

ANOTHER BUMPER YEAR FOR KING'S PUPILS

King's aims to challenge pupils to aspire, work hard and achieve, as well as to develop ambitious and well-rounded individuals. This was very much in evidence over the summer; students taking public examinations received outsanding results whilst pupils throughout the school engaged in a wide range of activities around the globe.

Sixth Formers achieved some of the best A Level results in the country, again securing King's a place in the national league tables for top performing independent schools. More than 80% of all grades were A* - B; 18% were at the top A* grade and 45 students achieved three As or better.

Headmaster Dr Simon Hyde said:
"These are exceptional results born of
the students' and teachers' hard work
and a thirst for intellectual inquiry. I am
delighted that these talented young men
and women are now going on to fulfil
their dreams at some of the very best
educational institutions in the UK, USA
and Canada."


GCSE students did equally well, achieving 83% of all grades at A* - B and 25% at A*. Pictured above are two students each with ten A*s: Sam Bryning, a school team cricketer and rugby player, hopes his clean sweep of A*s will ultimately lead to a career in the City; North of England hockey star Eleanor Toms also aced all 10 GCSEs with A*s.

Not to be outdone, Junior pupils enjoyed considerable success, especially in Key Stage 2 assessments. The national expectation for children of this age is

Level 4, with Level 5 for higher achievers. As well as 100% of children at King's achieving Level 4 in Reading, Writing, Maths and Science, an incredible third of the year group achieved Level 6 in one or more areas of Reading, Writing and Maths.

Of the 58 children in Year 6, 19% achieved Level 6 in Mathematics, 17% Level 6 in Reading and 14% Level 6 in Writing. These compare with the national average of 1%.







The School has been a hive of activity over the summer. The sports pavilion at Westminster Road has been completed, showers and toilets refurbished, various departments redecorated on both sites, and the Admissions Department relocated to Fence Avenue. We have also hosted a number of pre-planning consultation events on the School's 2020 Vision. Many thanks to our dedicated team of support staff who either oversee or complete this important work.

The consultation events were well attended and around 150 responses were received via the feedback forms, email and website. The planning application for the new School has now been submitted and we eagerly await the outcome. Timeframes are difficult to determine, but we will have a much better idea once we receive the planning decision. An overview of the School's plans is available on our website. We will bring you news of our progress in future editions of *King's Colours*.

The holidays saw the launch of a new King's learning initiative, the Headmaster's Summer Challenge. As part of our commitment to developing lively and enquiring minds, pupils in Years 7-9 were invited to tackle one of a choice of tasks, using the summer break as an opportunity to learn outside the normal school routines. The tasks allowed different talents to flourish and were open-ended so that students could be as arty or as technological (or both) as they wanted. I was delighted by the number of entries from both of our Senior Divisions. All of the tasks were attempted by at least one pupil and there were some remarkable responses, from the very academic to the more artistic. Several pupils wrote about their choice of 'man or woman of the century'; some painted or drew scenes from their holiday destinations; there were poems, drawings, essays, sketches, PowerPoint presentations, photographs, posters and even hand-made postcards. Some students learned something new (from Maths to knitting to dry-stone walling) and some wrote reviews of books they had read. The entries ranged in topic from Angela Merkel to the kinematic variables of parabolic trajectories in a vacuum. I would like to congratulate all of the participants for the quality and imagination of their entries - all will receive a Principal's Commendation and the winners will receive a prize.

Congratulations also to our public examination candidates, especially members of last year's Upper Sixth who maintained record results at A Level.



ICT Initiatives

Development continues apace in the world of ICT at King's. Parents will now be familiar with the Parent Portal, where assessments and reports are published to all Senior pupils. Parents are also now able to view their child's rewards and have the ability to directly contact their child's tutor via the Portal. The Parent Portal will shortly become the one-stop-shop for current parents as all letters and key documents will be published in this area. Future initiatives include the introduction of the Pupil Portal, enabling pupils themselves access to their own academic record as well as their accrued number of house points. Pupils are also now able to access their timetable via their Outlook email calendar ensuring they have no excuse for not knowing the room or what lesson is next!



