# **Safe-Guarding Your Children**

In our assembly on Monday, we discussed how the children can keep themselves safe after school and indeed at anytime. The children had quite a bit to say about the subject! The main messages were:

#### Stay with your Adult

At the end of the school day, we talked about why children should stay with the adult who has collected them and not run off. Running off is not only dangerous; parents will become very worried.

#### Getting in and out of the Car Safely

The children understood that they should only get in and out of a car on the pavement side; never on the roadside, especially if it is a 'quick' drop off because that's when accidents can more easily happen.

#### What to do if your Adult is late?


The children discussed what they could do to keep themselves safe if their parent is not on the playground at the end of school. We talked about the many reasons that parents

can be a bit late and that the children should try not worry if this happens. They understood that they must go back into school and tell their teacher who will wait with them and make any necessary phone calls. Children must not go home with any other parent or adult (even if they know them really well) and we discussed why this is.



[Parents should telephone the school when they know they might be late. I'm afraid we cannot allow a child to go home with another adult unless we have that parent's specific permission).

# Impetigo Warning

We have had a case of impetigo in school. This is a skin infection that is highly contagious. Anyone can catch it, but it is most common in young children and can often start on the face.

Impetigo starts with red sores or blisters. They quickly burst and may leave crusty, golden-brown patches. The sores can spread quite quickly by the child touching the infected skin. If your child has unexplained sores or blisters please take them to see the doctor straight away. The treatment is usually an antibiotic cream and your child must stay away from school and away from contact with other children until the blisters have completely dried up and scabbed over.

Please help us to keep your own and other children safe from infection by actring quickly if you suspect that an infection may be present.

This is a very ancient custom that is rarely done today. The word "wassail" comes from the Anglo-Saxon phrase "waes hael", which means 'good health'. Originally, the wassail was a drink made of mulled ale, curdled cream, roasted apples, eggs, cloves, ginger, nutmeg and sugar.
