Editorial.

From the time of Adam, learned professors have spent the best years of their life in impressing the public with the various virtues of the busy bee; but they do not ever by any chance mention the "busy boy." However, there is some slight excuse for them. They are probably not old scholars of B.G.S., and they therefore have not gone through the months of continual though not unpleasant toil which constitute the last quarter of our school year. This time the programme has been especially well filled. With the close of the Football and Tennis seasons, cricket has come in demanding a great deal of time, while preparation for the Sports and Concert has made at least the first few weeks of the term exceptionally busy both for masters and boys, especially as the Senior Examination was just coming on, and the cricket match and rowing races with our brothers of Maryborough are due at the end of the year.

This year the School is represented in the Sydney Senior Examination by six candidates, who we hope will all be successful in obtaining a pass, and that one or two at least will win Queensland Exhibitions.

The Sports were not a success from an athletic point of view owing to the rain, but the pluck and cheerfulness of the school in general saved the event from being a complete failure.

The School Entertainment was held under more favourable conditions. It was entered into with great spirit by all performers. The "plays" were this time an especially interesting feature, and as usual the gymnastic display was one such as is rarely seen in Brisbane.

The close of the football season found the First XV. premiers in their grade. This is the second occasion on which they have held that proud position. A notable feature of the past season was the visit of the Sydney Public Schools Team. We hope for the sake of Queensland school football that this visit will become an annual event. It is only to be regretted that the school team was unable to meet the visitors owing to rain.

We offer our congratulations to the Tennis Team on their success. This is the first time for very many years that the team has reached such efficiency. Tennis is becoming a very popular game and the four school courts at times prove quite insufficient to provide games for all who wished to play. The annual tournament, which has just been concluded, has shown up many new players, and next year's team should prove as good as this season's.

Cricket is more popular than ever, and although the First Eleven have suffered by the departure of some of their best men of last season, and have been compelled to commence their season with a rather raw team, there is no reason why they should not prove themselves worthy of representing the school. Under the present conditions they may be said to be doing very well indeed.

Shooting appears to have been unlucky as the Empire Match had to be shot off in a heavy gale of wind. However, news has just come to hand that the B.G.S. team has secured top place among the Australian schools, a very fair performance considering the conditions under which they shot. We are pleased to be able to publish in this issue a number of photos of scenes from the School Entertainment, and also a photo of the First Eleven.

School Entertainment.

The Annual Entertainment was, as has been usual of late years, held in the Protestant Hall, before a very large audience. The performance was carried through in a manner which does credit to all concerned. The theatrical pieces were especially amusing, and considering that the majority of the actors are novices, were performed very well indeed.

In the German play, Wheatley as a schoolmaster seemed a very fine old gentleman, and Briggs in the role of a red headed little scamp rendered his part very naturally and kept the house in a roar of laughter, while Macintosh as a much travelled sailor speaking a conglomeration of half-a-dozen languages, caused much amusement.

The French play, a selection from Moliere's Fourberies de Scapin, was well acted. C. Clatworthy as a lover is without equal, and Needham as his sweetheart made an extremely pretty girl. The drollery of Scapin (C. Willcocks) and the villainy of Sylvester (Griffith) quite brought down the house.

In a selection from Sheridan's "Rivals," Clouston in the part of Sir Anthony Absolute, and Mactaggart as Jack Absolute acted their parts extremely well, as did also Hutton, who as David got "out of breath" in a manner which greatly delighted the audience.

An event on the programme which is perhaps the most looked forward to every year is the Gymnastic display, which this year as usual quite came up to expectations.

The comic boxing display, which is also apparently becoming a regular feature, evoked more applause than any other event and made an apt and happy ending for the entertainment.





CRITICISMS-FIRST ELEVEN.

