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

Editorial.

"They never fail who die in a great cause."

We are approaching the end of another year, but, still, there seems no prospect of the conclusion of the war. The columns of our Honour Board are steadily growing, and, in proportion, increases the sad but glorious number of those who have made the supreme sacrifice, and who now repose, to use the noble words of Rupert Brooke in "a piece of foreign field, which is forever England." We, at school can do but little of all we would like to do, but, "they also serve who only stand and wait," and, meanwhile, we can do our bit by keeping a cheerful face, and by trying to lighten the burdens of all. Later, perhaps, if the war lasts, some of our names may find a place on that board, which, now, we can only watch with admiration.

It is now the fourth and last term of the year; that one of bustle and of toil, which seems an Eternity; which, with its examinations, appears like a fiery dragon, past which the brave knight, armed with a sword of zeal and shield of ingenuity, must go to reach the enchanted castle of the holidays. The apple of knowledge evidently does not agree with those of weak digestion, of whom many are to be found in the Lower School.

The Annual Athletic Sports took place at the Exhibition on the 14th September, and some very fine running was seen, the ardour of the competitors being in no way damped by the rain. Collins ran finely amongst the Juniors; but the chief interest was centred in the struggle for the "Courier" Cup, between Anderson and V. C. Clarkson. We wish to congratulate Anderson for his win, after a strenuous combat, and also the runner-up, Clarkson, who broke the record for the 880 Yards, and won the Old Boys' Cup for 100 Yards. In the Combined Schools' Sports for the Chelmsford Cup, which were held this year in Brisbane, we obtained quite brilliant results, by winning every event, including the Junior ones, thus defeating both Ipswich and Toowoomba easily.

The First's in football have been very successful this season, at the close of which they were unfortunate in losing C. C. Stewart, one of their best backs. However, there was a scarcity of matches, owing to the small number of teams in their grade. They were successful in defeating Ipswich and Toowoomba in the matches for the Chelmsford Cup. At the end of the season Honour Caps were given to Lawton, Grenning, Stewart, Leslie and Clarkson, while Grenning, Leslie, Bennett, Darvall, Charity, Julius, Lawton, Stewart, Clarkson and Nothling obtained their colours. The Lower School Football Competition, for the shield presented by Mr. Bousfield, has been won by Form IIIA., who were coached by C. Stewart and T. G. Millar. They well deserved their win by their enthusiasm, both on practice and in matches. Those who specially distinguished themselves during the season were Bassingthwaite, Beeton, Bettanay, Alexander, Amos and Allom.

This year, for the first time, our crew conquered in the All Schools' Race for the Lawless Cup. Our four rowed a fine race, and A. K. Stewart, who stroked them to victory, has been elected captain, on the departure of Baynes. The membership of the Rowing Club has greatly increased this year, and we now possess a shed of our own. A Regatta was lately held to commemorate its completion, and six crews competed in the Trial Fours. Williams' crew obtained a deserved win by their superior style. The tub races have not yet taken place, as we are awaiting the "tub" donated by Mr. I. K. Stewart.

In Tennis, the First's have been rather successful, and a short time ago they journeyed to Ipswich, where, after a very close game, they defeated their opponents. The Tennis Tournament is now going on at School, and large, perspiring crowds throng the courts morning and afternoon. The captain, Wilson, lately distinguished himself by winning the Junior Championship of Queensland, and his skill and enthusiasm certainly deserved the honour.

The Cricket season is just opening, and a grand beginning has been made by the match against South Brisbane, in which Boyce scored 97. As usual, the entrance money from the sports has been handed over to the Red Cross.

We all join in congratulating Mr. Fisher very heartily on his recent marriage, and in wishing that he may live happily ever after. Some of his classes seized the opportunity to displuy their esteemn for him, by presenting him with several articles useful or otherwise. After a short honeymoon at the sea-side, he is now back at his usual work, even more popular than ever.

There did not appear to be any histronic abilities amongst the Fifth this year, and as we had no Charlie Dearden, we let the year go without any performance in rivalry with that which the boys, who were in our shoes this time last year, brought forward.

Several promotions were made last quarter in the cadets, and we wish to congratulate Marshall and Millar on having passed for Second Lieutenants.

The Editor of the last number of the Magazine, L. D. Watson, has left the School for Scotland, to complete his education there, followed by the good wishes of all his friends.

War News

The circumstances under which Major E. C. P. Plant obtained a Bar to his D.S.O. are thus detailed by Brigadier-General Gellibrand, 6th Brigade,—"I forward herewith recommendations for awards to Officers of the 6th Brigade for the consideration of the G.O.C. A few cases are still under investigation, and will be forwarded as soon as completed.

