

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
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The Clover | Volume 1, Issue 1, Winter

Introducing *The Clover.* Originally coined by St. Patrick, the clover symbolizes the number three and the Holy Trinity based on its famous three green leaves. The Irish considered it lucky, especially when found with an additional leaf.

Our alumnae magazine will share its name with this plant for numerous reasons. Mercy McAuley is a school created from its legacy of Mother of Mercy and McAuley High Schools. Together, our three schools are symbolized within the iconic three leaves of the plant. Women Who Inspire

On October 3, 2019, over 300 people gathered in the Auditorium of Mercy McAuley to hear six incredible women impart their wisdom based on their life stories. Dr. Robin Thompson Arthur (Mercy '82), Nikki Hudepohl (McAuley '92), Joyce A. Kasee-Mills (Mercy '03), Pam McLaughlin (McAuley '87), Tyra Patterson, and Dr. Jane K. Sojka were nominated by our alumnae and hand-picked by a committee based on their stories of overcoming adversity and becoming successful and well-respected in their fields.

Attendees were inspired by the tenacity, strength, and bravery of these women.

Whether it was stepping into major leadership roles, starting a business, or overcoming an incredible obstacle, these six women encouraged the audience to take chances, speak up

The Story of \\\\C\\

On September 24, 1827, the feast day of Our Lady of Mercy, Catherine McAuley opened a house on Baggot Street in Dublin, Ireland, to shelter and educate impoverished women and girls. Three years later, she and two friends of hers became the first Sisters of Mercy. From then on, all Mercy institutions around the world, including all Mercy schools, hospitals, social service entities, and all Associates, volunteers, staff, students and sisters celebrate "Mercy Day" on September 24 to commemorate that historic day, and to pay homage to Catherine McAuley.

"I believe it is reminder to us all that every single one of us is called to be people of mercy to our world so much in need of love, peace, forgiveness, as well as the practical needs of food and shelter," writes Sr. Nancy Merkle, RSM, of the commemorative day. Both Mother of Mercy and McAuley High Schools have long observed Mercy Day, but with time, the celebrations grew from a simple Mass to an all-out festival. Mercy McAuley joined in on that celebration this past September (next page), similarly to how both McAuley and Mother of Mercy High Schools celebrated in recent years.

However, Mercy Day is not the only way Mercy McAuley celebrates and honors our Irish roots and Catherine's legacy. Two times a week, our students attend "Den," a bell similar to homeroom or "families" at the legacy schools, consisting of 4-5 students from each grade. In Den, the students can meet new people, grow in the sisterhood of Mercy McAuley, participate in service activities and collections for local charities, and reflect on the five Mercy Values that Catherine McAuley exemplified: Faith, Compassion, Service, Leadership, and Excellence. To further connect Den to our history, each group is named after a street or place in Dublin. Listed here are the names of the Dens with a map of each location in Dublin:

Alumnae Celebrate Mercy Day

The school community celebrated Mass and invited the Mother of Mercy and McAuley classes of 1969 to join as special guests. During the opening procession, one representative from each legacy school carried in teapots—symbolic of Catherine McAuley's famous quote on hospitality, "A comfortable cup of tea," before sitting with their classmates at the front of the Auditorium. During Mass, the Mercy McAuley Vocal Ensemble led the songs, The Circle of Mercy, The Our Father, and the Suscipe, before leading all students in the Mercy McAuley Alma Mater and Fight Song to close Mass.

After Mass, the classes of 1969 toured the building and gathered at a reception while the students participated in lots of fun games and activities to get to know one another better and to celebrate Mercy Day. With chalk drawings, flag football, watching a movie, and learning more about Catherine McAuley's life, the students had a busy and educational afternoon.

The day closed with a pep rally in the gym in which the faculty and staff surprised the students with a flash mob, consisting of songs like, *Girls Just Wanna Have Fun* and *Can't Stop the Feeling* before finishing with a choreographed dance to *Old Town Road*. It was a big hit with the students.

FAQs about the Annual Fund at Mercy McAuley

What is the Annual Fund?

It is our annual giving program that provides Mercy McAuley with essential income because tuition alone cannot pay for all the school's expenses. The Annual Fund helps to make up the gap between tuition and what it actually costs to educate each student.

Who gives to the Annual Fund?

We have alumnae, parents of alumnae, current parents, and special friends of Mercy McAuley who give each year to the Annual Fund.

Where does the money go?

The Annual Fund supports many things including tuition assistance (both academic scholarships and financial aid) as well as technology, salaries, and general operating costs that you might not think about such as electric bills and building maintenance.

Do small gifts really make a difference?

Of course! Not everyone can give \$500 or \$1000 each year. All contributions have a tremendous impact, and no one should feel that their gift is too small. For those who think they cannot afford to contribute, a \$20 gift equals four cups of coffee at Starbucks or two lunches at Chipotle!

- 2. **Gather a committee**—Include classmates who may have run around in different circles.
- 3. Choose a date. Choose a location.
 We encourage you to have your reunion here at Mercy McAuley, in the cafeteria. There is no rental fee. There are a limited number of Saturday nights available in the fall so please contact Kelsey Niehauser, Alumnae Engagement Coordinator, to see which dates are available.

- 4. **Decide whether or not to include spouses and guests**—Indicate this on the invitation. You might also consider having more than one event (i.e. girls' night, picnic for family members, etc.).
- 5. When deciding on a price, make sure it covers all expenses: postage, invitations, fees, food, drinks, DJ, memory books, and/or decorations. You are encouraged to donate extra money to the Annual Fund or alumnae legacy scholarships as a class gift.
- 6. Send invitations and/or promote the reunion through social media.

 Mercy McAuley provides the list of graduates in an Excel document upon meeting with Kelsey, Alumnae Engagement Coordinator, in-person.

 We can also provide mailing labels. Mercy McAuley will promote reunions through the alumnae Facebook page and/or e-newsletters. Although Facebook is a great way to spread the word, recently some classes have not sent invitations and relied solely on social media. We want to make sure that no alumna feels left out of a reunion. Not everyone is on social media, and reunion planners should be sensitive to that.
- 7. Let Mercy McAuley know if you want to invite Sisters of Mercy and/or former teachers.
- 8. Allow enough time for a Mercy McAuley representative to proof the invitation (an extra set of eyes always helps).


Mary Grace (MG) Greiner

Consumer Science Teacher

"I have been growing tomatoes and other vegetables for 40 years. It is so rewarding to walk outside in the summer and pick dinner! My husband and I each have our own vegetable gardens now and we like to see whose tomatoes do best! Besides tomatoes, we grow beans, kale, Swiss chard, butternut squash, basil, cucumbers, peppers, strawberries, raspberries and beets. And, we don't have a ton of space!


Once tomatoes start ripening, they come in faster than we can eat them or give them to friends and family. So, I wash some of them and put them whole into plastic bags and into the freezer. Then, all winter when I make soup, chili, stews, goulash, etc., I plop four or five of them in the pot. After they cook and add their garden-fresh flavor to the soup, I just fish out the peels with a pair of tongs. They look and feel like billiards balls when they are frozen, but really add a great dimension of taste!"
