Engineering a Brighter Future

To provide students with more practical experience in design and engineering while increasing course offerings, MCI's Science department chair, **Jessica Libby**, and her department colleagues, **Lincoln Robinson** and **Adam Pomeroy**, began planning a makerspace for students in the Chuck and Helen Cianchette Math & Science Center.

Mrs. Libby defined a makerspace as a "place in which people with shared interests, especially in computing and technology, can gather to work on projects while sharing ideas, equipment, and knowledge."



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MCI's first makerspace is in the Powell Memorial Library and is used primarily for digital media. The digital media makerspace is managed by **Mike Libby** and contains a small photography studio, video and photography equipment for students to use, and several workstations to create and enhance digital production. The space is used regularly by students for their school projects.

"Our new makerspace," Mrs. Libby explained, "would be an environment for science students to practice and refine design skills learned in MCI's engineering classes." With several 3-D printers and ancillary equipment provided to the school from generous gifts from the Perloff Family Foundation and the Meridian Lodge #125 Masons, Mrs. Libby said the makerspace was ready for students at the start of the 2019 fall semester. This new collaborative space includes 3-D printers and supplies, an eye wash station, personal protective equipment, data storage devices, modeling clay, soldering kits, and hand tools. Classes use the makerspace to design, discuss, and test their concepts and solutions for their assignments.

Every school day, Science faculty access the makerspace to provide unique engineering and science instruction. Like MCI's digital media space, the new makerspace provides much-needed resources for students



to design, test and refine class projects that they work on in MCI's two engineering courses: *Introduction to Design* and *Introduction to Engineering*.

Introduction to Design provides the basic skills of engineering: scaling, design, testing, and retesting. These skills are refined in *Introduction to Engineering*. Both courses provide students a relevant set of engineering skills and knowledge. "We modified the course curriculum to provide a deeper understanding of engineering for our students with the hands-on experience to succeed in the engineering discipline," explained Mr. Robinson.

Since the new makerspace was introduced, interest in engineering classes has increased tremendously, with current and future classes filling quickly. "We're hoping to expand our engineering course offerings to include civil and environmental engineering with help from local professionals who are willing to help MCI students expand their interests in these disciplines," Mrs. Libby added. Because of students' profound interest in the makerspace, Mr. Robinson and Mr. Pomeroy encourage their students to use the lessons from their engineering classes to help other MCI departments resolve design challenges. Mr. Pomeroy's students designed a printing press and stamps for **Paddy Aidan**'s art classes, and the design was produced using 3-D printing. Mr. Pomeroy added that his students also assisted Mrs. Libby's Forensics class with carrying cases for test instruments and **Jessica Verrill**'s chemistry class with drying racks.

"Our 3-D solutions are often less expensive than similar items online," Mr. Robinson observed.

"The goal of the makerspace and of engineering at MCI is to build literacy in our students by using these tools to design and create real-world solutions," explained Mr. Pomeroy. "When students understand how their creative approaches to solving problems can become real-world innovations, the sky's the limit."

In October, sixteen Chinese students and faculty spent two weeks on the MCI campus as part of the students' studies at the EQ&IQ at MCI School in Wuhan. This visit is the result of a strategic partnership with the EQ&IQ School that started in 2017. In 2018, the EQ&IQ at MCI School was established, with thirteen students enrolled to study in China using the MCI curriculum that is taught by Chinese teachers on the EQ&IQ campus in Wuhan. Every year for two weeks, EQ&IQ at MCI School students travel to Maine as part of their educational requirements.

On October 21, EQ&IQ students held a welcome ceremony that featured poetry, music, Tai Chi, and calligraphy in the Ella Powell Room. Several invited guests enjoyed the student presentations, and **Christoper M. McDonald** presented EQ&IQ representative **Chen Sulan** with a print of Founders Hall produced by **Milton Webber '71**.

MCI welcomes Abdi Nor Iftin to talk of Resilience

In December, MCI welcomed Maine author **Abdi Nor Iftin** who gave a presentation to students as part of our **Patterson Lecture Series**. Held in Parks Gym before hundreds of students, faculty, and community members, Mr. Iftin spoke of the importance of resilience, which is this year's school theme.

Mr. Iftin shared stories of how resilience helped him persevere during times when he was close to giving up in Somalia and Kenya. "I don't remember one day when I felt safe. Life [growing up in Somalia] was filled with risks." He shared that the death of his younger sister and "daily life in Mogadishu taught me to appreciate the smallest things in life that we all take for granted – breathing, eating, family...."

