving skills through various math-based activities. After this class, students will leave as inspired mathematicians!

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Zany, Brainy Math [GRADE 2]

In this hands-on class, students learn about problem solving, estimating, critical thinking, and logic through the use of hands-on activities and strategy games. Additionally, students will strengthen their addition and subtraction skills with two and three digit numbers in several fun-filled ways. They will create art projects using simple geometry, fractions, and arrays. Writing will be emphasized as students learn problem-solving strategies.

Monster Math [GRADE 3]

Using manipulatives, games, iPads, and creativity, students will review addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division concepts. Number theory, geometry, and problem-solving projects will help students stretch their minds.

Math Shop [GRADE 4]

While using manipulatives, students will develop their math problem-solving abilities. Through both individual and cooperative small group strategies, this course presents various problem situations that will lead them to use multiple methods and provide opportunities for intuitive and inductive reasoning, mathematical discovery, creativity, and originality.

Math Magicians [GRADES 4 & 5]

Students will review decimals, fractions, percentages, geometry, area, perimeter, graphs, and basic computation. Creative projects allow students to apply their knowledge in new ways. A variety of math games and manipulatives will be used to reinforce basic skills, with an emphasis on problem solving and communicating mathematical thinking.

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Grow Your Own Business [GRADE 5]

In this class, students will grow their entrepreneurial spirit through critical and creative thinking. The students will create their own businesses by raising funds, designing an original product, pitching to investors, and finally selling their product to an authentic audience. Throughout this process, they will learn about financial responsibility and understand the value of teamwork. Don't miss out on learning how to be an entrepreneur of your own company!

SCIENCE

Mad Scientists [GRADES 1 & 2]

Chemistry exists in our everyday lives! This hands-on class will include growing crystals, doing lab experiments, and creating tasty dishes. Inventive projects and science-based art will engage young learners.

Creepy Crawlies [GRADES 1 & 2]

Bring your nets and magnifying glasses on this tour of creepy crawlies around us. Students will plant a garden and explore our campus and canyon. Scientific theory, observation, recording data, making hypotheses, and testing them will keep young entomologists busy.



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Whodunnit? Introduction to Forensic Science

[GRADES 2 & 3, 4 & 5]

Calling all future Crime Scene Investigators! In this class, students will use science, reasoning, and problem solving to investigate how law enforcement professionals solve crimes and analyze evidence. Using tools and methods like those of professionals, students will collect evidence in order to try and solve mysteries and "crimes." This is a great introduction to the science of forensics, and learning how biology, chemistry, and physics play a major role in the investigation!

Gizmos, Gadgets & Goop

[GRADES 3 & 4]

Future scientists will perform spectacular experiments and practice recording and reflecting on their observations in this hands-on class. A variety of science-based activities will keep these young scientists busy. Students will explore chemistry and natural science, as well as concocting lotions, potions, and goop!

Ingenious Inventors [GRADES 4 & 5]

The exciting world of experiments begins with students designing their own collection or invention. The inventive projects and hands-on experiences engage these learners as they develop a model, state its purpose, and create advertising to sell it. Young scientists will keep a log of their spectacular work. Perfect for innovative minds!

3, 2, 1 ... Blast Off! [GRADE 5]

Rockets are remarkable creations of human ingenuity. Have you ever wondered what it is that makes a rocket fly? Students in this course will demonstrate Newton's Laws of Motion, construct a rocket-propelled vehicle, design bottle rockets, and experiment with many other fun and interesting things. How far will your rocket fly?



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Einstein's Workshop [GRADE 5]

Are you fascinated with science? This hands-on course involves physical, biological, and chemical projects in our fully-equipped Science Lab. Children will be guided as they build electronic gadgets, conduct experiments, and practice the scientific method. Findings will be shared in a variety of ways including graphs, posters, and journaling.

