The tennis team had the misfortune to be beaten in their final match, by Clayfield. They are thus "runners-up" in A2 Grade for the season 1913.

The football season ended very well, and on the vote of the members of the First XV., the honour caps were allotted as follows:—Best back, R. E. Thallon; best forward, G. C. C. Wilson; next best man, M. W. R. Bowman.

This year there are seven cricket teams in the School, which is a record; and if the enthusiasm displayed is any criterion of success, we should see most of them victorious in every match.

The personnel of the First XI. is practically the same as at the beginning of the year; and thanks to Mr. Miller's coaching, and the able leadership of our captain, the team is rapidly improving.

Before the issue of this Magazine, the new clinker racing "four" will have arrived from Melbourne, and will have made its "debut" on the Brisbane River. The crew are doing their utmost to secure a win against Southport this year; and we can help them by encouraging them, and when the race comes off, cheer them to victory.

A squad from "F. Company" were successful in winning the "Hospital Sports Cup" for the "March Past," at the Hospital Sports, on September 5th. They had the honour of having their photos. taken by an English Baronet, who was visiting Brisbane at the time, with the British Parliamentary Party.

The shooting team are practising hard for the "Empire Match," and we hope to see them do the School and themselves credit.

BROWN, A. H.—Good hard hitter; bats with fair defence, hits very cleanly, but is a little too fond of the hook, and will get himself out trying to do it on fast wickets; fields very well.

WRENCH, C. M.—Very stylish bat, with sound off strokes, especially cover punch, but is inclined to fly too much at rising balls on off; very neat field in any position.

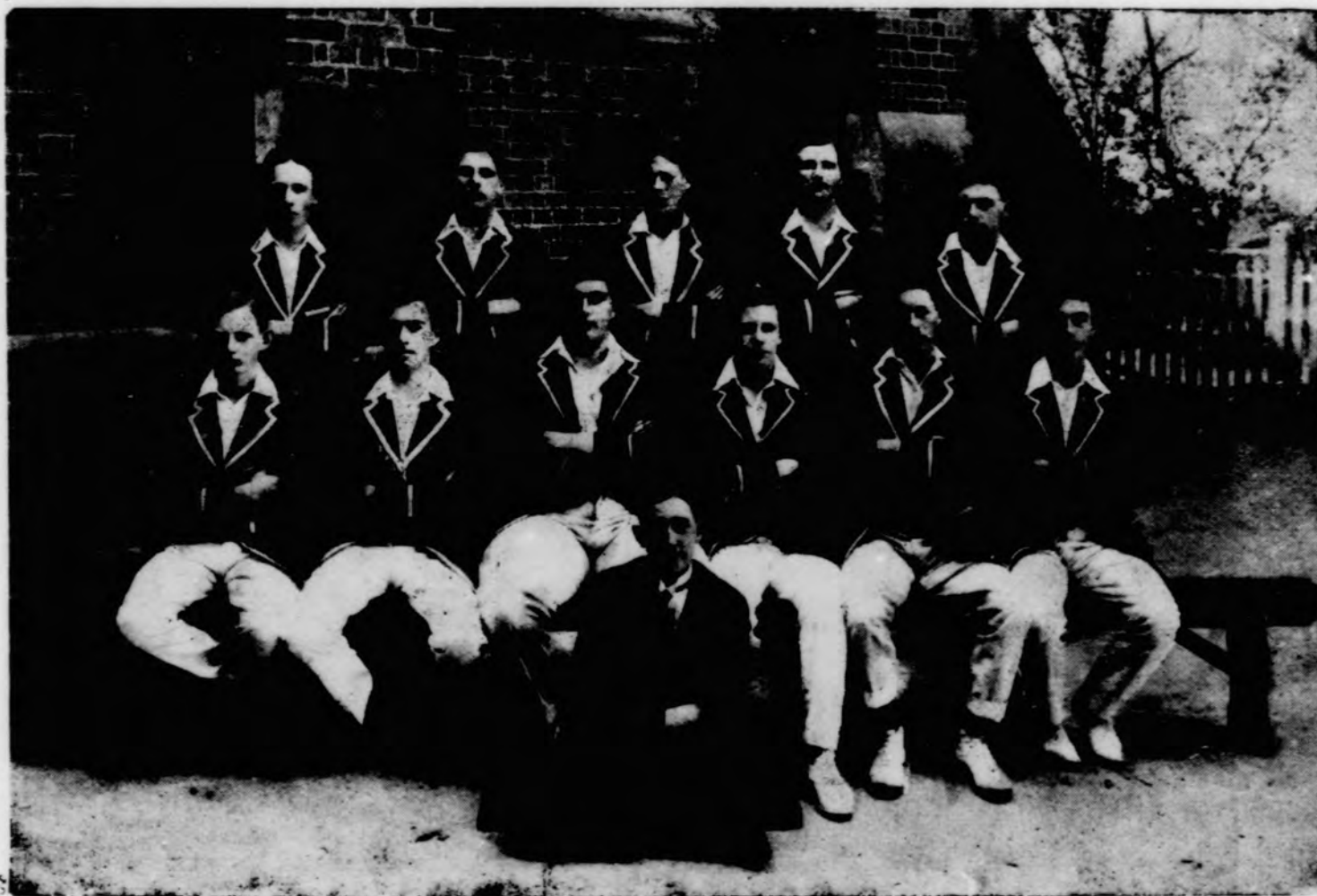
LONEY, J.—Careful bat, who watches the ball closely and plays some nice shots, but a little weak against leg break bowling; very fair change bowler. Quite the best outfield in the team.

BOND, S. S.—Has batted soundly, but is inclined to take risks; pulls and drives very nicely; sound field; bowls fast, and swings away with a new ball.

WEST, A. S.—Has been fairly successful this season; would do better if he went for the bowling a little more, and should cultivate his off shots; good hard working field.

JONES, H. W.—Very sound defence, but lacks scoring strokes; fair field.

DOWN, G.—Slow leg break bowler who turns the ball a lot; at present is erratic, but has makings of a good bowler, and

SPEERING, K. D.—Solid left-hand bat, with good defence, and puts plenty of power into his strokes when he opens out; good hard working field, and always a "trier."

LORD, F. S.—Medium left-hand bowler with good length, and shows promise of great improvement in the near future.

HOBBS, E. M. P.—Fair medium-paced bowler, but is inclined to be erratic, and does not try hard enough; fair field and bat.

M. D. GRAHAM (by a member of the team) Colours, 1910-11-12-13.—Makes a very successful captain, and shows considerable tact in handling so young a team. As a batsman he has a large repertoire of strokes, his driving and pulling being particularly powerful. He is probably the finest wicket-keeper in the Schools at the present time. Although not usually figuring as a bowler, yet he is capable of bowling a good length ball with plenty of pace.
