LETTER FROM The Head of School

Why did I choose MPFS? When you interview for a new position in education, maybe more so than in other fields, one assesses the fit of the institution for them as much as the other way around. First impressions can be very powerful, both for the better and the worse. I had never really spent any time in Media, despite living only eight miles away, and I had never stepped foot on campus. When I applied for the new head of school position, I took a drive to see what the commute would be like and I thought the campus was beautiful.

The second part of the interview process involved spending a few hours on campus on a Saturday. I was then able to see the inside of this beautiful little school and I developed an immediate affinity for it. This same day, as I toured campus, even without children present, it was clear to me as I went from room to room that this is a school that is child-centered and innovative; you see it wherever you look.

The last part of the interview process involved spending a full day on campus while school was in session. It was on that day that it became obvious to me how much the students love this school, feel safe here, and want to learn here.

DEVELOPMENT UPDATE: The Friends Collaborative

Media-Providence Friends School is one of the founding members of The Friends Education Equity Collaborative, a Special Purpose Entity LLC formed in 2016 to secure tax credits offered through Pennsylvania's popular EITC and OSTC tax credit programs.

The EITC and OSTC programs were previously only open to corporate donors, but with the formation of organizations like The Collaborative, **both individuals and businesses now have the opportunity to receive tax credits while supporting schools like MPFS.**

Our partner, the Friends Collaborative, has credits available on a revolving schedule throughout the year. For you or your business this means you can help provide more financial aid dollars for MPFS and our 19 partner Friends schools. Individual or business donors who pay \$3,000 or more in state taxes can direct a portion of their tax dollars to financial aid for Friends schools through the Friends Collaborative within the PA EITC program, and receive a tax credit to offset 90% of the donation.



**\$10,000 gift costs the donor less than \$1,000 out-of-pocket.
A \$3,000 gift (the minimum required) costs less than \$300 out-of-pocket.**

What does this look like for my donation?

EXAMPLE:

Donor's PA Tax Liability	\$9,000
Invested Amount to Friends Collaborative	\$10,000
PA Tax Credit for that investment.....	\$9,000
(K1 for tax credits sent in March)	
New Tax Liability	\$0
Out of Pocket Cost	\$1000
Federal Charitable Deduction	\$1000
If tax rate is 30% +/- net federal benefit is \$300	
\$1000 out of pocket - \$300 federal benefit = \$700 net out of pocket cost.	

I am considering it for my business how does that work? Consider participating through The Collaborative and save applying to the state for credits. We've got that part covered and tax credits available for you to use. Or you can participate with The Collaborative for *additional PA tax liability not covered by your EITC - OSTC application to the state.* More tax credits for your business!

PROFILE IN PHILANTHROPY: Nancy Fitts Donaldson

A child's first experience with school sets the tone for how they feel about learning for the rest of their lives, as it did with our dear departed Friend Nancy Fitts Donaldson '37.

Nancy was a kind, generous and loyal alum of the school, a 2010 Murry Engle Lauser Cornerstone Award for Outstanding Service recipient, an 1876 Society planned giving member, a former Trustee, a member of Willistown Meeting and a strong advocate for Friends education. Born into a Quaker

supervised and evaluated Swarthmore College student teachers for many years. Nancy is a past committee member of Friends Central School and served for six years on the Board of the Pennsylvania Association of Private Academic Schools (PAPAS - now the Commission for Accreditation under the Pennsylvania Association of Independent Schools - PAIS). There she sat on six visiting committees in evaluating other schools.

Nancy's relationship with MPFS was a long one, beginning as a student in the 1930's. Her first years at Media Friends School (as the school was known when Nancy attended) were spent at the Gayley Street location with her sister Ellen Fitts Millick. Then she moved to the little schoolhouse at our current location from 3rd through 6th grade. Although the campus and name have changed since her student days, the essential MPFS experience remains the same. In an interview a few years back, Nancy said, "As an alumna of Media Friends School, I want to see MPFS thrive to offer the same wonderful start in life that I received as a child."

As was the case when Nancy attended, children still gather weekly to attend Meeting for Worship. Staff and students adhere to principles of respect, peace, tolerance, and community. Students encounter a vibrantly diverse student body

and caring teachers with whom they connect deeply. They are immersed in a transformative program that fosters curiosity and creativity, hones critical thinking and communication skills, cultivates character and compassion, and nurtures their spiritual aspects. This education is what Nancy held so dear to her heart.

When Nancy was asked what strikes her about MPFS now, she said: "The look of MPFS is what delights me when I walk on the campus. I revel in all the very positive changes such as the 1st and 2nd grade building, the terrace, the refurbished little schoolhouse where I attended... and especially the smiling faces of the children and the warm greeting I always receive from everyone I meet."

Nancy was a tremendous support for the Board of Trustees providing unassuming wisdom and levity during meetings. She assisted Heads of School with her great knowledge of Quaker education, and was a valuable asset to the Administrative Team at MPFS. She understood the significance of a strong, values-infused, educational program and the importance of supporting that program both financially and through volunteerism. Her experience, advice, and humor were spot on. Nancy Fitts Donaldson was someone all of us looked up to and respected for many years and she will be greatly missed by the MPFS community.



When I decided to take a risk in my career and move to Philadelphia, I had to ensure my family had a smooth transition and that included my then 6th grader.