ART/MISCELLANEOUS

Mindfulness Matters

[GRADES 1, 2 & 3]

Children of all ages can benefit from mindfulness, the simple practice of bringing a gentle, accepting attitude to the present moment. In addition to the physical benefits, the practice of yoga can help improve a child's ability to focus, concentrate, and listen. It enhances their self-confidence and is a gentle introduction to self-discipline. Children will explore whimsical and traditional yoga poses while also practicing mindfulness activities like tuning in to all five senses and becoming more aware of the world around them.

Artistic Fingers [GRADES 1 & 2]

Get ready for a fun and an artistic summer! Students will experience a range of media from water color painting and combining paint with other materials to make fun and exciting collages. We will include 3-D art projects such as clay building, colourful mask making and other 3-D projects using found materials.

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Let's Get Three-Dimensional!

[GRADES 3 & 4]

Students will learn creative ways to use a variety of art materials by working with three dimensional materials such as clay, paper, cardboard construction as well as found objects. Imagination meets critical thinking in this course for the creative mind.

Wizard School

[GRADES 3 & 5]

Calling all fans of potions and spells! Come as we embark on a journey that is the perfect mixture of wizardly arts and creativity. Come join us as we learn all about the stories and characters of popular wizard series through interactive activities like wizardly wand and potion making, spell writing, book trivia and more! These imaginative and magical activities will be tons of wizardly fun, all-the-while allowing you to unleash your creativity and build critical thinking and literacy skills.

Learning by Design

[GRADES 3 & 4, 4 & 5]

In this class, students will go through the Design Cycle to create original projects by combining technology, science and art. They will learn about the steps of the design process—research & planning, developing ideas, troubleshooting & finally evaluating—as they work in groups to bring their ideas to life.

Printmaking

[GRADES 4 & 5]

Printmaking has been a useful skill throughout history. In this class, students will learn about several printmaking processes and experience making their own prints. They will do everything from stamp printing to sun printing to silk screening.

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COMPUTER

Code Crashers [GRADES 2 & 3]

Are you interested in coding? Students in this class learn the basics of coding, a beginning step in preparing for a technology-fueled future. Coding is an invaluable 21st-century skill. Even kids who don't go on to become computer scientists will benefit from learning to speak and understand the language of coding.

Computer Wizards [GRADES 2, 3, 4 & 5]

Students become competent at keyboarding with daily practice in this class. Students will increase speed and accuracy while monitoring their progress. Additionally, students will use their skills to produce posters, graphs, and other projects.

Lego Robotix [GRADES 4 & 5]

Join the Lego Robotix tech team and create robots that you control. Throughout the class, you will learn how machines work and have the opportunity to design your own robots. Using the computer, you can create a program that instructs your robot to move. We will explore basic scientific principles, mathematical concepts and procedures, and introductory programming skills.

Gamestoppers & Animators [GRADES 4 & 5]

In this class students learn Scratch, a visual computer programming language for kids that makes it easy to create and share animations and games of all kinds. They will explore key math and computational ideas using creativity, logic, and collaboration skills. Students well-versed in Scratch can independently explore other languages like Javascript and Python.

Grades 6–11 (as of Fall, 2020)



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Chadwick Prep Plus+ Overview

Chadwick Prep Plus immerses students ranging from 11 through 16 years of age in an environment that encourages advanced thinking, creative problem solving, and a lifelong love of learning. Students will explore their potential as inventors, detectives, and strategists. Interdisciplinary classes will strengthen students' talents in reading, writing, math, and science, while pushing them to employ these skills in new and imaginative ways.

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ENRICHMENT COURSES (Enrichment Courses meet from 9:00 a.m. – 9:50 a.m.)

Computer Coding [GRADES 6 & 7]

In our digital age, computer programming is the “it” thing to do. Facebook has an app. Twitter has an app. Snapchat has an app. Those apps and more were all created by someone who learned computer programming. Scratch is a great way to learn the fundamental concepts of programming languages. In this class, you will explore how to create games, animations, stories, and art using computer learning tools that teach programming skills.

