Editorial

THIS year the School opened under difficulties, Mr. Bousfield and several of the staff being detained owing to quarantine regulations, and so we had to work the first week without them. However, let us hope that all those who are to represent us at the Senior and Junior Exams, at the end of the year, have settled down to work in earnest. As a result of the Armistice, numbers of our Old Boys are now returning from the Front. They have done their duty well, but in the joy of their home-coming, there will be tears for those whom we will never greet again.

The number of our Old Boys who enlisted has risen to over 1,002, and the Honour Board is filled up; the number of our "honoured dead" having risen to 167. Let us hope that the proposed memorial to these splendid and heroic men will soon be begun.

We were sorry to lose Mr. Potts at the end of the first term, but he takes with him the best wishes of the whole School. He took an active part in cricket and rowing during his stay with us. At the beginning of the year, Mr. Lea resumed his duties at the School, after three years' service at the Front. May his future stay with us be long and pleasant! Mr. Pennycuick obtained 1st Class Honours in Chemistry, at the final examination in March, and we here take the opportunity of congratulating him.

Nobody may say of our Old Boys that they are not "doing their bit" to keep up the reputation of the School. In the Final Honours Examination, four of our Old Boys attained to First Class Honours, L. I. A. Micheli, O. W. Tiegs, N. C. Aitken, C. B. Mott. In the Senior Examination, our Sixth Form did well, gaining three University Scholarships, F. A. Irvine, gaining 2nd place in the University Scholarships.

Our Annual Swimming Sports were held in the Spring Hill Baths, and the thanks of all competitors are due to the officials who carried out the programme so efficiently. B. Burns won the Cup for our Championship, winning the 50 Yards and 440 Yards Championships, and gaining 2nd place in 100 Yards. J. G. Drake won the "Breast and Back," after a hard tussle with C. W. Williams. Swimming in all events, especially the junior ones, was of a high standard, and gives promise of a good team for next year. In the Secondary Schools' Swimming Sports, we were again defeated by Gregory Terrace, but several of our representatives performed well. J. G. Drake won the "Breast and Back" in fine style; whilst R. S. Stephenson broke the record for the 50 Yards Championship (under 14).

For the first few days of the Term, the Rowing Shed required the services of the Sixth Form. After two days' hard (?) work they succeeded in rescuing the pontoon from the bottom of the river.

At the Easter Regatta, Robertson's crew won in fine style from Hayne's [crew]. Our representatives for the All Schools Race are training hard under the efficient coaching of Mr. Williams, and we expect great things of them.

The First XI. finished up last season very well, winning the matches against Ipswich, Southport, Nudgee, Gregory Terrace, and Armidale. In the latter match, McDonnell scored 101 not out; whilst against Gregory Terrace, L'Estrange obtained 106. These were the only centuries scored this season.

This year, the team still has the services of McDonnell. We went to Esk on 14th March, and beat a combined team there by 72 runs on the first innings, thanks to a fine unfinished 82 of McDonnell's. The team had a pleasant trip under the charge of Mr. Connal, and an enjoyable stay there, thanks to the kindness of Mr. Lord and family, and the people of Esk.

We were defeated by Toowoomba by 80 on the first innings, but we were unfortunate in having to bat on the second day on a wicket soaked overnight with rain. Nothling bowled well, getting 9 for 71, and Moore batted nicely for 22 not out. After this match Nothling left for Sydney University, and he carries with him the good wishes of the team.

S. Julius has been elected Football Captain, and expects to get a good team out for the football season, which is already upon us. The rules have been amended, and the teams now consist of only 14 players each.

We are pleased to hear that "Tom" Lawton and "Les" Robinson are back from the Front. "Tommy" intends to attend the Queensland University this year, and has taken up his residence at St. John's College.

H. E. Roberts has resigned from the position of Editor of this Journal, as he has entered the Queensland University. We desire to express our appreciation of his conscientious efforts to make the B.G.S. Magazine a success.

War Notes

Mr. C. A. Bernays informs us that his son, Geoffrey C. A. Bernays, has been promoted to Lieutenant, and afterwards to Captain commanding 37th Army Troops Company Royal Engineers. He was awarded the M.B.E. for "valuable services rendered in connection with military operations in Salonika."

