Math Advantage: Room J-9 from 3:05 to 4:30 pm (M, T, Thurs.)


* Students receive math support from math teachers, but can also work on other subjects. I am there every Tuesday after school.

EL Program at Fletcher Middle School Academic Language Development (ALD)

*This one year class is designed to support upper level (ELPAC Level 3-5) English learner (EL) students and reclassified English Learners (RFEP).

*Goal: The goal of this class is to help our EL students successfully use academic listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills in preparation for their mainstream and high school classes.

Academic Language Development

What does ALD provide and not provide?

It Provides:

- * reading, writing, speaking, and listening activities using the English 3D textbook.
- * explicit grammar instruction to help support writing and academic vocabulary growth.
- * This class is its own class period. It is one of the students' two electives.

It is NOT:

- homework support
- a study hall or advisory
- For 6th graders, this class occurs during Flex Time which is a frozen period for all 6th graders.

Graduating from EL Program

1. IFEP Initial English Proficient

or

2. RFEP (Redesignated Fluent English Proficient)

- Scored Bridging on ELPAC (4)
- Earn a C or better in Language Arts, Social Studies, Science and Math
 - CAASPP score of nearly met or met standard
- EL Coordinator, parent, administrator, and teacher agreement

Graduating from EL Program

ELPAC Summative

- * Given to *all* students identified as *English Language Learners*(waived or not)
- * Administered between January and May
- * Monitors students' progress in English Proficiency

CAASPP

- * Given to *all* California students
- * Administered in April
- * Monitors students' progress in English literacy

What is the ELPAC?

The ELPAC Summative Assessment measures student progress toward meeting the California English Language Development Standards (ELD Standards), which describe the English language skills that students need to succeed in school.

The ELPAC Summative Assessment

- . Is given each spring to students who have been identified as English learners
- · Includes questions about Listening, Speaking, Reading, and Writing

- · Are one measure of English proficiency that should be viewed with other available information, such as classroom tests, assignments, and grades
- . Can be used to help talk to your child's teacher about your child's progress in English language development
- . Can be used to determine if a student is ready to be reclassified as fluent English proficient (RFEP)

ELF	PAC Levels	What Students Can Typically Do at Each Level		
4		Students at this level have well developed English skills. They can usually use English to learn new things in school and to interact in social situations. They may occasionally receit help using English.		
3		Students at this level have moderately developed English skills. They can sometimes use English to iteam new things in school and to interact in social situations. They may need help using English to communicate on less-familiar school topics and in less-familiar social situations.		
2	1	Students at this level have somewhat developed English skills. They usually need help using English to learn new things at school and to interact in social situations. They can often use English for simple communication.		
1		Students at this level are at a beginning stage of developing English skills. They usually need substantial help using English to learn new things at school and to interact in social situations. They may know some English words and phrases.		

The four ELPAC levels shown above describe what students at each level on the ELPAC can typically do in English. The table below shows how these four ELPAC levels relate to the three proficiency levels described in the ELD Standards.

How can I help my child?

- · Read to your child, or have your child read to you, on a regular basis.
- . Use pictures and ask your child to tell you what he or she sees in the picture or what is happening in the picture.
- · Provide your child with opportunities to use language outside of school.
- . Talk to your child's teacher about your child's Listening, Speaking, Reading, and Writing skills to help support your child's progress.
