

A BUMPER CROP OF OXBRIDGE OFFERS

Students and staff are celebrating after King's came out as the top performing school in Cheshire East at both GCSE and A Level, just days after the school enjoyed one of its best ever years for Oxbridge offers.

An incredible 12 students - around 10% of Year 13 - are set to go to England's two oldest universities, with six young men and six women earning Oxbridge offers across a wide range of subjects.

Ruth Roberts said: "This is a stunning set of results from an extremely talented cohort of students. It represents one of the highest Oxbridge success rates for any school in the country."

Cipher Challenge

King's Boys' Division brains recently won the final round of the internationally renowned Southampton University Cipher Challenge. A THINKING CURRICULUM

Our new curriculum, which will be launched in September 2014, places an emphasis on developing pupils' thinking skills and lifelong learning habits. Unlike the pupils described in Hard Times by Charles Dickens as, "vessels ready to have imperial gallons of facts poured into them until full to the brim," we don't want our pupils to be passive, but instead to have lively, enquiring minds, to think carefully about the world around them and to challenge concepts before making up their own minds.



CASE

Cognitive Acceleration through Science Education (CASE) is a programme developed by King's College London - backed up by over 30 years of research - designed to improve students' thinking skills, problem solving skills and their ability to process information and draw conclusions. It has been shown to raise students' cognitive skill levels and GCSE grades by up to 15%. The lessons, which run in Year 7 and 8, require students to solve problems, develop theories and test them, and learn to make accurate conclusions from all forms of data. Students' skills are assessed at the beginning and end of the course and compared against national data. The aim is to develop our students into skilled independent learners who can use the skills they learn in all their subjects. It will also help with the new national curriculum and exam system which puts an emphasis on problem solving.

A Learning Philosophy

In terms of the subjects offered, our new curriculum may not seem dissimilar to our current model. But a curriculum is more than just the subjects pupils study. It is also the way that they study them, and one of the key aspects of our new curriculum is the emphasis on developing pupils as thinkers and learners.

Developing Critical Thinkers

From September, pupils in Year 7 and Year 8 will study a subject called 'Critical Thinking.' Richard Griffiths, Deputy Head (Academic), explains: "This has nothing to do with 'critical' in the negative sense of the word, but instead, it is 'critical' in the sense of 'reasoning' and 'weighing up alternatives.' Critical Thinking as a subject is rather like a mental gym; a way of training the thinking muscles. There is no subject content in the same way as there is for a subject like History or Mathematics. Instead, pupils will carry out a range of tasks which

will develop their higher-order thinking skills such as analysis and evaluation. They will learn how to analyse arguments, reason and spot flaws in other people's reason-ing. These are highly transferable skills which will benefit them in other subjects, will help improve attainment and be an excellent preparation for life."

The new curriculum will also emphasise careful thinking in other subject areas. Both Drama and Religion & Philosophy have embraced a style of teaching called 'Philosophy for Children', which involves the pupils thinking carefully about moral and philosophical issues in the work that they cover and then being able to articulate their ideas

and opinions. In General Science in Years 7 and 8, one period per fortnight will be spent on CASE - Cognitive Acceleration through Science Education – which requires pupils to develop their thinking and reasoning skills through analysis of scientific issues. Evidence suggests that this kind of cognitive acceleration greatly improves pupils' attainment. A strong focus on developing thinking skills in the earlier senior school years, will form excellent foundations that pupils can build on at GCSE and beyond.

Developing Lifelong Learners

Here at King's, we know that we are preparing our pupils for a challenging and changing workplace where it is increasingly important that they are flexible and able to learn and develop new skills at various stages of their lives. It is for this reason that we want to develop young people who are not only good at passing exams, but also

able to take the initiative and learn for themselves. We can do this by planning activities to sit alongside the usual lesson content that will develop pupils' individual learning habits, such as resilience, independence, collaboration, resourcefulness and ability to plan effectively.

This will mean that pupils will become good at learning, rather than just good learners, developing skills that will stand them in good stead as they move on to university and then to the wider world beyond.

King's has had its best ever call-up for representative rugby with an astonishing 29 players from U13 to U18 selected by Cheshire and the District. Two pupils - Will Hodgson (scrum half) and Matt Peakman (flanker) - have both been selected for the North of England U16 rugby squad prior to possible national selection for the England U16 team. Their success is on the back of a gruelling term of rugby in which they represented the school 1st XV, Sale Sharks U16s and Cheshire.

King's U12 team remains unbeaten after nine games, having now scored 364 points and only conceded 40. Guy Mason said: "Half-back pair Remy Miller and Murray Redpath have been superb in a very talented back line, while the back row of James Davis, Ike McCormick and captain Oli Leatherbarrow have been tough terriers. A few brilliant displays from centre Charlie Ward saw him drafted into the A team and it is now a battle between him and flying winger Tom Barker for top points scorer."

Our U11s have also been very successful; their record now stands at 9 wins out of 9, with 350 points scored and fewer than 100 conceded. Wins have been recorded against MGS, Liverpool College (twice), The Grange, Birkenhead Prep, Terra Nova, Kirkham Grammar, Cheadle Hulme and St Ambrose.

"The primary school now has a fully furnished library – thanks to King's! The impact of your generosity is really far reaching. At the formal opening ceremony, the chiefs and the entire community were beyond excitement and the entire town was at a standstill. An embargo was placed on farming for the whole day to enable parents to join in the activities. It was quite an overwhelming occasion even for me, a Ghanaian. I am so grateful for what you have done! Providing hope is one thing, but ultimately we need to see children making more of their lives as a result of a better education."
