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

In the current number of the Magazine are given, our scores in the first quarterly cadets' shooting match, as well as the scores of the Maryborough, Ipswich, and annual Old Boys' cricket match. Our First Cricket Team has been doing fairly well in its grade (B Grade Senior) this season, and at present is well up on the list.

Queensland Rhodes Scholar.

Masters and boys of the Brisbane Grammar School will alike heartily rejoice in the selection of Norman Leslie as the Queensland Rhodes' Scholar for 1905. He came to the school six years ago, as the holder of a State School Scholarship, gained a Trustee Scholarship at the end of his third year here, and had this scholarship extended for an additional year at the close of 1903. His school record was unblemished in the matter of honourable conduct, and he has played a leading part in the maintenance of school games, being a good footballer, one of the mainstays of the cricket team, both in batting and bowling, and the holder of the Junior Tennis Championship of Queensland for two years. His popularity amongst his schoolfellows was deservedly great, and he was recognised by his masters as an influence for good in the school, through his example of courtesy, and cheerful obedience, and high principle. He is likely, in his university life, to uphold the high ideal expected of a Rhodes' scholar His intention at present is to seek admission at Balliol College, Oxford, where last year's scholar, A. S. Roe, has already commenced his university career.

Annual Swimming Sports.

There was a large gathering of parents, friends, and old boys at the annual sports of the Brisbane Boys' Grammar School, held in the Booroodabin Baths on March 3rd, and the afternoon was one of the most successful in the history of the school sport. The programme was a varied and interesting one, and included an amusing obstacle race, cadets' and novices' races, diving, relay race, old boys' race, and water polo. While the relay race and the four lengths school handicap were capital items, and should be continued, the combination of swimming on back and feet foremost was unfortunate, and robbed the back race of portion of its interest and value. In the school championship, Corrie secured an easy win.

This superiority of one swimmer has been a feature of the school swimming sports, and the race was not as exciting as many others. In the old boys' contest there were a large number of entries, and the final was a splendid exhibition of swimming. A noticeable feature of the sports was the care with which the boys were costumed The announcement through a speaking trumpet of the results woold have added to the enjoyment of the spectators, who were mostly unacquainted with the names of the winners.

Boat Race. - B.G.S. v. M.G.S.

The annual four-oared race between the crews of the Brisbane and Maryborough Grammar Schools took place on the Brisbane River in the morning of December 6th, in calm but hot weather. The course was from a point opposite the Government wharf to the rocks above the Commercial Rowing Club's shed. The Brisbane crew was weakened by the unfortunate illness of G. G. Wilson (No. 3). who was compelled to resign his seat in the boat a week before the race. Murray was, in consequence, moved from the bow seat to No. 3, and the vacant bow seat was taken by W. Taylor.

After some delay at the start, both crews went away at a good fast stroke; but after travelling about 200 yards, without mich advantage to either side, No. 3 in the Maryborough rew lost his slide; after this, the Brisbane crew obtained a slight field, which they maintained to the end of the race, though daylight was not at any time visible from the bank between the two locats. Mary

borough made more than one gallant effort to overtake their opponents, and at the finish seemed to be gauging on .hem; but the Brisbane crew passed the judge a quarter of a length in front. Both crews are to be congratulated on the pluck with which they rowed a hard race out to the finish. Special pratse is due to the stroke of the Brisbane crew, who not only refused to be discouraged by the loss of his original No. 3, but rowed with great determination in the race itself; also the bow, for the hard work

Cricket.

We are now getting near the end of another cricket season. This season has in many ways been the most successful for some Since the last publication of the Magazine, we have played time. 10 matches and won 9 of them. N. Leslie won both the batting and bowling averages for 1904, with J. A. James and S. Castlehow runners-up in each respectively. Two centuries have been made; one by Mr. Mowbray, for the Present School v. Past, and one by I. James against Ipswich G. S. The great fixture of our cricketing year, that against Maryborough G. S., took place on December 6th last. As will be seen elsewhere, we started the day well by winning the boat race. On assembling at the school turf, Maryborough won the toss and sent Brisbane in to bat. The first two or three wickets fell rapidly. But Bridgman played a splendid innings, and was helped by quiet play by Forbes and Leeds. To R. Watson and E. S. James, however, is due the praise, for a splendid stand late in the innings, which reached the fine total of 162.

Our innings lasted some little time over the lunch interval. Then Maryborough went to the wickets. Wickets fell rapidly, until Friend, Simpson, and Thompson pulled matters together. Their stand, though long, did not produce very many runs, and the innings closed for 84. Being 78 behind on the 1st innings. Maryborough were again sent in, and Brisbane had to spend the rest of the afternoon in the field. Friend again played splendid cricket, his record for the match being 101 for once out. At the call of time, M.G.S. had lost 7 for 187, B.G.S. thus winning by 78 on the 1st innings.