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B.G.S. War Memorial Fund

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Since the last issue of the Magazine, the scheme for establishing a War Memorial has taken more definite shape. The General Committee discussed many proposals, and finally decided to recommend to the general body of subscribers that a Memorial Building should be erected on the School grounds to be used as a Library, Committee Room, and War Relic Room. In this would be placed the Honour Board and other memorials of the heroes of the war. The Golden Book, which is to record the part played by our Old Boys in the war, would be placed there. It would be a constant reminder of the courage and patriotism of our predecessors in the School, and an inspiration to all coming generations at the School. A meeting of subscribers was held in the Assembly Hall on March 21st, and those present unanimously approved of the scheme. The committee have formed plans for a determined effort to raise the funds necessary. At present the subscriptions received and promised amount to £1,262. Two memorial windows have also been promised—one by Mr. H. W. Atkinson, in memory of Captain J. V. Atkinson, who fell in action on April 5th, 1918, and the other by Col. C. F. Plant, in memory of Captain H. F. H. Plant, who was killed on August 9th, 1916.

Whilst generous support has been accorded to the scheme, the Committee feel that much more money must be raised before an adequate memorial can be erected. Plans have been formed for an active personal canvass, which will be carried out as soon as possible. If each Old Boy, or each relative of an Old Boy volunteer, gives a fitting subscription, we shall have no difficulty in raising the funds required. But we must judge a subscription to be fitting only if it means sacrifice on our part. Our Old Boys have sacrificed much for us, many of them have laid down their lives, and we owe it to their memory and to the School to do more than give what we shall not miss. The Secretary will welcome all subscriptions and promises of help.

The Committee has also started on the task of collecting data for the Golden Book. The next-of-kin have been asked to forward biographical records and photographs of the volunteers. Unfortunately, it has not been possible to obtain addresses of all, and anyone who can give the address

of the next-of-kin of the following, is requested to forward it to Mr. Stephenson, the Hon. Secretary. The dates in parentheses are the dates at which the volunteer attended the B.G.S.

Our First Class Honourmen

NOEL CRAWFORD AITKEN.—Whilst at the School (1910-14) he displayed marked ability in mathematical and scientific studies, winning the Francis Prize, the Cockle Prize, and the Bowen Prize. In 1912 he gained the Byrnes' Medal, securing first place in the Queensland Junior Public Examination. In 1914 he passed the Senior with six merits and two passes, and was awarded second place in the University Scholarship list. During his stay in the Engineering School at the University, he had brilliant successes, and last year passed his final examination for his B.E. Degree. In March he sat for the Final Honours Examination, and obtained First Class Honours in Civil Engineering.

CHARLES B. MOTT (1910-1914).—At the School he established a reputation for steady application and all round ability. In 1912 he gained an excellent pass in the Junior, and obtained a Trustees' Extension Scholarship. He passed the Senior in 1914 with 2 merits and 5 passes, and gained a University Scholarship. He has now been through the Engineering Department at the University, and, in March last, obtained First Class Honours in Civil Engineering at the Final Honours Examination.

LOUIS I. A. MICHELI (1911-15).—In 1913 he gained an excellent pass in the Junior, and obtained a Trustees' Extension Scholarship. In 1915 he won the Cockle Prize, and finished a successful School career by gaining First University Scholarship to the University. He passed the Senior with 6 merits and 2 passes, and took up the Science Course at the University. After a good University career, he obtained his B.Sc. Degree with First Class Honours in Chemistry.

O. W. TIEGS (1911-15).—After three years' good work at School, he obtained the excellent pass in the Junior, of six merits and three passes. Having won a Trustees' Extension Scholarship, he continued at the B.G.S. until 1915, when he passed the Senior with five merits and three passes, and obtained a University Scholarship. During his Science Course at the University he gained merits in Biology at the Annual Examinations, and in March he obtained his degree of B.Sc. with First Class Honours in this subject.


University Scholarship Winners

F. A. IRVINE.—Entered the B.G.S. in 1914 with a State Scholarship. His scholastic successes have been quite consistent. During his stay at the School, he won several merit prizes, the Harlin Prize in 1917, and in 1918 the Cockle Prize. He passed the Junior with 5 merits and 4 passes, and gained a Trustees' Extension Scholarship. Passing the Senior with 3 merits and 4 passes, he won a University Scholarship, and has now taken up his residence at King's College. During his School career he was librarian, and a Sergeant in the Cadets. He has entered the Faculty of Applied Science at the University.

N. R. M. CRAIGIE.—Came to the B.G.S. in 1914 as a State scholar. He passed the Junior in 1916 with three merits and six passes. In 1917 and 1918 he won General Merit prizes at the School. Last year he passed the Senior with 2 merits and five passes, and obtained a University Scholarship. At School he acted as librarian in 1917, and he has now entered the Faculty of Applied Science at the University.

H. E. ROBERTS.—Entered the B.G.S. in 1914 after coming third in the State Scholarship list. Whilst at School he won prizes for "English, History and Geography," "Form," and "Mathematics" prizes. In 1916 he won the Lilley Silver Medal for Vth Form and the Francis Memorial Prize, and also gained a Trustees' Extension Scholarship. In 1918 he was head of the School, and gained the Lilley Gold Medal and a prize for English. He passed the Senior with 3 merits and 3 passes, obtaining a University Scholarship. He represented the School in cricket, shooting, athletics and football, gaining his colours in the latter. In 1918 he was School Prefect and Editor of the Magazine, and is now taking up the Arts Course at the University.