On the hardware front, the school is currently testing one of the newest LED boards in the Art Department, and feedback from both pupils and staff is extremely positive. The Sixth Form are soon to receive new Microsoft Surface devices to assist with their independent study periods in the Sixth Form Centre. These devices will, in the first instance, be used by pupils following the Global Perspectives course as part of their Year 12 studies. WiFi provision in this area has also been extended and improved in order to facilitate the school's upcoming drive to encourage pupils to bring their own device into school. In the Infant & Junior Division, pupils now all have access to iPads both in the Lower and Upper Junior areas and staff are discovering ever more exciting Apps to assist their already diverse methods of teaching.

Bolivia

A party of twenty students and four staff recently returned from a month long trip to Bolivia, during which they visited the Amazon jungle, taught English in a remote school, trekked in the Andes and swam with rare river dolphins.

The young adventurers quickly discovered why Bolivia is such a fascinating country to explore, flying into the Bolivian capital La Paz, one of the highest capital cities in the world offering a sprawling cityscape cupped into a bowl among the mountains. After two days acclimatising and exploring, the Global Challenge team split into two groups to take their grand tour of the Andes, the giant salt flats, the teeming jungle and the colourful river basin.

At the heart of their trip was a community project helping a tiny school in the Bolivian outback. As well as building a new toilet block and giving the school a facelift, King's students provided English lessons for the local children whilst they themselves learnt about the life of rural children in the developing world.

Next on the itinerary was a 5,300 metre climb up the Pico Austria in the Andean foothills, before visiting the giant white salt flats; the remains of a prehistoric inland lake, framed by a smoking volcano, geysers and hot springs. The students' stay even included a night in a hotel made from salt. One of the many highlights of the trip was the great brown river and the chance to swim with pink river dolphins, see monkeys, anacondas and caymans.



Clowning glory

Oliver Rushton has won The British Federation of Festivals North West Championships for Speech & Drama with a piece that took three minutes to deliver but six months to perfect.

The Year 9 pupil, who had already been crowned the Alderley Edge Festival champion, portrayed the touching Shakespearean clown Lancelot Gobbo to win the Championship against fellow festival winners from across the region.

Musical duo play with the best

A duo of talented King's Girls' musicians have played with two of the country's top concert performers this summer. King's jazz saxophonist, flautist and pianist Alex Clarke played with multi award-winning jazz star Amy Roberts and her quintet at the 2015 Pershore Jazz Festival. Alex, who practises for two hours each day, said: "It was the most exciting and rewarding performance opportunity I could possibly have hoped for."

Violinist Georgina Bloomfield, (pictured left) who is just 12, played two concerts with the National Children's Orchestra of Great Britain and Nicola Benedetti at the Royal Concert Hall in Glasgow and at Manchester's Bridgewater Hall.

Jo Beesley, Senior Music teacher, said: "Both young women are quite exceptional and will be the envy of thousands of older musicians to have played at such a young age with these professional performers on the world stage."

Both young women ultimately want to study at the Royal Northern College of Music and pursue careers in music.





GETTING INTO GOOD HABITS

Richard Griffiths, Deputy Head (Academic), on a recent learning initiative

Martin Luther King said, "Intelligence plus character is the goal of true education", and that is also our goal at King's. Parents who have visited our Senior Divisions recently may have noticed the displays which bedeck the reception areas, listing the 'King's Learning Habits'. Hopefully, some parents too will have heard their sons or daughters referring to them. If you haven't heard of them, or want to know more, then hopefully my answers to the questions below will tell you what you need to know.

What are the learning habits?

About 20 years ago, Professor Guy Claxton first created a list of the 'learning habits' which good students needed to develop. Sometimes known as the four 'R's, these are: Resourcefulness, Reflectiveness, Reciprocity and Resilience. These habits also have further sub-groups of skills within them. Based on Claxton's research and in the true spirit of an independent school, we decided to create our own King's Learning Habits. These are:

Questioning

Having lively, enquiring minds which can ask good questions and then investigate them, as well as being prepared to question and challenge ideas. This also represents creative thinking and imagination.



Reasoning

Being careful, methodical and logical. This is the cognitive element of learning.

Collaborating

Working together to help us learn; teamwork and the skills of listening and empathy. The social element to learning.

Resilience

Emotional toughness in dealing with situations when things don't go our way or where we find things hard.