Debate [GRADES 6, 7, 8 & 9]

Learn the art of verbal combat! Students will learn how to construct persuasive positions, defend against and attack each other’s arguments, and cross-examine effectively. Students will debate a variety of age- and experience appropriate topics, form teams, and pit themselves against their peers. Debate topics may include: school uniforms, private/public school, and school food. By the end of the course, students will not only be comfortable speaking at the podium, but also will have a good idea of how to structure a thoughtful argument, how to refute a statement you don’t agree with, and how to get that last word in.

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ENRICHMENT COURSES (Enrichment Courses meet from 9:00 a.m. – 9:50 a.m.)

World of Web Design

[GRADES 8, 9 & 10]

The world of software design is booming! In this beginning course, students will cover the software creation process. Students will learn the object oriented design principles and the fundamentals of programming as they plan their own projects. Java will be the primary language to teach and understand data types and methods. Students will work individually and in small groups to explore new concepts. No previous programming experience is required.

Public Speaking [GRADES 7, 8, 9 & 10]

In this class, students will learn to express themselves with greater confidence and clarity in a fun summer environment. The course is designed to help develop critical-thinking skills. Students will have the opportunity to present both impromptu and prepared speeches on topics of their choosing. Speeches include biographical introductions and informative “how” explanations. Students will also become familiar with the basics of good public speaking by viewing and critiquing famous speeches.

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ENRICHMENT COURSES (Enrichment Courses meet from 9:00 a.m. – 9:50 a.m.)

Robotics VEX-IQ [GRADES 6, 7, & 8]

Using robots, students will cover the fundamentals of problem solving, program design, algorithms and programming using a high-level language. A robot is an embedded system of software and hardware. Programming and building robots applies science, technology, engineering and math concepts. This course introduces the fundamental concepts of programming. *This course also has the option to meet Period 2 (10:00 a.m. – 10:50 a.m.).

Study Skills [GRADES 7, 8 & 9]

In this course students develop more effective systems of organization, improve their reading comprehension, and learn to listen critically. Students will practice using their stronger skills to boost weaker skills and how to do group work effectively. Students will also study the different forms of note-taking and analysis as well as practice how to study for assessments.

Intro to Financial Market Trading [GRADES 7, 8, 9 & 10]

This course will examine the financial markets particularly the FOREX market on how financial traders create wealth trading using the FOREX Market. Students will begin by learning technical analysis, trend, Fibonacci Sequences, resistance, gaps, support and supply and demand. They will learn how the news affects the markets as well. Students will be using a demo account and will be making live trades in the class. In the demo account students will understand how to use Japanese candlesticks and determine if there is a bull or bear market. In addition, students will learn financial terminology. Students will also learn the most valuable lessons which are risk-to-reward ratio and money management.

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ACADEMIC COURSES (Meet from 10:00 a.m – 12:00 p.m. or 1:00 p.m. – 3:00 p.m.)

English Essentials I [GRADES 6 & 7]

English Essentials I is designed to enhance fundamental reading and writing skills through the close reading of short stories and poetry. Students will complete text-based grammar exercises. The writing workshop will focus on the body paragraph as the basic unit of the analytical essay. While grammar, reading, and composition remain at the heart of the course, students will also learn to develop original arguments based on their interpretive discoveries.

English Essentials II [GRADES 8, 9 & 10]

This course reviews the fundamentals of reading, composition, and grammar basics. Whereas English Essentials I focuses on fundamental writing concepts, this class places greater focus on the multi-paragraph analytical essay. All writing assignments, however, will encourage students to develop their critical reading skills while close-reading short stories and poetry. Students will be encouraged to formulate original arguments based on their own interpretive discoveries.

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ACADEMIC COURSES (Meet from 10:00 a.m – 12:00 p.m. or 1:00 p.m. – 3:00 p.m.)

Pre-Algebra

[GRADES 6 & 7]

This course will review and complete the study of whole numbers, decimals and fractions. Concepts of algebra, discrete mathematics, functions and patterns, geometry, logic, numbers, probability and statistics are included. Attention is given to manipulate, proportional relationships, multiple representations, patterns and generalizations, real-world applications and problem solving strategies.