Old Boys' Association

Many events of a more cheery nature than we have been accustomed to of late years have taken place since our last report. Although the work of the peace conference is not yet completed, the Armistice and general demobilisation of belligerents have already sent back to our shores many of our noble fellows who have helped to humble the Teutonic pride. How to give our own boys a fitting reception was much debated at your Council's meetings. As a first step in that direction, it was decided to entertain all who were available on Foundation Day. Circulars were issued to members, inviting them to act as hosts, and 180 invitations were issued to returned soldiers to be present as our guests at the dinner on February 28th. The result was a response on the part of members, and a roll-up on the part of returned Old Boys that was balm indeed to the hearts of all concerned, proving, as it did, not only how genuine was the welcome extended, but also how very much alive the Association was when occasion called. This grand spirit of enthusiasm and vitality permeated the whole celebration, and even the unfavourable and rainy weather was unable to damp its ardour or quench its fire. The day was a magnificent success, as even the phlegmatic newspapers had to admit. The report published in the Press compares it to a page out of "Tom Brown's Schooldays," and proceeds to describe the first event of the day—a new and welcome addition to the celebration—the Boat Race in which the "rather big, hefty crew" of Old Boys won a three length's victory over the "rather light" School crew. The various sporting items of the day are recorded in detail elsewhere, "but it was the Old Boys' race all the way." The cricket match, to quote from the newspaper report, "will long remain memorable for the mammoth score of 544 made by the Old Boys." What with "Poley" Evans' 175, and the fine display of cricket made by Boyce and Biggs, not to mention such veterans as Newman and E. R. Crouch, the chances of the School were soon at a discount. The downpour of rain did not tend to improve their prospects, nevertheless the "Present" team put up a plucky fight, scoring 180 for 7 wickets, and so staved off a crushing defeat. Mr. R. S. Irvine who again was organiser of the match reports that applications for a place on the team were never so numerous. The players were, as usual, hospitably entertained at lunch by the Headmaster and Mrs. Bousfield. The tennis was also won by the Old Boys, represented by Messrs. Marshall, Baynes, Gregory, Forbes, Oxley, and Tozer, the last named having arranged the players. There was a fair sprinkling of lady visitors at the matches, but owing to the weather, not nearly so many as we were accustomed to in pre-war days. Afternoon tea was more or less enjoyed in the midst of showers of rain. As evening drew on, the numbers arriving to take part in the reception

dinner rapidly increased, and many a warm hand-shake greeted our soldier guests on their appearance. When the dinner bell rang at 7 p.m., there was almost a crush as hosts and guests moved into the old hall. Almost two hundred sat down to table—truly a record gathering in numbers as well as for other reasons. It was really a fine sight, and gratifying indeed to those who had been actively engaged in organising the gathering. When one realises how natural it is for returned men to scatter over the whole of the State, to their various homes, it was a great reward for our efforts to have fully 50 Old Boy soldier guests sitting with us once more. To report the names of all those present is rather a big order, in view of the cost of printing just now. The occasion, however, was such a memorable one, that our guests should have their names recorded, and we have always listed members. One or two little incidents during the progress of the dinner went far towards proving the deep loyalty and genuine feeling which animated the celebration. One was the spontaneous ovation accorded to Mr. Roe by all present, especially the returned soldiers, on his unavoidably tardy arrival at the table, an outburst of enthusiasm not enhanced by the valiant, if somewhat violent, efforts of a certain veteran of the South African as well as the recent war, to struggle through closely packed tables and chairs to shake hands with his old headmaster.

While the speech-making was going on your Honorary Secretary was so busily engaged in pleasant and eminently successful financial pursuits that he was quite unable to devote time and attention to culling and arranging in literary bouquets the flowers of eloquence that were scattered broadcast over the assembly by the various speakers. From the Press reports however, a little portion of the many fine sentiments uttered may be quoted. After the Royal Toast had been duly honoured, Mr. Bousfield, in his twofold capacity as Headmaster and present President of the Association, gave the toast of "Our Guests," and in his usual happy and eloquent style, extended an affectionate and warm greeting to our returned soldier Old Boys. He was seconded by Mr. Roe, as former Headmaster, who spoke with deep feeling. "Welcome," he said, "thrice welcome back to the land you have so nobly saved by your valour and your determination. We were proud of you when you set an example of loyalty and patriotism in a manner which we are convinced will never be forgotten. We have watched your sons from day to day, followed your every movement, and I am sure

felt joy in your achievements. I hope that you will not find Queensland civilian life too dull, after the strain and excitement of over there, and I now wish you all happiness and prosperity in your new life."