- 6. C Willcocks (Capt.)—Our popular captain this season has a very good defence in batting. His strokes on all sides of the wicket are well timed and sound. He executes his leg glides, slipping and cutting especially well. He is the slow break bowler of the team, getting on a leg break both ways and occasionally sending down a fast one. His fielding is very good and he sets a splendid example to his team by work ing hard in the field.
- A. D. Forbes—A vigorous bat, with strokes all round the wicket, his pulling and driving are especially good. Bowls a medium-paced ball with both breaks and has a good change of pace. A good field in any place.
- H. Walsh—A careful player, with a sound defence, He cuts and slips the ball well and his leg strokes are good. He fields splendidly in any position. Is also a very fair wicket-keeper.
- CH. Clatworthy—Our most consistent bowler. He keeps a splendid length, and has the left-hander's natural break from the leg. As a batsman he has not enough confidence in himself, otherwise he would make runs. Is rather slack in the field.
- W. Newell—A good bat, with some really good strokes on the off, his driving being hard and clean. He needs to practice his leg play and must remember to get well on top off the ball when cutting. A medium paced bowler with a good off break. He fields well.
- C.A. Powell—A left-handed bowler who keeps a good length and comes in from the off. As a batsman he is rather stiff, but plays with a straight bat and has great driving powers. He must pay attention to his back play. A fair field at point.
- B. G. Long—A good sound bat, with strong forcing strokes all round the wicket. A good change bowler, who keeps a fair length, but sends down some rather loose stuff on the leg. Needs to be quicker in the field.
- Anderson—Has kept wickets well, but he must still try to hold the ball better. A fair bat, but has a flourish which spoils many of his strokes.
- Chandler—A fair bat, with good off strokes in front of the wicket.

 Needs to practise his cutting. A fair field.

- S. Schoolev-A fair bat, with some good strokes in front of the wicket. He needs to improve his defence and to learn to play more with a straight bat. A good field.
- Smith-A fair bat, drives well, but his back play is weak and he has contracted a bad habit of jumping back as he plays a stroke. Needs to greatly improve his fielding.

On April 7th the I.G.S. team came to play the usual half-yearly match. Play commenced at 10 o'clock. Willcocks won the toss from Smith and decided to bat. We started badly, but pulled together afterwards and finished with 150. Ipswich then went in and beat us easily, scoring 195 for 5 wickets. McDermott batted splendidly for 118, not out.

Of spectators, naturally, there were few, but there were more than would have been attracted by any sports meetings which had less claims upon parents and friends. There was a good deal of tramping about in rain and mud to be done by the directors of the sports, but this did not apparently lessen their enthusiasm, any more than a more severe experience of the unpleasant state of the grounds did that of the youthful competitors. 

Rowing Notes.

The school four for the race against Maryborough began regular practice as soon as the football season closed; and in order to gain experience have entered for the Under Twenty Race in the last two Association Regattas, in October and November respectively. In the October regatta we were beaten by the Commercial Rowing Club four, which had been together for over 12 months, and was much heavier than our crew, and had just returned in triumph from Maryborough, where it had easily defeated all opponents in the under twenty race. Our crew kept level for half way, held on to them so that the Commercials did not draw clear until about a hundred yards from the finish, but were ultimately beaten by two lengths. Between the two regattas in spite of the distractions of the Senior Examinations, and the practice for the Empire Match, fairly regular practice was maintained and in the race on Saturday, November, 17th, they were able to defeat the Commercials, whose cr w contained three of its previous members. The race was rowed in very rough water, and our crew had the worst station in the centre of the stream, but keeping a long stroke and rowing well together they succeeded in winning by half-a-length. It was a plucky victory, won by perseverance and self sacrifice in preparation. The crew have had the great advantage of being coached by Captain Brooke, the A.D.C. at Government House, who has himself rowed in the Cambridge University Eight, and was a distinguished coach at that University. Unfortunately, on account of holidays, our junior company has been absent from two battalion parades under Major Halstead. However, on the King's Birthday, the school was well represented by our corps. They marched down to the domain and after several movements were dismissed about 11 o'clock, thus having the rest of the day to themselves.

The two quarterly shooting competitions, which should have been fired this half-year, have been postponed until the Q.R.A. Council decide on the shields. It is proposed to present another shield, thus having one for competition among the senior cadets and the other among the junior. The shooting team has been practising very regularly for the Empire Matches this year, and as the Toowong rifle range has been closed they had to go to Ekibin. As the scores are not yet public they will not be printed till our next issue.

We understand that in our coming matches we will have to use the "small rifles," which are much inferior to the magazines which we are now using. This is much to be deplored, as it will reduce the shooting powers of our school a great deal.

At our annual entertainment this year the cadets were represent ed by a sword squad, under Lieutenant Wassell, and the bugle band, under Corporal Doblo. The exercise was very smartly and well carried out and reflected much credit on its instructor G.S.-Major Rigby, who gave up a lot of time and took much trouble to instruct the squad.

Our senior lieutenant, A. C. Macartney, has been forced to resign owing to the Senior Public Examinations. He has been one of us for about 5 years, and will be greatly missed from the corps.

Tennis.

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


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