Readiness for Algebra I

[GRADES 7, 8 & 9]

This course is designed for anyone getting ready to enter an algebra course. Students will work on big ideas of algebraic thinking that students can develop before they enter algebra. The ideas are Representation, Proportional Reasoning, Variable, Function, and Inductive/Deductive Reasoning. The concepts will be introduced through classroom activities, partner projects, such as poster creation and presentation. Students will also review and strengthen pre-algebra skills as they study the big ideas.

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Readiness for Algebra II

[GRADES 9, 10 & 11]

This course will review the Algebra I skills essential to one's success in subsequent mathematics courses. Topics will include: The Real Number System and its properties, Solving Linear Equations, Solving Multi-step and Compound Linear Inequalities, Solving Quadratic Equations by Factoring, Solving Systems of Equations, Laws of Exponents, Monomial and Polynomial Expressions, Rational Expressions, Intro to Functions, Graphing Problem Solving Approaches, and Numeracy.

Readiness for Geometry

[GRADES 8, 9 & 10]

This class covers almost a full year of high school geometry. Students will concentrate on the study of Euclidean Geometry while maintaining and enhancing algebraic skills. Students will learn the ideas, concepts, and theorems of this branch of mathematics as they were developed by the early mathematicians. Students will also extend their reasoning skills by forming geometric arguments, and will learn how to apply these principles to solve problems in various situations.

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ACADEMIC COURSES (Meet from 10:00 a.m – 12:00 p.m.)

Mini Golf Design [GRADES 6, 7 & 8]

Fore! Off the bumper, over the drawbridge, and into the hole. This course utilizes woodworking skills such as measuring, cutting, hammering, sanding, and much more, while using your imagination to design a mini-golf course. Each hole can have a different theme with varying degrees of difficulty, using sustainable resources to ignite your imagination. 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AU Band [AGES 9-14]

Any student with basic experience with a traditional band or orchestra instruments (wind, percussion, or strings) is welcome in the AU Band. The band will perform at various lunch festivals throughout AU and perform at the AU Picnic on July 23 for Open House. Please note: Students must provide their own instruments. This is not an instruction class: students must have basic experience in their instrument.

AU Weekly [AGES 9-14]

If students like to write, interview people, and take pictures, this is the class for them. Budding journalists get hands-on experience as the news crew that publishes the Arts Unlimited weekly newspaper.

Bookworm's Workshop [AGES 9-14]

For the bookworm who has always dreamed of writing their own book, this is a class for you. This class provides a space for students to share and discover their love for reading and writing with one another. Students will learn and experience the full process of writing and illustrating their own books, as well as marketing their books through creating book trailers, using iMovie.

Cartooning [AGES 9-14]

From idea, to outline, to storyboard, to final drawing in panels, students learn the basics of this art form—inventing and creating their own cartoon character. This class deals with printed cartoons, not animation. Students work will be published in AU Weekly, the student newspaper.

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Ceramics 1 [AGES 9-14]

This class teaches the basics of hand-building methods of clay construction. Pieces will be glazed and fired once students have built and decorated them. Work will be displayed at the Open House Art Exhibit on July 23.

Ceramics 2 [AGES 11-14]

In this instruction class students will learn this game of strategy or advance their expertise with the one and only "Chessman." All levels welcomed and challenged.

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Fashion Design

[AGES 9-14]

In this course, campers of all ages will have the opportunity to up-cycle, customize, and embellish various clothing items to make them unique and their own! They will all begin with clothing items (provided by each student, from home and thrift shops) including t-shirts, jean jackets, and pants that they will use as their blank canvases for their own clothing collection. Not only will they learn how to customize their closet, but they will practice sketching out their designs, creating their own brand, and will show off their designs at the end of camp in a photoshoot and runway show where they wear their own designs at the Open House Performances on July 23.

Fencing I

[AGES 9-11]

The basic beginning techniques of fencing are taught to those new to this storied art. Students will offer demonstrations at AU Open House, July 23. Equipment will be provided.

