May I wish you a happy, successful (and slightly quieter) 2003.



HITTING THE HIGH NOTES

King's Foundation Choir reach BBC finals

Things keep getting better and better for the Foundation Choir. Their performance during the Royal Visit showed that they are a class act. This was confirmed at a Jubilee Concert for Macclesfield schools and at the magnificent Bridgewater Hall concert last term. Now they have reached the finals of a BBC competition and are rated among the three best young choirs in the country. After being selected as one of the finalists in The Songs of Praise Choir of the Year Competition, they were filmed by the BBC in a small concert at the school. Even more excitingly, they learned just before Christmas that they have reached the final three and will appear on television

and a certificate for her performance in her GCSE Music examination. Rebecca passed nine GCSEs, with eight A* and one A grade, and her mark in Music was the best out of 16,000 entries in the entire country. (The award is for the top mark in the whole Music group of syllabuses and not just for the one examination.) 


Showcase

October's Art Exhibition at King's was the last of 24 under the inspired direction of Peter Seddon and he ended his curatorship with a flourish. For this Quincentenary exhibition, a testimonial to his belief in art education and his passion for his subject, he showcased the work of past pupils who have forged successful careers for themselves. It would be difficult to find any area of art which was not represented. There were traditional paintings and Hollywood film sets by Jonathan McInstry, fashion and textiles by Tom Pike and Nina Thompson, video installations by Jonathan Biddulph and even an interactive computer programme by Peter Jones.

Also on show were works by some of the highly talented staff at King's. Peter Seddon himself showed ceramic pieces, demonstrating why he has been such an inspiration to pupils in his time at King's. Debbie Inman, Robin Hidden, Michael Patey-Ford, Stephen Coyne, Hazel Hunter and Tony Browne displayed a range of textile, painting, illustration and photographic works.

A highlight of the show was work by current students inspired by a recent visit to Florence, Venice and Lake Garda. They produced works in paint, embroidery, clay, glass, wire and digital media, which were displayed alongside a collection of poems written on the visit. The students were delighted to be able to exhibit in such a high calibre exhibition and their work stood up formidably alongside the professionals. With talent like this, pupils at King's will surely continue to make a strong impact on the world of art.





Sir Alex's master class

Who better to advise King's footballers than the manager of Manchester United? Sir Alex Ferguson visited the school in November and met the girls and juniors who play on the school football teams. In an entertaining question and answer session he revealed the secret of success:

'Be good at what you do. Don't be a part-timer. Always try and be as good as you can at whatever you do... If you want to be a top player you must practise, practise and practise.'

His words obviously helped inspire the Girls' Division teams. The Under 13 football team qualified for the finals of the Coca Cola Cup; the 5-a-side Year 7 team won their next tournament, taking them through to the Midlands Area Finals in January.

County rugby selection