Mr. Iftin's name was chosen in a diversity visa lottery with 200,000 others who were invited to apply for the 50,000 US visas available that year. Since he did not have the required birth certificate or high school diploma, he felt his chances were slim. He reflected of that desperate time, "If I give up, what do I have?"

Mr. Iftin described his mother's resilience as a strong nomadic woman whose wealth – her farm animals, family, and freedom – was slowly taken away from her by drought, famine, and civil war. The only way she got her family through those hard times was by storytelling. "I remember mom would tell us stories to distract us from fear and hunger."

Storytelling is why he wrote his book, *Call Me American* (www.callmeamerican. com), which tells of his harrowing life in Somalia during that country's civil war

In July, Bossov Ballet Theatre at MCI (BBT) presented three performances of *Sleeping Beauty* to enthusiastic audiences at the Hampden Academy Performing Arts Center. Dancers from Russia, Japan, Canada, Mexico and the USA came to the MCI campus for a rare opportunity to participate in a professional-level production of this famous and technically demanding ballet.

Alisa Zeldina, performing the role of Aurora, first came to BBT's summer program in 2015 to improve as both a dancer and a performer. Currently a student at the prestigious Vaganova Academy in Russia, Alisa describes the sense of family and connection she has found here each time she has returned, "I really love this place! It is like my home. I love the teachers and all the students... we are all like a big family."

Two young professional artists also appreciated this opportunity to dance with BBT. Alisa's partner, Alexandre Gomes Barbosa, performed by her side in the role of Prince Désiré. Originally from Brazil, Alexandre came to Bossov as a professional dancer with the Orlando Ballet. He describes his gratitude for this opportunity, "It's very challenging – a very demanding role, but very fulfilling. Natalya helps me step up my dancing to another level."

Masaya Kaneko also performed the role of Prince opposite Haruna Watanabe's Aurora. He was born in Tokyo, and has danced professionally with Virginia National Ballet, and as a guest dancer throughout Japan. Like Barbosa, Kaneko commented, "I'm so lucky to do this role, and working with **Natalya Getman** helps me with so many things, including my style and technique. This will help me a lot with my career."


Last performed by BBT in July 2015, the production was made even more dazzling by the addition of customdesigned tutus from Moscow and a generous donation from CM Almy of trims woven in Europe.



When not rehearsing, students explored Maine, from its lakes and coastline to the small-town charm of Pittsfield. International friendships and lasting memories were forged during time spent together in the MCI dorms, where students had a chance to play games, sew costumes, and even learn how to play the ukulele.

Joined by Bangor Ballet, Robinson Ballet, and Releve, BBT was pleased to share the stage with other dance groups in the region and look forward to similar collaborations in the future.

Fall Sports Break a Good Trail

The 2019-2020 athletic year got off to a good start this fall. Every team made the playoffs, one played in a state championship game, and 33 Husky fall sports athletes were awarded conference and state recognition for their efforts.

MCI Football won the Class C North regional championship. This is the fifth regional title in the last six years. The Huskies went 6-2 in the regular season and avenged one of those regular season losses with a 49-21 victory over Winslow in the regional championship game.

MCI's season came to an end in the Class C State Championship game held at the University of Maine where MCI was beaten by undefeated South champ Leavitt by a score of 30-24.

MCI Field Hockey used a rebuilding year to go 11-3 and finish 4th in Class C North. The Huskies fell to Lawrence



in the playoffs but will surely return a very talented group next season.

The MCI Girls Soccer team got a new coach, Dale Overlock, and some new energy as they surged to a 7-5-2 overall record and a playoff berth. The Huskies celebrated by winning their first soccer playoff game in over 10 years by beating Caribou 1-0.



Edith Tierney: Sowing Seeds of Community Service

Even at an early age, Edith Tierney '20 wanted to help others and build community. "I remember my family going to empty bowl dinners when I was young," she recalled. "These fundraisers were fun for me as a kid and I remember them being very popular community events." Those memories stayed with Edith as she grew older and, now, as a senior focused on food insecurity in central Maine, she worked on an independent study project with art teacher Paddy Aidan to create soup bowls that Edith gave away at an empty bowl dinner in Pittsfield on December 8, 2019. Held at the First Congregational Church in Pittsfield, Edith organized the entire event, from promotion and crafting several ceramic bowls for the meal to making the soups with assistance from her family and Ms. Aidan. Sarah Alexander, executive director of the Maine Organic Farmers and Gardeners Association, gave a brief talk at the event.