"One case I trust the G.O.C. will deal with is that of Major E. C. P. Plant. This officer's work has been invaluable to the Brigade throughout the operations, in which he has displayed the highest military qualifications. He has been untiring in his efforts to ensure timely and correct execution of orders for the drafting of which he was responsible. The operations demanded constant exposure to heavy artillery and, at times, machine gun fire, and under these conditions his conduct may be aptly described as 'cheerful gallantry.' His cool and decided manner have made him universally respected and admired.

"I recommended Major Plant for work of the same nature at Pozieries, but it was held that the case was rather one for the half-yearly gazette.

"For this reason, I ask for action by the G.O.C. to obtain for this officer a well-deserved Bar to the D.S.O. now. All ranks in the Brigade will welcome action by the G.O.C. as a compliment to the Brigade, as well as a personal recognition of Major Plant's distinguished service."

The late Captain W. Avery, of the Engineers, was doing excellent work at the Front, in mining and tunnelling. He and his men were pitted against the best of the Reyal Engineers, and succeeded in establishing a reputation of which we may well be proud.

Captain J. S. R. Macdonald, of the Artillery, who was recently killed, gained the esteem of officers and men alike by his efficiency and devotion to duty. The letters which have been received from his commanding officers speak of him in terms of the highest praise

Lieut. David Parry-Okeden, of the Flying Corps, was one of a party of four who attacked twenty-three hostile aeroplanes. This brave officer was severely wounded in the fight, but he and his companions gave a good account of themselves in the encounter.

The temporary Honour Board, on which are recorded the names of the Old Boys who have enlisted in the Great War, is rapidly filling up. In June, 58 names, and early in October, 52 names were added to the list. There are now 858 names inscribed there. Moreover, the list is never complete. No sooner is one list inscribed, than another list is formed of names of new volunteers, or old ones, whose record has only just been discovered. Of these volunteers, 108 have given their lives, and over 100 have been wounded. We extend our sympathy to those who grieve over the loss of departed heroes. While we mourn the losses, we feel a glow of pride in the splendid spirit that has actuated the Old Boys. The School must be better for the example they have set.

Something, however, remains for us to do—us, who have not taken part in the actual fighting. These Old Boys have fought, and are fighting to preserve our freedom, and it is our duty, as well as our privilege, to do what we can to perpetuate the memory of their work. We shall not be satisfied till a noble permagent memorial is erected on the School grounds. All of us who are interested in the School, past and present boys, parents, friends of volunteers, and friends of the School, must feel the call to take our share in promoting this memorial. It will come, whether we do our share or not; but what will be our feelings if we find that, after owing so much to the School, we have left others to pay this part of our debt.

On May 5th, a sum of £660 1s, had been received or promised. Since then, a further sum of £330 4s, 0d, has been subscribed, but the committee require much more than this, to provide a fitting memorial. They appeal to all Old Boys to do what they can by sending to the Secretary their subscriptions, or an intimation of what they are willing to do. Each Old Boy can help, too, by spreading the knowledge of the proposal, and enlisting the sympathy and support of others. The following is the list of additional subscriptions up to October 25th :—

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

ACCOUNT OF MATCHES PLAYED.

v. VARSITY II., May 12th.—Won 31-0. In this match our combination and condition were far too good for our opponents. Lawton was in splendid form, and scored four good tries. His kicking was also excellent, and reminded the 'Varsity of the play of their champion, Brown. Clarkson also shone, for he scored three tries.

v. NUDGEF, May 19th.-Won 10-0. This game was described by the Press as the best Rugby game of the season, and, when one considers the excellent passing rushes of the Grammars, and the solid defence of Nudgee, the eulogy is not exaggerated. The forwards, in the first half, played with great dash, and the work of Leslie, Grenning, Charity and Bennett, was excellent. The backs did not combine well at first, but they greatly improved as the game proceeded. The first score was the result of a cut in by Lawton, and an excellent passing rush, which eventuated after the skipper had been grassed. Clarkson being the man to carry the ball over the line. At the beginning of the second half, the play was mainly characterised by individual effort, and the Grammar forwards were being beaten both in pace and in the scrum work. The backs, however, were constantly on the alert to start passing rushes, which were well executed, and were only blocked by the solid tackling of Nudgee. Stewart, at this stage, kicked a penalty goal. The same player also dropped an excellent field goal from a long distance and an awkward angle.

v. VARSITY I., June 2nd.—Won HI—H0. This was the second game we had against our heavy opponents, and was played with more skill by our side, so that we managed to win instead of being beaten by 12 points, as we had been in the first match of the season. Our forwards played with great dash, and fed the backs well. Herzig scored for 'Varsity, and Clarkson, after a beautiful run across the field, scored for Grammar. In the second half. Great enthusiasm was displayed by both officials and competitors; the fields were large, the contests keen, and some of the finishes remarkably close.

