Head's letter

This is a very exciting time as the new Sixth Form Centre is under construction to give pupils stateof-the-art facilities for the pinnacle of their school career. More details of this project are to be



found late on in this newsletter. As well as this, the exceptionally impressive A Level results from last year have been bettered this summer. Perusing The Times and Daily Telegraph in August showed that, by one measure or another at this level, King's outperformed all the independent co-educational schools in Manchester and every independent school in East Cheshire. It is then no surprise that we now find ourselves in great demand, with the numbers in the King's Foundation being at their highest in all my time here. We could not have had a better start to the year and I hope you enjoy reading these pages.

A LEVEL BONANZA

Well, we thought last year's academic results (a 10% increase in A/B grades over the previous record) were stunning but this year's are even more remarkable. In yet another new record at A Level, King's has achieved a 100% pass rate, with 73% of the grades at A or B. No fewer than 38% of the results awarded were As.

There were some truly outstanding individual performances too. Nick Petty netted half a dozen top grades: three As in A Level Economics, Chemistry and Mathematics, and three more in AS Physics, History and General Studies. Katherine Harrison and Elizabeth Conway were both among the top five students in the country in their A Level Biology exams, as was Lily Dunlop in Art and Design (pictured right). Nine students obtained four A grades at A Level and 25 achieved three A grades or better. At GCSE, 53% of the grades were A* or A and an A*-C pass rate of 97% was recorded. Stars were James Fox (ten A* grades) and Emily Middleton (nine A* grades). In all, 29 students – almost one in five pupils – collected straight A*/A grades.

Calling No 11

So long

Five members of the teaching staff retired at the end of last term. Between them, they made a massive contribution to the school. Keith Perriss arrived 31 years ago and became Head of Foundation PE, Senior Master and Chairman of the Common Room. Chris Buckland and Mike Hart both joined King's 27

years ago. Chris was Head of Biology and also taught Psychology; Mike was Head of Geography and involved with athletics and rugby. Bill Beatson and Anne Cohen arrived in the 1990s. Bill, Principal of the Boys' Division, went on to become Principal in charge of Staff Development; Anne Cohen was Senior Subject Teacher for Physics and Head of Year at the Girls' Division. All five are all staying in the vicinity, so we hope to see a lot of them during long and active retirements.

Expanding options

Last term it was a taster in the form of a Japanese Club, trialled in the Boys' and Girls' Divisions to gauge the likely popularity of learning the language. This term, Japanese has become part of the Sixth Form curriculum, with students able to study it during General Studies time. An AS in Government and Politics is now also an option in the Upper Sixth – all part of the school's drive to broaden the education on offer.



Royal garden tour

There was a royal audience recently for King's Junior gardeners – a reward for their hard work growing plants for 'The Plot'. This prize-winning, Five a Day Fruit and Vegetable Show Garden was a project involving schools across Cheshire, organised by Reaseheath College. When the Duchess of Cornwall toured the garden at the college in Nantwich, pupils were invited to meet her and several from King's helped to form a welcome party. Rebecca lons and Rose Adams showed the royal visitor some exotic coffee, banana and ginger plants in the Asian section and Rose's mother, Sophie, was also presented to Her Royal Highness. Sophie, a former Reaseheath garden design student, co-ordinated the seed-sowing activities at the school. Junior Division Principal Geoff Shaw praised the partnership with Reaseheath College as an enjoyable and valuable learning experience for the pupils.



Good psychology

It's official – King's students are the tops at Psychology. They have just won the *Good Schools' Guide* award for the best A Level Psychology results at independent schools across the country. A remarkable 93% achieved A or B at A Level in what is Britain's fastest growing academic subject.

Over 90 sixth formers are now studying it at the school and Head of Department Mick Brown attributes Psychology's popularity to the fact that it attracts students from the Arts, Sciences and Humanities. Pictured with Mick are students Ally Barter and Nicola Coveney.