"The first eighty people kept the handmade bowls that their soup was served in," Edith explained, "and all the money raised – \$2,000 – was donated to the Pittsfield Food Pantry." Edith described her motivation for this event: "I found out that Maine is the seventh most food insecure state in the nation. Most heartbreakingly, I learned that in 2017, one in five children in Maine was food insecure. I realized that these people were my classmates, my neighbors, and probably my friends. This independent study helped me gain new understanding and enabled me to focus on this issue."

The older child of Hanne and Dan Tierney (her younger brother is Sam), the Tierney family owns and operates The Cornerstone Farm, a pork and organic vegetable farm in Palmyra. From an early age, Edith helped her family on the farm as well as care for the livestock they raised. She shares a passion for reading with her father, who is a biologist at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, and a love of animals and canine training with her mother. The organic farm is a family activity where Edith focuses much of her time and attention outside school: planting, cultivating and harvesting crops that they sell at various farmers markets throughout central Maine. What she like most is interacting with customers at farmers markets.

"I love marketing," she noted. "To me, that's setting up the farm stand to draw customers in, talking with customers to find out what produce items they want, and working with my family to help fulfill those requests."

Edith opted to attend MCI because she wanted the academic challenge that MCI provides, but once she started classes, she realized MCI encouraged students to help others as well. Her participation in the MCI Key Club's *Color Run* last year joined two of her passions: helping others and running.

"Although I am not into team sports, I love running," Edith said. "The *Color Run* was a great way to encourage others

to run and raise money for a good cause. It was lots of fun." Edith has participated in Model United Nations, Outdoor Adventure Club, Running Club, and the Aomori Program, but Key Club has had a more profound influence on her. "Key Club helped me become more confident in myself and helped me build connections within the community and school," Edith said, "and it has taught me to be even more passionate about community service."

During the end of her junior year, Edith signed up to volunteer with **Christopher M. McDonald** after he spoke at MCI about his work with The Olympia School in Vietnam. "Vietnam was unlike any place I had ever been," Edith said, explaining that the country was not as automobile-focused as the United States, and many people shop at street markets rather than at large grocery or department stores. In the evenings, Edith and other American volunteers visited street markets to sample the cuisine of the region, which was primarily seafood-based.

"For two weeks, I helped set up a bilingual curriculum for children five to eleven-years old," she said. "English is the language that many Vietnamese want to learn, and at the camp, we helped children of all ages learn English."

Of Edith's future plans for college, she is keeping her options open. She's applied to several colleges, and her first acceptance was from Saint Thomas in New Brunswick,



where she would major in international development. After college, Edith would like to join the Peace Corps or a similar organization.





"My family has been a tremendous influence on what I am and what I want to do," Edith explained. "The four of us are very close, and we share many interests and passions."

In October, MCI inducted four athletes to its Athletic Hall of Fame (AHOF). Held in the Savage Family Dining Room with current MCI students on hand to help facilitate the event with Director of Athletics **James Leonard**, **Christopher M. McDonald**, the Advancement team, several community members, families and past AHOF members feted the achievements of past student athletes.

John Wilcox '89 was MCI Athlete of the Year during his senior year; he played football, basketball, tennis, baseball and track during his three years at the school. John excelled in basketball, where he was named Most Valuable Player (MVP) for three years and served as captain during his senior year in which he averaged 17 points and 11 rebounds per game. A three-year member of the football team, John was captain and team MVP as a senior; John also captured the Eastern Maine Championship for shotput during his senior year on the track team. Academically, John received the Roderic Smith Award, attended Boys State, received the MEA Award for Writing, and participated in MCI's French Club and the Cultural Exchange Club. John is a clinical associate professor of occupational therapy at the University of New Hampshire.

Becky Vaughan Walker '93 was a three-sport athlete who starred as a pitcher and went on to a Hall of Fame college career at the University of Maine at Farmington. During her freshman year at MCI, Becky compiled a 16-3 pitching record, giving the Huskies a first-place standing in eastern Maine and state runners up in Class B. During her junior year, the Huskies were 18-2, winning the Eastern Maine championship. Becky earned all-state honors and was named the team's defensive MVP while batting .433. As a senior, the team was 12-3, advancing to the Eastern Maine semifinals. Becky was also a four-year athlete on the basketball team and played one year of soccer. Becky is a kindergarten teacher for SAD#53 and continues to coach girls in pitching windmill, having served as an assistant softball coach for MCI.

at Farmington where he won 15 college golf events. Sam worked ten years as a PGA pro at Cape Arundel Golf Club. He is now a school teacher in RSU# 1 in Bath, Maine.


