

Head's letter

Welcome to this edition of King's Colours. I hope that everyone is excited about the Royal visit: we are extremely fortunate to be honoured in this way and we are all hoping for a splendid



day. This continues to be a year of celebration and it is difficult to keep track of all the activities occurring to celebrate our 500th anniversary. Despite the onset of examinations this term, there are still many things happening and the Kingsmac roses should be blooming for the first time in the new flowerbeds at Cumberland Street as you are reading this newsletter. I hope that it continues to be a momentous year for all.

The Spring Term was very busy for a number of reasons, most of all because of the admissions season. Since Christmas, the energy of many staff and prospective parents has been directed towards securing places at King's for the coming academic year. The number of enquiries for all divisions was very high and it was at a record level in the Boys' Division. This demand has been turned into places and we have had to run an extra form at 13+ to deal with it. Another class has also been arranged for the Junior Division to cope with the requirement for more pupils in the Infants Department. This will bring the total number of pupils in the 3-7 age range up to a steady state of about 138 pupils. It is amazing to think that this vibrant section of King's did not exist five years ago. It is quite clear that King's is responding well to the demands of the new century and that our style of education is much sought after.

ROYALVISIT: JULY24

There could not be a more fitting way for King's to celebrate 500 years of education in Cheshire than to have a Royal Visit and we are all delighted that the Queen has agreed to visit the school on Wednesday 24 July 2002. His Royal Highness, The Duke of Edinburgh, will accompany her. This is the start of their visit to the North of England as part of Her Majesty's Jubilee celebrations prior to opening the Commonwealth Games.

Her Majesty will be shown examples of educational life in 1502 when the school was founded, 1952 when she became Queen, and 2002. The Silk Heritage Centre has kindly agreed to help with this venture, which is a celebration for Macclesfield as well as the school. She will meet a number of pupils who will talk to her about the school and its history.

His Royal Highness will meet several pupils also and we are hoping to show him how successful we have been with the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme. King's has a reputation for outdoor pursuits and members of the Fulcrum Challenge Group, who recently visited China and Mongolia, will be present to tell him of their adventures. He will also meet pupils who have made significant contributions to life in the community as well as at King's.

Representatives of all of Cheshire will be present to mark this wonderful day and both Her Majesty and His Royal Highness will see aspects of life in the county in marquees sited on the Cumberland Street cricket field. The displays have been designed with a specific concept in mind so that our visitors can sample the variety of Cheshire life. The three themes are: Business, Learning and Rural (involving agriculture, the countryside and food production). Although the Royal Couple will only spend an hour at King's, they will certainly get a real feel for life in this part of the world. This will be a very special day in the school's history.

In the Footsteps of Shackleton

This year's Professor Tylecote Lecture was delivered in March by Dr Stephen Venables (left), one of the greatest British post-war mountaineers.

> The first Briton to reach the summit of Everest without oxygen in 1988, Venables came to King's to relate his expedition to retrace the epic journey of Sir Ernest Shackleton across the sea, mountains and glaciers of South Georgia in 1916 to ensure the rescue of the crew of his ship Endurance.

An award winning author, Dr Venables proved to be a highly entertaining and authoritative speaker and he illustrated his lecture with a wealth of superb photographs.

Guys and Dolls

This year's Junior production of *Guys* and *Dolls* was another great success from the Lea/Aspinwall directing partnership.

King's Singtenary

Music has always been an essential ingredient in the life of King's and to celebrate the Quincentenary a new school hymn has been written by Mr Roger Newton, who taught Classics at the school for many years, and composed by Director of Music, Andrew Green.

Also commissioned for the Quincentenary, a new anthem *Clap your Hands* was composed by former School Captain and Organ Scholar, Thom Petty. This was first performed on Founders' Day. The new hymn will be sung at the last assembly of each term.

Concert for Uganda

In February, the King's Big Band and the Training Band put on a concert for the general public in the Cumberland Street Hall. Peripatetic music teacher and King's Former Pupil, Gareth Brown, was the inspiration behind the event which raised £1500 to allow members of Altrincham Baptist Church to go to Jinja in Uganda for two weeks in February. The group worked mainly on basic health matters with the local community.

King's Partnership with Tytherington Club

As part of a desire to be more involved with the community, King's is setting up a partnership with the Tytherington Club, one of the most prestigious names in Macclesfield. Plans are at an early stage but more details will be available for our next issue. The idea is that the partnership arrangement should benefit both the school and the club which means there will be advantages for King's parents and pupils.

Colts sevens victories

The U14 sevens side (below) recently won the prestigious Warwick School tournament with a powerful display of running rugby against the cream of schools' talent nationwide. It was a onesided final as King's Worcester were defeated 46-10. The U14 side has lost only one game during their 15-a-side season, whch bodes well for the first team in the near future.

The U15 team beat seven sides to win the Cheshire county tournament, scoring 201 points and conceding only 10.

Several ceremonies of varied significance took place on the day. Mr Perriss rang the old school bell that was recently restored on the cricket pavilion at Cumberland Street and the Rt. Hon. conducted by Mrs Beesley, produced one of their finest performances. The new school song and anthem were performed for the first time in public and Mr Bromley-Davenport, the Chairman of the Governors, unveiled a memorial plaque that is to be placed in the
