Mental Health Challenges of our Youth and Guidelines for Coming to their Aid Patricia M. Joergensen, Ed.D

Dr. Patricia (Trish) Joergensen is an Associate Professor of Mathematics Education, School of Education, Holy Family University. She holds a bachelor's degree in Mathematics from Fordham University, a Masters of Arts in Education from LaSalle University, and a Doctorate of Education in Mathematics Education from Temple University.

In addition to her duties of training Holy Family University pre-service teachers for careers in contemporary education, Dr. Joergensen offers training for anyone who has frequent contact with young adults, such as parents, school staff, sports coaches, and youth workers or volunteers. The training course is titled Youth Mental Health First Aid. (It began in Australia in 2001, before spreading to the US.)

She is the mother of four young adults: three young women and a son who is in college.

Class Meetings

The Class Meetings for every class were conducted this month for our freshmen, sophomores, juniors, and seniors. The purpose of each Class Meeting was to discuss themes relevant to each class, along with reminders about expectations and challenges, and to also set personal goals for each student. With the new semester and Course Selection upon us, this was a great time to reboot, so to speak.

Every Class Meeting began and ended the same. Each meeting was customized for each class. For example, the Freshman Class Meeting introduced the freshmen to Course Selection and encouraged each student to get involved in extra curricular activities not only to build up a high school resume, but also to grow and develop



as people. With our sophomores, Course Selection has more options than they had the previous year. This was discussed as was the National Merit Scholarship process that begins at the beginning of junior year but preparing for this starts now. Of all students in Course Selection, the juniors have more opportunities than they have previously been offered. Also, "Getting Ready for College" was focus for the Junior Class Meeting. There are many things to do for juniors to get ready such as SAT preparation, preparing a "brag sheet" for Naviance account. and asking teachers for recommendation. We also discussed the MLK Day of Service Opportunity and the Junior Dinner Dance. The Senior Class Meeting centered meeting around their legacy as 2020 graduates of Nazareth Academy High School. Finishing strong and the Senior Prom were key components of this Class Meeting.

Although each meeting was customized for each class, each one began and ended the same way. At the beginning of the meeting, the students viewed a <u>video</u> called *Everyday Leadership*, presented by Drew Dudley. Students were challenged to embrace their "lollipop moments," or the seemingly small things they do for other daily that impact others' lives for the better.

At the close of the meeting, I challenged each student to set their own personal goals for the semester, their high school career, and beyond. I also asked each student to give me an exit ticket on an index card where they answered the question, "What do I need to know?" As principal, my door is always open but it is not often the case when a student rushes to my office to share. In this anonymous setting, out students told me a great deal of what I need to know. I appreciate their candor and their willingness to share in a respectful, reflective way. Winter weather disrupted the Class Meeting I was to present at the NAPA General Meeting on January 7th. School Functions Dress Code

Reminder, that as they did last year, juniors are permitted to wear strapless gowns for the Junior Dinner Dance. Young men escorting your daughters may wear either a suit/sports jacket, shirt and tie.

In keeping with the ideals of Nazareth Academy the dress code for the school functions (Snowball Dance, Junior Dinner Dance, Senior Prom) needs to be clarified. It is the desire of Nazareth Academy that students dress modestly and appropriately at all school functions.

Dress affects behavior and performance, "Clothes make the man/woman," or the dictum

"Dress right, act right". The school reserves the right to address students that are not appropriately dressed at all school functions. Nazareth asks students to dress and groom themselves as individuals with a sense of responsibility and self-respect. It is not a matter of what you must wear, it's more a matter of what we don't believe is appropriate. If dress attire is offensive, or provocative to others, then this constitutes inappropriate dress.

The dress code at Nazareth Academy is based on the theory that learning to use acceptable manners and selecting attire appropriate to specific occasions and activities are critical in the total education process. Understanding and employing these behaviors not only improves the quality of one's life, but also contributes to optimum morale, as well as embellishes the overall campus image. Dressing properly also plays a major role in instilling a sense of integrity and an appreciation for value and ethics.