The game resulted in an exciting win for the Present School by 17 runs, R. W. Mowbray contributing 103, the first century in these matches, whilst E. K. fully for the Pasts compiled 60. Probably every gymnast has noticed that after long periods of sitting in a close room, and sweltering in the semi-tropical heat, a sense of drowsiness creeps over the body. Instinctively the shoulders are sent back, the arms up, and back, and out, the head back, and perhaps a yawn. Then a relax, and one feels decidedly relieved. By instint the human being thus stretches and exercises the muscles, and what can be done by instinct can be achieved regularly by secondary, or acquired instinct. Let young men and women learn that it is worth while to be healthy, quick, self-controlling, selfdirecting; that it is a pleasure to utter some of their most beautiful thoughts in a physical way, and gymnastics will become a much more favourite form of exercise than at present. Gymnasts should remember that the ordeal of living through a Brisbane summer is less trying when one is in sound physical condition.

Football.

PAST GRAMMAR SCHOOL FOOTBALL CLUB.

Following on the poor display of football shown both in club and representative matches last season, a movement was made in October last towards forming a club composed entirely of past students of the Brisbane Grammar School. Strangely, the leader of the scheme was an old Ipswich Grammar School boy—Mr. W. Bennett—but one can see the season of that by following close in the self-destruction of the old club. In the days of club football, the Past and Present Grammars was 'the power' in the football world; its origin is not quite clear: but if memory serves right, it arose out of the fact that the present school team was an exceptionally strong one in 1886, containing such players as Harry Scarr, Harry Luya, the two Grahams, and of course, the ever-popular R. P. Francis, whose memory is cherished amongst all old students

both as a master and a friend. As some of these players left school they still retained their places in the team, and hence a Past and Present team formed of its own accord, without any system at organisation, as we had to go through just lately. This old team was ever popular amongst the public, even when in the eves of Brisbane Grammarians It degenerated somewhat by the admission of students from these Grammar Schools, the main reason for this innovation was that fine old rivals, the Tpswich G.S. found a marvellous three-quarter in Bullmore (since Scotch international). and the selectors wanted to make use of him. The next innovation was the admission of anyone who had ever been to a high school; this again, for personal reasons, to get hold of the famous Jimmy Anderson and Sion Boland, neither of whom had attended the Grammar School. The gradual removal of the purpose for which the old club had been formed, namely, that of keeping together the fine athletic and kindred spirit engendered by association at the one school, had more than anything else the effect of kindling a spirit amongst other footballers in town antagonistic to the Granmarians altogether; and hence in 1000 we found electorate football holding sway and the Past Grammars were without doubt, guilty of felo de se.

Hence Mr. Bennett, in bringing forward his motion at the Q.R.U. meeting, especially limited the players to past and present members of the Brisbane Grammar School only, and in view of previous history, one can see how necessary it is to maintain this. A few enthusiastic sports at once took up the matter informally, canvassed the town and eventually called a general meeting in Deecmber. At this, the club was properly formed : a strong committee of ten and a secretary were appointed to carry on the organisation, and a resolution was passed, adopting pale blue with white collar as the club colours. This committee worked well during January and February; another general meeting was held with still increasing members, till eventually at the annual meeting was held on February 28th, some 85 members had enrolled themselves, most of these are young players, in many cases the pick of the seniors and juniors of the electorate clubs, who had continued football for the sake of the game only, but who warmly welcomed the advent of the new club. which should rouse in them a friendly feeling of comradeship and old associations as well. At this meeting Mr. Roe was elected president, Messrs. P. P. Fewings, R. McCowan and K. Carson (vice-presidents); W. W. Knight, secretary; and J. Wassell, treasurer, with Lewis as secretary of second grade; while a strong committee was formed, most of the older players who had helped in organisation, dropped out, in favour of the younger enthusiasts The intention is to play the first two grades at least, and should sufficient inducement offer, to play third grade also. The organisation is still being carried on, and a further filip was given to it the other day by the inauguration of the Past and Present Brothers.

Though the first year may not be productive of excellent

regults, all supporters of the good old winter pastime can be assured of watching football played in its true spirit (should they visit the arenas this year) whenever any of the Past Grammar teams are engaged, and it is to be hoped that their sportsmanship will be an example to other clubs, and lead them out of the very low grade football, into which they had fallen during the last few seasons.

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
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
