Few books over the Christmas period have been as challenging or as thought-provoking as “The Age of Surveillance Capitalism” by Shoshana Zuboff. Zuboff’s thesis that as technology develops at a time of globalisation, large spaces of social life are dominated by corporations, which seek to obtain and collect data, is both shocking and compelling. The data acquired, Zuboff notes, is then analysed, leading to the prediction of prospective behaviour.

Questions about privacy and manipulation inevitably arise as well as freedom and responsibility.

It has become a truism to say that there has been a revolution in Information Technology. Knowledge has always meant power and there is a long history of individuals trying, often failing, to control it. Fortunately, words and ideas as well as inventions can be used again and again; once uncorked, it is almost impossible to reclaim. In the 21st century the internet has been the accelerant to drive ever faster pieces of knowledge across the world. It truly changes the world. As the world was never the same again after the invention of the Guttenberg printing press, so our planet has been transformed after the emergence of Google, Facebook and Twitter. Those of us who knew a world before the internet stand bemused at the changes, whilst the internet generation can scarcely conceive of what it was like before.

As a result of this, young people are more “networked” than any other group in society. The social world for them is less defined by physical space, boundaries and borders and more experienced online and digitally. Less fixed to an actual place, they live in a world where information is constant and everywhere. Rather than a considered reply, the network space requires instant responses – without time for reflection or thought. Why is it a surprise that unkind and thoughtless comments are abound on social media?

How we deal with these new challenges is inevitably difficult, particularly for schools and parents; there are no easy fixes or solutions. But what is true is that the values of kindness, care and attention are still vital to our students’ wellbeing. How they treat other, how they value themselves and what they value are as important now as they have ever been. It is our responsibility to ensure that these are front and centre in all our discussion and debates.




