RECORD BREAKERS

GCSE and A level students celebrated superb examination results this summer and a new record was set. For the seventh year running there was a 100% pass rate at A level, with an impressive 71% of grades at A/B. Equally impressive were the A-C grades at 92%. There were many notable successes as one quarter of the year group (26 students) gained three straight A grades or better.

The GCSE results broke all previous records, reaching 57.4% A*/A grades. A stunning 25% (47 students) gained nine straight A*/A grades or better and across the whole Foundation there was much to celebrate as 97% of all **GCSEs** were at A*-C grade.

Leading the cheers

No wonder the Girls' Division is doing so well in cheerleading, the country's fastest growing sport: their coach is British champion Rachael Burrows. Already the Cubs team (Years 8 and 9) and the Lions Team (Year 11) have won the national titles at the British Gymnastics of the UK Cheerleading Association's School Championships. Even the youngest team, the Kittens, managed to finish fifth in a competition featuring 150 schools.

Cricket

A very successful cricket season for the Boys' Division was dominated by the Marsden brothers. Head Boy Johnny took four wickets for five runs at Shavington, and was selected to play for Derbyshire at U15 level. His brother Ben (see below), captain of the U13 squad named King's Team of the Year, achieved four centuries (all undefeated) in his matches against Cheadle Hulme, Newcastle, King's Chester and Bury. Retiring coach Geoff Laurence said that was about as many hundreds as he had seen at this level in all his time at King's. Another success story was the boys' U14 side, who came second in the county. Team member Hannah Gradwell also captained the Cheshire U15 Girls XI.





Junior sports

It has been a bumper summer for King's Juniors, with successes across a whole range of sports.

The trampolinists were silver medallists in the National Schools Championships, while the swimmers were Macclesfield Primary Schools Champions. The crosscountry runners won the Macclesfield Primary Schools' Year 3/4 Girls and Year 5/6 Boys and Girls titles and were AJIS U11 Boys Champions, while the athletes won the Macclesfield Primary School title for Boys and Combined teams.

The footballers won the Macclesfield Primary Schools 1A and 1B divisions and the rugby team finished runnersup in the AJIS competition. In netball, the squad won Macclesfield Primary Schools' Division 1, sharing the cup with Upton Priory, while the cricketers reached the final of the Association of Junior Independent Schools North-West Tournament.

Olympic ambitions

Any school would be thrilled to have a pupil with Olympic potential. King's has not one but two contenders for places in Team GB in London 2012.

Girls' Division gymnast Jenni Pinches has already racked up an amazing tally of medals, and this summer she had a foretaste of the unique Olympian atmosphere. In recognition of her outstanding performances in national and international championships this year, she was invited to join other 2012 hopefuls visiting Beijing during the Games. It was a wonderful experience and one she hopes will stand her in good stead in four years time.

Over at the Boys' Division, 14 year-old Elliot Hanson has also had a terrific year, winning a grand slam of junior sailing titles: the World Championships, the National Championships, the Inland Championships and the Nationwide Series in the Gul Topper class. This junior grand slam has never been achieved before (not even by legendary fellow Maxonian Ben Ainslie) and Elliot has been nominated for a Sports Aid grant to enable him to prepare for 2012.
