Editorial.

FOLLOWING closely on last issue came busy times for the school; the Sydney Senior and the school examinations followed by the trip of the cricketers, rowers and tennis players to Maryborough.

In the Senior last year the candidates, who sat from the school, did exceedingly well, twelve out of fourteen passing, and Bythe in particular distinguishing himself.

While the teams were in Maryborough, a 100 yards race was run off between A. D. Forbes and a Maryborough representative, and in the second running of the race Forbes succeeded in winning. This was one of the events for the Chelmsford Cup, which was won by the school last year. This cup is the Challenge Cup, presented by H.E. Lord Chelmsford, to the Grammar School, which has the supremacy in Sport, last year being the first year of the competition. After the above-mentioned important events came the break of the Midsummer Vacation, considered by most boys equally important, if not more so.

Cricket has been taken up very enthusiastically this year, and this First XI. would have stood a very good chance of winning the B grade premiership had they not been obliged to forfeit several matches during the holidays. During the remaining matches of the season, they will feel severely the loss of their two brilliant members, G. C. Willcocks and Forbes, who have passed their Matriculation, and gone to the University. Soon after our return to school came Foundation Day with its Old Boys' Match, which was won this year by the present boys on the first innings.

The Boarders and Seconds have also been doing exceedingly well, especially the former, but the Thirds have not had the success which attended their efforts last year.

After last year's omission the Swimming Sports were held again this year, in the Booroodabin Baths, on March 6th. The entries were very poor, so poor that the committee were obliged to withdraw one of the races from the programme on account of the smallness of the entry. In spite of this fact, however, the swimming itself was good, Bob Willcocks again winning the School Championship and distinguishing himself also by securing first place in the Neat Header, and the 4th Form and Upper Modern Handicap, and by being leader of the winning Relay Team.

Football will be on us in a few weeks, and the First XV. will feel heavily the loss of such members as L. G. Brown, G. C. Willcocks, Forbes, and Newell.

On the river the rowers have been working hard. Since their victory over Maryborough, before the holidays, they have been in training, and won an "under 20" race at the Ladies' Regatta some weeks back. They also will feel the loss of L. G. Brown.

There have been changes, also, in the Cadet Corps, Captain Gross has been promoted to the rank of Major. The corps will miss the services of Lieuts. Plant, Wassell, and L. G. Brown, all of whom, having passed their matriculation, have gone to the University.

The rifle team of last year promises to be considerably weakened by the absence of Plant, Wassell, and Brown. This team came first out of the Schools in Australia in the Empire Match, which they shot off towards the end of last year, but the results from elsewhere are not yet available.

Malcolm Ellis, who ably discharged the duties of editor last year has joined the staff of the "Daily Mail." During his term of office he proved himself a capable and enthusiastic editor and carries with him our best wishes for his success in his new sphere of action.



Cup for Athletics.

Presented by His Excellency Lord Chelmsford, Governor of Queensland, for competition between Ipswich, Maryborough and Brisbane Grammar Schools. Won in 1907 by Brisbane Grammar School.

The Governor's Cup.

His Excellency the Governor has given a substantial proof of his keen interest in the annual contests which most of the Queensland Grammar Schools hold with each other in the different branches of Athletics, by presenting three very handsome silver cups for perpetual competition ; and we are sure that all lovers of true sport and friends of the Schools will highly appreciate this generous action of Lord Chelmsford's. The original intention was to have one cup for all the six schools, but considerations of distance made it necessary to arrange three groups :

Brisbane, Ipswich, and Maryborough,
Ipswich and Toowoomba,
Maryborough and Rockhampton,

Townsville being reluctantly omitted on account of its isolated position. These cups are to be held each year by the Schools which have scored the greatest aggregate of points in the previous year, the points being allotted on the following scale :

Major Events (cricket and football), 2 for playing the match,
2 for winning ;

Minor Events (athletics, rowing, cadet, shooting, and tennis),
1 for the contest, 1 for winning.

The competition for these cups commenced last year ; and we are proud to say that Brisbane is the first School to have its name inscribed on the cup for our group, as we won every one of our contests against both Ipswich and Maryborough during the year 1907.

The Trustees.

The announcement of the retirement of Mr. H. J. Oxley, from the position of Treasurer for the Boards of the Boys' and Girls' Grammar Schools will be received with very general regret, more especially because of the reason that has occasioned this step, namely continued ill-health such as prevents his retention of those manifold honorary offices with which he has been so widely associated in Brisbane. There has been no one on this city who has done so much voluntary and honorary work as Mr. Oxley on behalf of hospitals, asylums, religious and educational institutions, and such like ; and on account of his actuarial ability upon his shoulders has fallen invariably the position in each of these which entails the greatest anxiety and work, that of Treasurer. By all for whom he has thus laboured his work will be remembered with gratitude, not only because of his able administration, but still more because of the kindness and consideration for others which have always characterised his actions. He has been our Treasurer since 1886, and his six sons

have all passed through the School and left honorable records here. The vacancy has been filled by the appointment of Mr. R. Chapman to the Board, and Lieut.-Col. Plant takes the duties of Treasurer.

