Based on their level of supports needed and readiness for them, students participate in employment, training, and independently living instruction. As ready, students go out into the community for work site and community experiences. These might include a group, independent, or paid work site. It may include safe experiences purchasing, learning about community businesses, exploring community services, and participating in recreation and leisure activities. Supervision is provided unless otherwise specified in programming arranged with parents.</p>	<p>We provide special education services to students in all IDEA identified classification areas. Students have an up-to-date eligibility and an IEP, but have not received their diploma (officially graduated) up to age 22. Students may have participated in their high school graduation ceremony, but did not receive their diploma. We should be contacted if a student dropped out, but is suspected of having a disability or previously had services who are now over age 18 (or past their 12th grade year), but under age 22. We may need time to conduct needed assessments and determine eligibility.
