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

Editorial.

A T last we have got through with the concert, and have survived the preparations. This year, as usual, we have several photographs for our last issue of the year. On the whole, this years entertainment was rather better than last year's. It was held this year in the Protestant Hall, instead of in the school hall, in order to increase the accommodation. An account of the entertainment will be found on another page of this issue.

Again we are on the verge of the Sydney Senior Examination, for which we have entered eight candidates. It is to be hoped we shall get a good number of passes in this examination, if not one or two of the exhibitions. We are already well on in the cricket season. The First Eleven have not yet got properly into form. I think, but they will probably improve in time to acquit themselves satisfactorily against Ipswich and Maryborough. We are indebted to the captain (J. James) for an account of their matches so far.

The Boarders' Team has done well for a start in fourth grade (junior), winning two matches out of three, though the team does contain a batsman with an average of "nought on five."

In the current number will be found an account of the annual sports, which proved very successful. Our crew are getting into trim to compete against Maryborough shortly. C. Corrie has sup plied us with gymnastic news. C. Corrie is an enthusiastic gymnast, and has done excellent work in forming school gymnastic squads for various competitions. A. C. Macartney has provided us with news of the Cadets.

We have much pleasure in stating that L. G. Brown won the Junior Gymnastic Championship of Queensland on Saturday. while while C. Corrie obtained the second place in the Senior Champions ship.

During this year, which is now drawing to a close, the School has maintained its reputation both on intellectual and sporting sides; Norman Leslie gained a Rhodes Scholarship, and G. L. Bythe secured the first place amongst the Queensland candidates at the Sydney Junior University Examination, which 33 of our candidates succeeded in passing. The Football Premiership fell to our first team, and our oarsmen, cricketers, and cadets continue to do good work.

Our thanks are due to C. Corrie, who has supplied us with many of the photographs which are reproduced in this number.

The Schoolhouse.

Before the School meets again after the Christmas holidays a change will have taken place in our familiar surroundings. The Head Master, after 18 years' residence at the School House-ever since its completion, in 1887-has decided, with the consent of the Trustees, to hand over the duties of House Master to Mr. Bousfield. Under Mr. Roe's stimulating influence the boarders have always played a prominent part in our school life, and especially in our athletic life, out of proportion to their numbers, and more than one of them has proved himself of fine mettle in the larger world outside. Many an "old boy," revisiting the scenes of his youth, will feel that one of the links that bound him to the old school has been snapped, when he misses the genial welcome of Mr. and Mrs. Roe at the School House; but all "Grammars," past and present, will join us heartily in the hope that the well-earned relief from its duties may be agreeable and beneficial to them both, and be the means of preserving our Head Master all the longer in health and vigour to carry out the arduous and important duties which he still retains.

Jrafalgar Day.

The first centenary of the battle of Trafalgar occurred this year. Britons throughout the world had agreed to celebrate the day on which that glorious batt'e was won.

Brisbane, on the anniversary of that famous day, was hung with flags and banners, while at different places throughout the town reproductions of Nelson's world-famed signal were hung. On the afternoon before Trafalgar Day, Mr. Roe gave us an interesting lecture on Nelson and his deeds, explaining the operations at the battle of the Nile and the battle of Trafalgar by means of charts. He then spoke of Nelson himself, his character, his ambition, his forethought, energy, perception, and courage, and of the importance of his victories to England and all English-speaking countries ; how they (Trafalgar especially) freed his country from fear of invasion by the ambitious Napoleon, and made her mistress of the seas. He exhorted us to try to cultivate the manliness, courage, and patriotism

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of Nelson, putting country before everything else. At the end of the speech three hearty cheers for Nelson were called for and given. which showed that Australian boys can appreciate the great sailor and his achievements.

The School Entertainment.

The Annual Entertainment was held on the 27th of October. For the first time in the history of the School it was not held in our own hall. Owing to our inability to satisfactorily accommodate in the School Hall the number of spectators we considered it our duty to invite, the Protestant Hall was obtained, which enabled a larger number to attend than usual.

The whole entertainment was a success, and was well spoken of by the Press. The exhibition by the gymnastic squad was particularly good.

