Foreword by Robin Fletcher, Chief Executive of the Boarding Schools' Association

In a year where the Boarding Schools' Association (BSA) celebrated its Golden Jubilee culminating in National Boarding Week, boarders from Royal Russell School epitomised the spirit of the boarding community we value here in the UK.

The UK has the biggest boarding school market in the world with over 75,000 students and good, modern British boarding is deeply admired and widely imitated. National Boarding Week was an opportunity to celebrate why boarding is a great option for many students, increasing their confidence and independence, giving them the chance to explore and try new things and helping them to make deep friendships that will last a lifetime.

Over 100 schools took part in our celebrations, we generated in excess of 1,000 tweets, have grown the BSA Boarding Orchard to 101 trees, buried 44 time capsules, three schools reached the finals of Store Wars raising thousands of pounds for Barnardo's and we ended with week with our Big Boarding Sing - the largest ever boarding choir with Dominic Peckham.

Royal Russell boarders were not to be outdone and seized every opportunity throughout the week to promote the spirit of their boarding community.



Each boarding house joined the BSA Boarding Orchard by planting a fruit tree. Junior boarders buried a time capsule with items representing 2016 boarding life and the finals of the inter-house Boarding Bake Off final took place. Other activities including a 'House Swap' and 'Big Boarding Tea', once again highlighting the community spirit of Royal Russell boarders and the week ended with a photograph of the boarding family (students and staff).

'Big Boarding Week'



The BSA has been the national voice of boarding in the UK for 50 years. This year has seen them celebrating their Golden Jubilee with various events. The culmination of this was National Boarding Week which ran from Monday 20th – Sunday 26th June. The Royal Russell boarders entered into the spirit with our own 'Big Boarding Week' and held a different event each day.

Monday 20th June—Tree Planting

The Boarding Orchard was launched by the BSA in 2014. It aims to be largest orchard, by distance, in the UK and involves boarding schools joining the orchard by planting fruit trees in their grounds. The trees symbolise the 'tree of knowledge' and demonstrate each school's commitment to growth and caring for the environment.

We invited some of our leaving year 13 pupils to plant three trees (one for each boarding house) in the grounds of the PAC. Something for them to leave behind as they move on to pastures new.



<u>Tuesday 21st June — Time Capsule</u>

Our Junior pupils (with help from Mrs Jeffree and Miss Ryan) chose items to go into a 'Time Capsule'. This has now been locked and will go on display next year in the foyer of the new boarding houses. It will not be opened until 2041! The pupils really entered into the spirit of this, putting together a scrapbook of important events from the last year and writing letters about themselves in their native languages. 2016 coins, photographs, video clips and many other things have been sealed inside.



Wednesday 22nd June – Bake-off

The first Royal Russell 'Bake-Off' was the only event open to all of the houses (day and boarding). And typically none of the boarders made the finals! But it was a fantastic event, with some amazing looking and tasting cakes made.



Thursday 23rd June—Big Boarding Tea

Whilst all of those things are true, they do not get to the heart of what being a boarder is all about. Boarding teaches you how to cope with people you disagree with or dislike before your first job ever does. Boarding teaches you how to have a true sense of community without losing your sense of self. Boarding teaches you how to respect other people's ethnic, religious or cultural background and way of life. Even if that way of life involves your next door neighbour singing in the shower at one AM on an exam night.

Being a boarder at Royal Russell has taught me empathy and compassion better than any other life experience that I've ever had. I thank my parents for giving me this opportunity, and to all the staff and fellow pupils at Royal Russell who have contributed to this microcosm being a safe and welcoming place for us to live, love and prosper.'