The continuous demonstration of appropriate manners and dress insures that Nazareth Academy students meet the standards of quality achievement in the social, physical, moral, and educational aspects of their lives – essential areas of development necessary for propelling them toward successful careers. Proper dress should always exemplify young Christian women. We want each young lady to possess pride in representing Nazareth Academy at school functions by showing respect for oneself and others. Failure to comply with these expectations will result in a phone call to you on the evening of the dance/prom, and your daughter and her date will be asked to leave the dance/prom. Improper dress will also result in a 10- point demerit for lack of cooperation. These are the standards of Nazareth Academy High School. We are trying our best to prepare your daughters for the real world where expectations must be met and rules are a part of life. Please assist us as we implement this code of dress. Freshman Counseling Seminar (Spring)

"Lunch Bunch"

The greatest benefit from small group counseling is giving individuals the sense of belonging. Small groups also enhance social skills and give students the opportunity to meet with their peers to work through a similar issue OR work toward a similar goal. Groups usually consist of 2-6 other students within the same grade and meet during lunch, which is where the term "Lunch Bunch" comes from. Our small groups take place during Activity Period 1 day a week, ensuring that no instruction time is missed.

Ms. Mikulski facilitates the Junior/Senior group and Mrs. Dibelius will facilitate the Freshman/Sophomore group. While students are learning skills to use at home and school, the opportunity to spend time with peers who share their experiences is sometimes the most valuable. Various counseling topics are discussed each week which encourages reflection and sparks meaningful conversations.

Junior College Planning Meeting

On January 23rd and 24th, Mrs. Glasson and Ms. Mikulski conducted a Junior College Planning Presentation.

- The presentation will be held in the Performing Arts Center during activity period. Since many juniors have activity lunch, we strongly encourage students to pack their lunches to avoid missing valuable college information. Students will be able to eat during the presentation.
- The presentation will provide students with general information as to how they can prepare for college and the college application process. Students will also have the opportunity to ask general questions regarding the college planning process. Students with specific questions are encouraged to meet with their individual counselor or their college counselor.

College Acceptances and Scholarships/Grants

Many students from the senior class have received acceptance and/or scholarship letters from colleges/universities. These letters will be needed as supporting documentation for the graduation booklet and the Class of 2020 Scholarship total.

Seniors will receive a pre-college graduation survey that will be due in the beginning of April. This survey is where Nazareth Academy will get the student's information for the graduation booklet.

We ask that seniors make copies of their acceptance and scholarships/grants. The documents will be attached to the pre-graduation survey as verification of the information. College Information Sessions

During the spring semester the college counselors offer college information sessions to the junior class. These sessions are scheduled on Wednesdays during activity period in Computer Lab A.

Session 1(January 29th): Getting ready to take the SAT or ACT?

• Session 1 will explore standardized tests, determine which test is more appropriate for the student, search standardized test requirements for colleges, and explore colleges with test-optional applications.

Session 2 (February 5th): Résumé Building

• Session 2 will assist students in developing their activity résumé. Student will receive examples, determine what to include vs. not include on their résumé, and students will have the opportunity to work individually on their résumés.

PIAA paperwork must be handed into the Athletic Department prior to the first day of Spring tryouts on March 2nd. If you have already submitted the PIAA physical form for a Winter or Fall sport, you do not need to hand in another one. This Fall, Jillian Rayca (Junior) and Julie McAtee (Senior) spent 4 weeks researching, interviewing, and editing their own news segment which was broadcasted live on the radio. Both students found the experience to be enjoyable and rewarding. Congratulations, ladies!

During the fall, I participated in the KYW Newstudies program, which is an organization that introduces journalism and news reporting skills to students around Philadelphia. The program was held over five Saturday sessions, teaching students the basics of news writing, editing, and interviewing skills. During the sessions, both KYW reporters and

students from Temple University provided insight on their career through interactive presentations, short videos, or hands-on activities. There were also a number of panels from the KYW Newsradio team that spoke to us about many different aspects of reporting, as well as answering any of our questions. By the conclusion of the program, I was able to use what I had learned from the KYW Newstudies team to write and record my own report, which was about women in STEM careers. The program taught me a lot about storytelling through journalism, as well as how it can affect people all over the world. I am grateful to have had the opportunity to learn more about journalism from the professional managers, editors, and reporters at KYW!

Qualifications

- Earn yearly income of at least \$115,000
- Owe at least \$3,500 in state income taxes