Considerable interest was shown in the contest for the title of Champion Athlete, which carried with it the trophy presented by the Hon. E. J. Stevens, M.I.C. This was won by H. W. Anderson, with V. C. Clarkson runner-up, and C. C. Stewart third.

The 100 Yards Championship, for the cup presented by the "O.B.A.," was won by Clarkson, from Anderson, with Stewart third.

Four new championships were instituted this year,—a halfmile and a 220 Yards Senior, and a 100 Yards and High Jump under 15 years, to enable representatives to be picked for the School contests. Clarkson holds the record for the 880 Yards, which he won in 2 min. 12 sec. The record for the 220 Yards is held by Mr. E. F. Lord, who in 1888, won the 220 Yards Handicap from scratch in 24 secs.

The start of the mile saw Leslie and Clarkson running again, Leslie leading the field all the way to the finish, winning from Morganstern in 5 min. 5 sec.







Of course, the matter of subscriptions had been affected by the war; a very large number of our younger members, and older ones too, having gone to the front.

He mentioned Mr. Troedson's offer to accept payment of subscriptions at his office in the city, thanking him, on behalf of members generally, who might find it inconvenient to write cheques for so small an amount as 5s. Of the School Magazine he spoke in terms of high praise. We were all proud of it, he said It was quite alive and admirable. Mr. Mason certainly merited our warm congratulations on the evidence of growth and progress shown by the last issue. It had developed into quite a book in itself. He thought that two issues per year were amply sufficient The attitude of the Association in helping so materially toward its distribution among Old Boys was also a subject for congratulation. Alluding to the Costin Memorial Fund, he reminded members that the last time Mr. Costin spoke among us was on the subject of the War Memorial. With regard to Mr. Roe's retirement from his official position, it was very gratifying that he had been asked to continue the inspection of the Grammar Schools of the State, and also that his general health was so much better.

Referring to the Jubilee of the School, on the last day of February next year, he said, that it may, of course, be postponed but that we should have the celebration when the war was over

The War Memorial was, so far, a success, thanks to the initiation of the Association. Members did not think sufficiently of the Old School, and how it might be affected by educational measures, which came before the Government. It was really wonderful how the School had grown, and we should keep in constant touch with it. He then formally moved the adoption of the report.

Mr. W. T. Evans seconded the motion, saying that he had been, of late years, more in touch with the School through having a boy of his own there. The School had not changed much, nor were the masters much altered from the old days. The School should be congratulated on its athletic productions. We were proud of our Roll of Honour and War Distinctions. No doubt, the instruction and precept imbibed at the School had done its share in leading to these. It was good to be associated with such men.

Mr. Bousfield said that the examination results had once more shown that there was no falling off in the quality of the boys, or in the way they are brought up to the scratch. Nor was there any falling away in the cricket field. The recent Armidale match showed that we had quite as good men now as at any time. Our principal development had been in rowing. A rather difficult position led to our putting up a shed of our own, and at the regatta we ought to turn out a good crew. A boat had been promised us if we won, and the promise was kept.

He added it was a great pleasure to him to be able to say a few words, as he felt that Old Boys did really watch our progress, especially our sporting successes, and "always take care to let me know." The surest proof of interest was sending their sons to the School.

Mr. Stephenson spoke of the War Memorial, which owed its first incentive to the Old Boys' Association. There were now 821 names on the roll, and more were continually coming in. It was a pity so many were not members of the Association. About 4,000 names were on the School roll, and many of those still living were not traceable. The wrong attitude towards membership had, unfortunately, been adopted by many, viz., "What is to be gained by joining?" Their presence at the war shows how many possess the spirit of sacrifice, and all should be members of the Association, all should help the Association and the School. The more Old Boys see of the School the better. The Association was, naturally, somewhat stagnant just now,-in recess; but in its early days there had been more frequent meetings, and there would be again. He looked forward to the time when the Memorial Library would be a meeting place for various purposes, keeping among us those 820 or more. He trusted that the Association would continue to show interest in the scheme.

A Southern association gave £100,000 to its School Building Fund. We here are, perhaps, not so wealthy, nor so well educated up to giving liberally. Yet it was one of our greatest privileges.