Fencing 2

[AGES 12-14]

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Musical Production [AGES 9-14]

AU campers are invited to come learn song, dance, and acting as AU 2020 presents "Mary Poppins!" The performance will be on Wednesday, July 22 at 7:00 p.m. The play will be collaborative, featuring the unique talents of each student. The directors, producer, and choreographer will cast the show after the first day of class. **All cast members, and their families, must agree, in principle, to attend each class period throughout the five weeks, except in cases of grave illness.** A video of the show will be filmed and made available as a download. There is an additional costume fee of \$50 for this course.

Painting [AGES 9-14]

This art class is all about painting on canvas with acrylic paints. Students express themselves through creations based on instructions in style, color, and composition. The class has two art instructors who are able cover all levels of

art making and provide one-on-one personal instruction as needed. Work will be on display at the Open House Art Exhibit on July 23.

Sing Out [AGES 9-14]

This class will feature vocal technique instruction by using daily group exercises as well as personal coaching. Students will prepare and present vocals, with live accompaniment, for festivals and the Open House Performances in the final week of camp. Extremely fun to play, and easy to get started, this low-bar/ high-ceiling, chromatic, orchestral range family of instruments is a delightful experience for the musical novice and veteran alike. The class will cover the fundamentals of music theory and literacy for those who need it while offering the experienced musician a chance to explore and develop their musicality. Campers will learn about various musical styles and genres from the Caribbean as well as the fascinating history of

the instrument and the people and culture that created it, culminating with a group performance/presentation at the Open House Art Exhibit on Thursday, July 23rd.

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Enrollment

To enroll in any program, please visit our website at www.chadwickschool.org/summer, where you can complete registration as well as submit payment. Spaces are not held without payment of the \$200 non-refundable deposit. A separate registration must be completed for each student enrolled. The balance of the tuition and fees due must be received by Friday, May 29th, 2020, to hold the student's program selection. There is no enrollment deadline; however, enrollment is limited in all programs and will be filled on a first-come, first-served basis. Programs and courses have a minimum and maximum enrollment. Chadwick School reserves the right to cancel any class that does not have adequate enrollment.

Refund Policy

Full tuition, less the required enrollment deposit, will be refunded for any withdrawal made before May 29th, 2020. All students who register between May 29th and June 22nd must pay all tuition and fees in full at the time of registration. No refunds

will be made for any withdrawal after May 29th, unless there is a waiting list for that program and the withdrawing student's place can be filled. **No refunds will be made after the first day of classes.** There are no exceptions to this policy.

Conduct

All students are expected to behave responsibly and with respect for others and for the campus in general. The usual rules of safety, order, and cooperation are enforced. All other children arriving on campus before 8:45 a.m. must be dropped off at the extended day care center in the Village playground, and will be charged \$10 per morning. Extended day care fees must be paid on an as-used basis, directly to the extended day care director. All charges must be paid by Friday of each week. Children may not be left unattended elsewhere on campus before 8:45 a.m.

Afternoon

Extended day care for students in all programs is available from 3 p.m. until 6 p.m. The charge for this service is \$10 per hour and is payable on an as-used basis directly to the extended day care director. All charges must be paid by Friday of each week. Alternatively, parents may pre-enroll their child for the five-week term at a charge of \$400. Parents of students left on campus after 3:15 p.m. will be subject to an extended day charge. After 3:15 p.m., children may be picked up at the extended day care

Carpool, Traffic and Parking Information

The school's Conditional Use Permit requires the school to monitor and control traffic throughout the year during the weekday morning and afternoon peak periods. The school is required to take whatever measures may be necessary to limit school-related traffic to levels below baseline traffic counts, which have been formally established for the morning and afternoon. In this regard, parents and students who drive to the school are **strongly encouraged to carpool**. To facilitate the ability to find carpool partners, the school may release names, addresses and phone numbers of enrolled families to those who are seeking such a partner.