Rhodes' Scholar, 1908.

The Rhodes' Scholarship for 1908 has been awarded to Stanley Castlehow, an Old Boy, whose distinguishing career at school has been followed by one of equal distinction at the Sydney University.

Castlehow entered the school in 1901, passed the Sydney Junior in 1902, gaining the University for General Proficiency and passing with seven A's.

In 1904 he passed the Sydney Senior in 10 subjects with seven A's and 3 B's, gaining the John West Medal for General Proficiency and the medal for Greek, and being proxime accessit for the medals in Ancient History and Latin. This excellent performance secured for him the First University Exhibition, and at the University of Sydney he won the Bowman Cameron and Coutes Scholarships. His University career has been an unbroken success and he has specialised in Classics, in which he has gained the highest Honours.

While at school Castlehow was a member of the First Cricket Team and Editor of this Magazine. At the University he has taken an active part in Sports such as Tennis, Rowing, Cricket, &c.

Queensland Government Exhibitioner.

G. L. Byth~~e~~ entered the Brisbane Grammar School in January, 1903, as the holder of a state school scholarship, which he had won from the Petrie Terrace State school, coming top of the list. He took a good place in the school classes, but it was not until his third year at the Grammar School that he established his undoubted superiority to the rest of his contemporaries, for he then passed the Sydney Junior (in 1905) with 7 A's, being proxime accessit for the Greek and German medals, and winning the Byrnes Memorial Medal for the best Queensland pass of the year. At Christmas in this year he gained the Lilley Silver Medal for the best boy in the Vth form and the first place amongst the extension scholars of the year. In 1906 he gained the Lilley Gold Medal as head of the school in his first year in the VIth form, repeating the success in 1907—a double distinction only gained five times before in our history, by Sampson, Roe, Fowles, Hay, and Byrnes. This list of school victories he has now suitably rounded off by his success in the Sydney Senior, gaining the Silver Medal for German and dividing with Duhig, of Nudgee College, the John West Medal and Grahame Prize for General Proficiency, and likewise the University Scholarship for General Proficiency, and a Queensland University Exhibition. He has entered St. Andrew's College, at Sydney University for the Arts Course, and his school looks to him with confidence for a continuance of these brilliant successes which have been won by his ability and industry and his genuine love of knowledge.

Cadet News.

MAJOR GROSS.

The Commonwealth Gazette of Australia this month contains the news of the promotion of Captain Gross to the rank of Major. Mr. Gross joined the school as successor to Mr. Hermann Schmidt, as German master, in January, 1886, and at once joined the school cadet corps at an officer next in command to the Head Master. During the last 22 years he has been associated closely with all the work of the corps, in outpost work, in camp, in the drill ground, and above all, on the rifle range, where his unstinted devotion of time and attention has been a most important factor in the production of the high standard of shooting which has kept this school in rifle competitions almost continuously at the head of Australian schools. His zeal for his cadet work led him to devote three weeks of his Christmas holidays to a close course of study at the Southport training camp, with the result that he has made himself thoroughly conversant with the new drill and with all matters relating to the

organization of cadets. Those who have been connected with him in military matters recognise that he possesses natural gifts of character which make him the type of officer with whom they would wish to serve in the hour of danger, and the news of his well-earned promotion will be received everywhere with satisfaction, but nowhere more cordially than at the Brisbane Grammar School.

THE B.G.S. CADETS.

The B.G.S. Cadets now all work as one Company, which is A. Comp. No 1 Battallion Q.S.C.C. Captain Gross has been promoted to the rank of Major. This year we have lost Lieuts. Wassell, L. G. Brown, and H. Plant, all of whom served in the corps for six years, and were prominent and useful members of the shooting team, besides being capable and diligent officers. The annual examination for promotion of privates and N.C.O.'s takes place in March. The competition for best shot of the school was decided last December after a keen contest. Sergts. H. J. Armstrong and Lilley tied with a score of 65. In the shoot-off Armstrong won with a score of 15, Lilley obtaining 14. A gold medal was presented by the Rev. W. P. Brown for the best shot. For this year's competition a trophy has been offered by Lieut.-Col G. B. Faskally, M.D., F.R.G.S. The Australian results for the Empire Match of 1907 are as follows :

Wilson, acquitted themselves right worthily in the vacant places as bow and two. We are much indebted to Mr. Swensson, the captain of the B.R.C. for the time and trouble he gave to the crew in their preparation for the race. The crew was an unusually strong one and after the first hundred yards the race was never really in doubt, as we drew steadily away from our opponents, although the comparatively narrow margin of four lengths, by which the race was won, shows that the Maryborough crew stuck pluckily to their work, and though defeated were by no means disgraced. Bundaberg had the advantage of rowing in a lighter boat, but they could not stay the distance; and our boys were loudly cheered for their sportsmanlike spirit and pluck as they rowed home in triumph to the shed.

This year we shall at least be without the valuable services of L. G. Brown, who is now working as a Junior Master at the Ipswich Grammar School. But there is good material coming on. As a heavy-weight J. Nimmo, who rowed very creditably in the Southport four last year, is a promising man for the middle of the boat, while K. Watts and M. G. Sutton will be quite worthy of a seat in the boat should vacancies occur from any cause, and N. Lloyd is a promising beginner.