Mr. Bousfield raised the point as to the date of the Jubilee Celebrations, and the President, in reply, said the Jubilee should celebrate the 50th anniversary of Foundation Day, but would, of course, await the termination of the war. He alluded to the School Record, first issued by the late Mr. Francis, and now being revised and brought up-to-date by Mr. Stephenson.

Mr. T. E. Jones, endorsing the principle that Old Boys should keep in touch with the School, thought that annual meetings should be held at the School, that members should be specially notified of School fixtures, such as cricket and rowing matches. sports, plays, etc., and that a great debt of gratitude was owing to Mr. Stephenson for his enthusiasm in making the War Memorial the success it was.

Mr. Troedson, speaking of finance, said that we were really better off than last year. Last year's balance included £15 earmarked for the War Memorial, whereas, this year's balance was clear.

Dr. Kerr-Scott said the amount of the annual subsciption was too small. Older members, at least, should be asked to pay more.

The motion before the meeting was then put and carried by acclamation.

The election of officers for the new year was then proceeded with. The Chairman proposed Mr. Roe for the Presidency, and announced that owing to the general improvement in his health, Mr. Roe had expressed his readiness to accept and attend meetings. Dr. Kerr Scott seconded and Mr. Roe was declared elected

Mr. F. S. N. Bousfield was then proposed and seconded for the vice-presidency, and declared elected.

Mr. J. G. Nowlan was unanimously re-elected Hon. Secretary and Treasurer.

Messrs. E. R. Crouch, S. Stephenson, R. M. King, T. E. Jones. T. C. Troedson, W. T. Evans, and C. R. Gregory were elected to Council.

Messrs. A. R. Webb and P. Newman-Wilson were re-elected Hon. Auditors.

A general discussion ensued as to the exact date of the celebration of the School Jubilee, Mr. Bousfield urging that it was time to consider the forming of a committee to take the matter in hand. After an interchange of opinions as to the propriety of taking the date of laying of the foundation stone or that of the opening of the School. Mr. Jones moved that, "A special meeting be called to discuss the question." Dr. Kerr-Scott supported, and after Dr. Thelander and Mr. G. S. Crouch had spoken, the motion was put to the meeting and lost.

Mr. Bousfield pressed for a definite expression of opinion, so as to leave plenty of time for preparations if necessary.

Mr. Evans then proposed that the celebration should be deferred to a more suitable time. Mr. King urged that the Trustees be notified of this opinion, and finally the motion was put and carried in the following terms :—" That it is the opinion of the meeting that the Jubilee of the School should date fifty years from the last day of February, 1868, but that the question of celebration should be deferred, if necessary, to a more fitting time."

Dr. Thelander, referring again to subscriptions, said that our limited financial resources would be a drawback in making preparations for the Jubilee. He suggested that after five years, members ought to have so determined their financial standing as to be able to pay a considerably higher amount than at the beginning. He proposed, therefore, "That with a view to improving the financial position of the Association, the incoming Council be asked to consider the advisability of raising the amount of subscription."

Mr. Bousfield seconded the motion, which, after some further discussion, was put to the vote and carried.

Mr. Bousfield then proposed a vote of thanks to the outgoing President. It would be hard, he said, to find a more patient and tolerant chairman.

Mr. E. R. Crouch, in reply, said he had sat as one of the six members of the first Council that discussed, with Mr. Roe, the foundation of the Old Boys' Association, and he would always continue to be keenly interested in its welfare and that of the School.

Mr. C. R. Gregory proposed a vote of thanks to the Hon. Secretary, saying that, as one who had himself filled the post in past years, he could appreciate the work done by the present Secretary, especially in view of the greatly increased membership.

Mr. J. G. Nowlan having suitably responded, the Chairman declared the meeting closed.

The balance to the credit of the Costin Memorial Fund now stands at slightly over £25. Members who intend to subscribe, and we feel sure there are several only waiting to be reminded should send in their cheques at once, as we are, naturally, anxious that the memorial should take effect by giving a medal at the end of the current year.

Since above was written, it was decided, at a meeting of Council, held on 23rd October, to close the Costin Memorial Fund at £30, and invest it in the War Loan. It was also decided that no award would be made this year.

Applications for enrolment in the Association have come in pretty well since last issue. We spoke of a score of new names then. We can now speak of more than half a hundred, which is not so bad for an institution that is in recess.

Members will, no doubt, join with the writer in sincere sorrow at the loss of two of our oldest members. There are not many of us who will not grieve at the removal, by death, from our midst of genial "Pat" Fewings, after a rather painful and lengthy illness; while the sudden death, by accident, of T. W. Rabjohns, of Mooloolah, deprives the Association of a member of many years' standing.