Reflecting

Being able to learn from mistakes and reflect on successes and failures to continually improve, and to plan ahead. This is the strategic element of learning.

The King's Learning Habits very much build on the approach in our Infant & Junior Division, where our new Learning Challenge Curriculum cultivates similar investigative learning habits, giving us a coherent approach to learning throughout the School.

How will the educational experience change for pupils?

Last year, we introduced the learning habits in Year 7. This means that, as well as delivering our usual subject content, teachers also planned to target some or all of the habits by delivering lessons which made the pupils think more; challenged them more; gave them more independence and choice and allowed them more opportunities for collaboration. At the end of the academic year, Year 7 pupils took part in the Learning Challenge, where they worked together over three days to research and prepare a presentation answering the question 'How Can We Save the World'? During the three days, all five of the learning habits were actively developed.




This year, we have introduced the learning habits throughout the rest of the Senior Divisions. Our introduction of the Global Perspectives IGCSE with Year 12 will help to embed these habits in the Sixth Form, as it is a qualification which encourages independent research, reflection and group work. It is, of course, in the Sixth Form where this is the most valuable as students prepare for the demands of higher education and the workplace.

What is the effect of the learning habits?

Think about the way that elite athletes use the gym to target particular muscle groups so that when they play competitively their performance is enhanced. We are developing the key learning muscles in our students, so that they can become more engaged, confident and independent: in short, happier about their learning. This should then have a positive effect on their general performance, including (of course) in examinations, but it is also about more than that. We know that the habits we are developing will not just help students whilst at school, but also in life and in a workplace where they will need to be equipped with skills that allow them to adapt to changes in the workplace and become a 'lifelong learner'.

Regional Selections

Five King's girls have been successful in being selected for the JRPC (Junior Regional Performance Centre) Tier 1 Tournaments. Both Eleanor Toms and Annabel Hebb have been selected for the U17 age group with Allana Buckingham as a non-travelling reserve; Olivia Moores has been selected for the U15 age group and Natalie Stevens as a goal keeper for the U16 age group. They will all represent the Manchester Pumas in two tournaments this autumn where they compete against girls from all over the North of England. From these tournaments they can potentially be selected for JRPC Tier 2 and National Age Groups (England).

Two King's boys have also progressed to the JRPC tournament - Sam Buckingham and Archie Phillips have both been selected to represent the North West. If they perform well, the next step for both will be North of England selection.

A number of girls have been through a rigorous regional selection process for the imminent Cheshire County netball season. Six girls progressed through to the final trial with the following girls being selected to represent Cheshire: Izzy Moores (U12 Development Squad), Mollie Pettit (U14 Academy Squad), Ellie Morten (U14 Development Squad), and Antonia Bianchi (U16 Academy Squad).

Cheerleaders in Team UK

King's girls will make up the spine of Team UK for the World Cheerleading Championships in Berlin from November 19 to 23. Beth Burrows, Rowena Moores, Sophie Jackson and Fiona Cornish have been selected for the senior squad, while Antonia Bianchi, Izzy Stevens and Susie Moores have been chosen for the junior squad.

Cricket successes

Three King's cricket teams reached this year's age group finals of The Cheshire Cup. Both the U12 and U14 teams finished as runners up, whilst the King's U13 squad (pictured below) won and retained the Cheshire U13 Cup.

After another successful season playing representative cricket for Cheshire, Joey Chong was one of only three Cheshire players selected for an England U12 cricket training day held at Loughborough Cricket Academy with some of the best young players in the country.



Youngest ever qualifier

Year 9 pupil Remy Miller has qualified for the Champions' Finals of the Junior European Open, to be held in Spain. The event brings together the top British and European Juniors (U18) at one of the toughest tests in junior golf. Remy, 13, is the youngest ever qualifier in the 23 year history of the Championship. Past junior qualifiers include Justin Rose, at age 14.



Great start to rugby season

King's 1st XV beat Leeds Grammar School 52-5 in the first round of the Champions Trophy, with Harry Blackwell scoring 5 tries against last year's finalists. During the summer break, 51 boys, 7 staff and a physio took part in a week's pre-season training at Limerick University to improve strength and conditioning.