Several others from the sixth form have joined the club, and are practising with some regularity. Recruits are wanted to keep up the supply for future years, for rowing in light boats is not to be learned in a few weeks, and as with riding and most other sports, the earlier it is begun the better is the prospect of gaining rare combination of skill and experience, which constitutes good watermanship.

In the middle of February George Rylatt, our school Janitor and Messenger, went to England for a well-earned six months' holiday, granted him by the Trustees as a recognition of his faithful services during the past 36 years. During all this period he has won the affection of the succeeding generations of boys by his kindliness and cheeriness, by his readiness to help any new comers in difficulties, by his devotion to the school, and his pride in its progress and successes. Before his departure at the close of afternoon school, the Head Master in the presence of the boys and masters presented him with parting gifts from the masters and from the present boys, and, wishing him on behalf of all a happy holiday and safe return, spoke very warmly of his kindliness and his loyalty shown alike to boys, Masters and Trustees. It has been a prominent characteristic of George, as he is called almost throughout Queensland, that while always ready to help and sympathise with the boys in their pleasures and difficulties, he has never forgotten his duty towards the Masters and the Trustees, and no boy has ever imagined that George would connive at or pass over any action contrary to the interests of the school. His long career in the school service has been a striking example of fidelity in the quiet discharge of duty, which all may well take to heart. His visit to England is brightened with the prospect of seeing his mother, who is still alive, and we all hope that his highest expectations of his holiday may be realized and that he may return with renewed health of body and mind for the continued discharge of his old duties.

Cricket.

While congratulating our popular captain, G. C. Willcocks, on his recent pass, and wishing him every success in his new sphere we regret to lose one who has so often led the school team to victory in the cricket field. For the last few seasons the team has not only had the benefit of his advice and direction, but also his assistance in "running up" a score and in "knocking down" our opponents' wickets. One of the best bats that has ever attended the school, he is undoubtedly the best in the present team, the scoring strength of which will be considerably reduced by his departure, while the loss of his work with the ball and in the field will be greatly felt.

In addition to this loss the success of another of our "boys" A. D. Forbes, robs us of a player who has so frequently assisted, both by his batting and bowling abilities, in bringing victory to the school team. We have not the least doubt that they both will do credit to any team with which they may play, and will always do honour to the B.G.S. We wish them both every success.

FIRST TEAM.

Owing to our Midsummer holidays and to arrangements made by the Q.C.A. during the holidays, we have had to forfeit four of our Grade matches since the last Magazine was published. Also, owing to rain we have had to play two "one day" matches, against St. Joseph's College and Valley (B). It is unfortunate that we have to forfeit so many matches, as it spoils our chance of being premiers. This season we would have been very near the Premier position if we had not been compelled to forfeit so many matches on account of our holidays and our inter-school matches; for we have not lost a match except those which we have been compelled to forfeit for those reasons. Up till Christmas we had an unusually strong batting and bowling team, but when we returned to School we found that Casey, J. W. Forbes, Darley, and Anderson had left. Of these four, Anderson and Forbes were both good bats and were well up in the averages, Forbes having the highest average in the team, also Anderson was the best wicket-keeper the School has had for a great many years. Casey and Darley were both batsmen who were improving quickly and were also very useful in the field.

The following is detailed list of the matches.

B.G.S. v. M.G.S.

The team left Brisbane for Maryborough on Tuesday morning and arrived at 4 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon. We changed as soon as we arrived, and after a cup of tea indulged in practice. On Wednesday morning the weather was hot and clouds were gathering all round. Willcocks (B) won the toss from Braun (M.) and sent Maryborough in to bat. Forbes and Long opened for Brisbane, but after two or three overs it was evident that no fast bowler could keep his footing on the concrete, which extends right up to the bowling crease. The run to the wicket at one end is down hill, and so a fast bowler is carried over the bowling crease by the force of his run, and then he slips on the concrete. At the other end the run is uphill and the only bowler who could keep a length at this end was Long. Maryborough made 54 for 3 wickets and then the other wickets fell quickly and all were out for 82. Long (4 for 22) and Willcocks (4 for 16) obtained the best averages for Brisbane. Forbes and Willcocks opened for Brisbane; 3 runs only had been scored when Forbes cut a bumping ball from Morrow into third man's hands. Newell had only made 9 when he also cut a ball straight to third man. Long and Willcocks remained together for a good while, but scoring was slow as the balls were rising very high. Just before lunch the heat was terrible, and the batsmen and bowlers both were exhausted; after lunch it was still very hot, and at intervals there were a few drops of rain. Brisbane's innings closed for 131, Willcocks (23), Long (22), Casey (16), and Reinhold (14), being the chief run-getters. In their second innings Maryborough

started to hit in the hope of putting up a good score quickly, but none of them could get hold of the bowling, and six wickets were down for 24 runs, when rain came on and stopped play for the rest of the afternoon. Long (3 for 12) and Willcocks (2 for 12) were the bowlers. We thus won easily by 49 on the first innings. The following are the detailed scores :—