Replying on behalf of the guests, Lieutenant Colonel Frank O'Mahony thanked the Chairman and Mr. Roe for the warm welcome extended to them, saying he was sure that every one of them was pleased to be fit enough and able to offer their services, and take part in one of the greatest happenings in the history of the world. The deeds of the Australian Army could bear comparison with any other in the war, and the achievements of the Old Boys of the Brisbane Grammar School would stand comparison with those of any other of the great public schools of the world. Much had been said, of late, about the discipline of Australian soldiers. His experience was that the Australian is an individual in himself. He can be led but he cannot be driven. Place him on his honour and he will never break his pledge. Put restrictions on him, and the first thing that enters his mind is how he can circumvent them. He added that we did not realise what Great Britain had done in the war. During the four years she had recruited, equipped, trained, and placed in the field, or on the sea, 8½ millions of men. During that time the British Navy had hunted every enemy ship from the sea, and had carried 15 millions of men forth and back across the sea. He did not think any other country could have done it. Whenever the Hun started anything the British had beaten it, whether it was gas flying, or bomb-dropping. We had beaten the Hun in the war, and we can beat him in commerce. Each of us could assist to that end by refusing to buy German goods.

Lieutenant E. Maurice Little, in an eloquent and, at times, a humorous speech, expressed thanks for the hearty welcome, and emphasised the good discipline of the Australian soldier. He spoke (and well he might) of the splendid manner in which our Old Boys had acquitted themselves on Gallipoli. Many and many an Old Boy was lying there, or in France, who would never again see the Old School; yet they would be as valuable to the School in death as they would have been in life. What the Old Boys had done in the war would help the present boys to realise that the game was worth being played, and played in manly fashion. "We would all," he said, "be glad if we could have our old School days over again. Now, after dinner, and whilst in a magnanimous frame of mind, we extend to our old masters full forgiveness and absolution for any severe penalty inflicted on us, or any humiliation to which they may have subjected us!"

After a musical interval, Major H. R. Carter rose to propose "The Old School," a toast, he said, which strictly speaking took precedence even of that of welcoming the returned soldiers; for was it not the School he said, that had achieved the splendid work of creating the public spirit and moulding the character of those boys, and so made it possible for them to do what they had accomplished.

Mr. Bousfield, in replying to the toast, said Major Carter has just stated that he attributed the noble doings of the Old Boys at the Front to the splendid influence of the School in which their characters were formed. It is, indeed, a pleasure to hear that said. It shows that the work of Mr. Roe and myself, who have put in many years here, has not been in vain. It has been customary, in the past, for me to speak of the improvements which have been carried out—to speak of the things which we have and—~~and~~ reason and necessity. Now, however, I intend to speak of things which we have not, and things which we need. One thing is a preparatory school; another is a new boat, the reason for this latter being that before we purchased the present boat the governing body controlling rowing passed a rule that boats were to be a certain weight. We complied with this rule, but other schools did not, and built their boats to suit their own requirements, the result being that our boat is much heavier than those of other schools.

then spoke of the War Memorial, saying he felt quite sure that Old Boys would agree that the proposed building, with its library of reference books, and its memorial boards, and the Golden Book containing the records of and honours won by every Old Boy who joined the colours, or assisted in the Great War, was the best memorial, and would be a most useful asset to the School; and in time to come boys would look on those war records, and into that Golden Book, with pride, and, pointing to a name, say to their school mates, "That was my grandfather."

After another excellent musical contribution, the toast of the "Old Boys' Association" was proposed by Dr. Wilton Love, and responded to by the Vice-President, Dr. A. B. Carvosso.

More highly appreciated vocal items, which were enthusiastically encored, followed, and then the teams were toasted and responded to by the respective captains. A pleasing item towards the close of the function, was the vote of thanks cordially and unanimously passed to the gentlemen who added so much to the enjoyment of the evening by their excellent instrumental and vocal contributions. It was almost a pity that such a memorable and successful function had eventually to come to an end.

It was the first of probably many such gatherings, for even now only about quarter of those who answered the call of duty and Empire have returned; and as each fresh batch comes home, we hope to have some welcome in store for them.

It will be of interest to members to learn that since last Annual Meeting, 75 names have been added to the roll of the Association, and we have every reason to hope that before very long we shall have reached a membership running into four figures. What about a revival of the question of club rooms as a rendezvous and pied-à-terre for Old Boys?

We are pleased to note that an effort has been made to revive the Past Grammars Football Club; but that the war has left its mark on it is painfully evident. We miss many well-known and formerly conspicuous players. Still a beginning has been made, and the future is in the lap of the gods.
