On Friday, September 6th, Villa history was changed forever. The entire student body, staff, and even the Sisters of St. Casimir attended the opening Mass for this school year.

This year was different and more special because it was also the grand opening of Villa's new Performing Arts Center. You may be wondering, how much did this actually cost? Where did the money come from? Why is it that it took so long to build?

This reporter had the absolute pleasure of interviewing Mrs. McDonald, Villa's Director of Institutional Advancement. Her job is to work to improve Villa in any way she can and ensure that we have a sufficient learning environment. One of the main focuses of her work, for the past few years was to work alongside the sisters to build the Performing Arts Center for Villa.

"The school actually did a feasibility study years ago, which basically looks at the people in a certain area and says, 'Can

we do this?' So Villa brought in a company, and they interviewed a lot of people."

She further explained that the company came back with the report and said that raising the money to build would be difficult. The Board of Directors and the Sisters of St. Casimir were determined. "When Mr. Kardish came on board, the Sisters talked to him and said, 'The girls deserve this. Our girls have to have this. We want to make this happen. We'll give you the first million dollars to get you started.'"

This was what jump started the construction process for this building. The Sisters have been trying to make this happen for over two decades. Mr. Kardish saw the determination and excitement from the Sisters, so he did what he could to help them as soon as possible.

"The Sisters were so interested in the arts. Overall they're interested in finding and developing those talents of the students... This has been in process for over twenty years."

The PAC is such an improvement from the gymnasium in ways that many people might not know. It holds exactly 607 people, the stage is three times larger than

the one in the gym, and you can hear everything as well in the back row as you could if you were seated in the front. That is because of the wooden sound panels on the sides and on the ceiling of the audience space. The PAC can be used for many other events besides Performing Arts; assemblies, graduation practice, forensics, and so much more!

There have been many uses for this fabulous space already, including this year's Ring Day mass, and visits from guest speakers. Additionally, Villa put on an original show "The Best of Broadway: A Musical Cabaret." It has been described as a collection of popular Broadway favorites, as well as music from previous Villa productions. Filled with captivating choreography and magical melodies, Villa Drama participants graced the stage in the Performing Arts Center, welcoming the audience to the brand new space.

Coming soon to the Performing Arts Center is Villa's Spring production of "Legally Blonde!" Follow Elle on her journey to Harvard University, where she finds a second chance to rediscover love. Auditions and casting are over and we could not be more excited to begin this process.
