IB Spanish - Theatre Trip

On February14th, IB Spanish students in Year 12 and Year 13 went to Orione theatre in Rome to watch the play 'Siempre Frida', entirely in Spanish. The double objective of the trip was to self-assess their understanding of Spanish in a real context and to explore new cultural horizons.

After the play, the students sounded rather satisfied about their receptive language skills as they all affirmed they could understand a lot, from 80% to 99%! This positive experience has surely helped building more confident linguists, right before their IB Spanish exams.

Regarding the cultural aspect, the students learnt about the world of Mexican artist Frida Kahlo in the target language. They engaged not only with her life but also with her thoughts, which gave them the key to fully comprehend the Frida's production, her legacy to young generations.

In the students' own words:

'Yo pinto eso...los sentimientos que no se ven, los que están detrás de la cara. En el alma.'

This is one of the numerous renowned quotes of probably the most influential artist in Mexican history. Such a profound affirmation highlights Frida Kahlo's passionate nature and the emotively intense events which tainted her life. *Tommaso Borghesi, Year 13 IB Spanish student*

Lego Serious Play

In the Senior School we have been using the <u>Lego Serious Play</u> <u>methodology</u> in Language lessons with a double objective: to explore abstract concepts (content) through concrete 3-D models and to enhance oral language production (skill) through storytelling.

The Lego Serious Play method makes use of the well-known Lego bricks in an innovative way, for each individual to unlock new knowledge and to successfully communicate this knowledge to the other people in the group. The effective use of LSP methodology rests on the following four core steps in the process and adheres to a set of clear principles, both of which have been extensively researched and field-tested.

Step 1: Facilitator poses a question/theme

- Step 2: Individuals build a model in response to the question posed
- Step 3: Individuals tell their story to the rest of the group
- Step 4: Questions and Reflections

Students have responded really well to the challenge in terms of engagement and concentration, with results going beyond expectations and often leading to interesting debates.







For example, with Year 13 IB Spanish we explored the figure of a successful artist in the 21st century. In a few minutes, students built colorful models representing a wide range of characteristics and then described them from varied

perspectives, with equally rich Spanish.

Likewise, in the World Radio Day (13/2), Year 11 pre-IB Italian students represented the concept of communication today, revealing critical thinking skills and powerful storymaking.