Making a splash

Literally and figuratively, 12 year-old Elizabeth Bell has made a splash in the art world. Competing against over 500 young sculptors nationwide, Elizabeth came first in the 11-13 age group of the National Schools' Sculpture Competition, winning a trophy and golden pebble for herself, and £2,500 for King's Art Department.

The work that so impressed the judges at the final in London is entitled 'Splash'. The theme of the competition was 'Recycling and the Environment' and Elizabeth produced a piece made entirely from garbage. An old bicycle wheel forms the base, while a cascade of water is made up of layers of sweet wrappers. Elizabeth intends Splash to suggest the disturbing impact that mankind is having on the environment and the hope that natural energy can be drawn from water. Remarkably, King's Girls' Division had another finalist in the top six: Jilly Clifford's work was also very highly commended.





Book people

The Junior Division's first ever Book Week was a great success, with impromptu poetry readings by both pupils and staff, visits by parents and gap students and lots of activities. A particular favourite was Character Dressing Up Day, when everyone, even the teachers, came as a favourite character from a book.





A fine performance

Upper Sixth student Sam Lea is feeling pretty pleased with himself: he has obtained Grade 8 in his music exams. This is not too unusual perhaps, but the multi-talented Sixth Former has achieved it in four different areas: piano, oboe, percussion and singing. And, as if this were not enough, they have all been awarded with distinction.

The water run

King's youngest pupils have had a taste of the gruelling daily routine in many Third World countries. In a scheme to raise money for Oxfam, they were sponsored to ferry water to and fro across the playground. It gave them a memorable lesson in the struggle their counterparts in poor countries have just to meet basic needs.



Expedition to Ecuador

After two years raising money (activities ranged from running half marathons to raising and selling cattle), seventeen sixth formers set off for a month in Ecuador. The first week was spent at a small school in the village of Apuella, where they painted murals, built terraced gardens, cleaned roofs and helped teach English, as well as playing football, swimming in the river and learning to dance salsa at the village fiesta. The group then headed into the Andes to trek through cloud forests and volcanoes as acclimatisation for the attempt to climb the 15,500ft Ruminahui volcano. After a brief return through Quito, they

spent three days hacking through forests, rescuing injured dogs and avoiding giant cactus plants in Cotapaxi national park before finally setting off to the volcano. The entire ascent was under blue skies, with fantastic views of Cotapaxi, the world's highest active volcano, as well as eight more snowcapped peaks, and the whole party reached the summit. They then headed east into the Amazon basin for a fourday trek in the rain forest, along with tarantulas and lemon ants. After a day's white-water rafting, the trip ended with a visit to the equator and shopping in South America's biggest market.





You can sense the anticipation and excitement in the air. Work began as soon as school ended in July and is now well under way. The project? A superb £2.5 million development scheme at Cumberland Street. Not only will it provide King's sixth formers with an impressive new home but it will also house various departments and a brand new drama studio. Work is expected to take at least two terms and, all being well, everything should be ready in time for the start of the academic year 2007.

Of course, this is just the latest in a line of major investments which have transformed King's in recent years. At Fence Avenue, the establishment of the Girls' and Junior Divisions was quickly hailed as a remarkable success story, soon followed by the setting up of the Infants' Department, another very popular initiative. The new development at Cumberland Street will ensure that the facilities for students in the Boys' and Sixth Form Divisions are also of the highest standard – as befits a school with over 500 years of tradition.







Silver rose

Only a few years after it was launched to celebrate King's 500th anniversary, the Kingsmacc rose has won a Silver Medal at The Hague Rose Trials. The rose, bred by Fryer's Roses of Knutsford, was chosen from thousands of international entries.

Gareth Fryer recalls Gill Turner, then Vice Principal of the Sixth Form and a keen horticulturalist, arriving at the nursery to choose the new Quincentenary rose. There were several on offer but Gill was captivated by the variegated hybrid in peach, honey and apricot. With Kingsmacc's early success, Fryers now have their sights set on gold.