A new event in the entertainment was the boxing, including comic boxing, which proved to be a very suitable ending. For making dresses for the performers we are indebted to Mrs. Roe. Mrs. E. M. Lilley, Mrs. Bousfield, Mrs. Jas. Love, Miss Roe, Miss McLeod, the Misses Parry-Okeden, and Miss Brown (for badges for gymnastic squad). The attendance numbered about nine hundred.



Cricket

Cricket has commenced again, and all followers of the grand old game will gladly welcome its return. The game has been taken up in the School with plenty of vigour this season, and it is hoped that this energy will be kept up till the end of the season, though it is an unusually long one. We again play in the "B" grade senior fixtures of the Q.C.A.

The team is composed of the following members : -J. A. James (captain), Mr. R. W. Mowbray, A. A. Briggs, A. D. Forbes, C. Willcocks, C. Clatworthy, R. O. Bridgman, H. S. Walsh, E. S. James, J. Anderson, R. T. Scott, C. Powell.

School, having to follow on, did somewhat better, making 96 (J. James 31, A. Briggs 19, A. D. Forbes 15, H. Walsh 8 not out).


For the School, Clatworthy took six wickets for 55, Willcocks three for 29).



In connection with the Annual Sports the competitions in football kicking and cricket ball throwing took place on the previous Tuesday. A Wallace did the best throw with the cricket ball, the distance being 95 yards. A. Tindall and J. A. James were second and third with 87 yards 9 inches and 86 yards 1 foot respectively.

Football.

We had a most successful season this year, and put a finishing touch to our success in the School matches by winning the premiership.

We had to play Valley for the premiership, and this match took place at No. 1 Ground, Bowen Bridge. We kicked towards the grandstand, and pressed for some time. Then, after a passing rush, in which the ball was handled by Parkinson, James, and Briggs-Briggs crossed the line and scored. Even play followed, until Parkinson, securing, ran strongly and scored. No goals were kicked. Half-time came soon after, with the score 6-0 in our favour-Second half we had a very hard battle. Valley attacked again and again, but each time we succeeded in defending. At last Kieron secured, and after a splendid run crossed the line near the corner, where he fended off the full-back and ran round and scored between the posts. Hides converted. The score was now 11-0, with only a few minutes to play. In these few minutes, however, Valley managed to score twice by brilliant runs, one by McLaren and the other by Shields. Time, however, came at last, and we were premiers by 11 points to 6. Rowing.

During the third quarter two School fours were picked from the School to represent the Brisbane Rowing Club in the Under Twenty Race in the Association regatta, held in the Milton Reach on October 14th. They were stroked respectively by L. G. Brown and W. Taylor, and were constituted as follows :---


Of these, L. G. Brown is the most experienced and the most powerful oar, but it is considered that his services to the crew will be more valuable at No. 3 than at stroke. Murray is rowing strongly, with much life and determination, but pulls too much with his arms, and is not yet quick enough with his hands in the recovery. Perry

has plenty of weight and strength, which will be very useful when he gets into proper form. Denham, at bow, rows neatly and with good body swing. They promise to make a good crew, and the captain of the Brisbane shed is giving much assistance in the matter of coaching. They will row in the Under Twenty race of the Rowing Association on Saturday, November 18th, against a strong four from the Brisbane shed, consisting of W. Taylor, Parkinson, T. Brown, Bowley, which will be a useful experience for them as a preparation for their struggle against Maryborough in the first week of December.

The Cadets.

He complimented the officers and instructor on the careful instruction that those under them had evidently received. He also said it gave him great pleasure to inspect the B.G.S. Cadets, and that the Cadets held a high place in the opinion of all those connected with military matters, particularly in his own.

Since the last issue the shooting team, which consists of E. M. Lilley, J. James, N. W. Markwell, A. C. Macartney, C. Lilley, E. Plant, C. Wassell, and L. G. Brown, has been very busy practising for the Empire Match, which was shot off on November 2nd. As the scores have not yet been "officially" announced, very little can be said about the match. The first of the Cadet Shield Competitions for the year 1905-6 was shot off on October, which turned out rainy and windy, and in it the B.G.S. Cadets made 701 points, thus gaining a lead of 28 points on the Toowoomba Cadets, who made 673 points. The second competition will be shot off on November 18th.

Gymnasties.



The Championship has not yet been concluded, Roe and Nott, the two likeliest winners, are as yet unbeaten.


Next season's team promises to be a strong one, although we are losing the services of Roe, Nott, and E. B. Walker.
