Describe your greatest asset that has helped you navigate your career journey.



During my days as manager, I fell in love with project management, which then led me to becoming part of implementing Epic electronic medical system into the organization.

Who would you consider your professional mentors?

What advice would you give sonographers?



Class Activities

The second level sonography students were treated to a lecture given by Dr. David Mariner MD, Director of the Vascular Lab at Geisinger Wyoming Valley Medical Center.

Dr. Mariner shares the evolution of vascular treatment and current options for the intervention of vascular pathology. Through interesting cases, he shares his value of the sonographers in providing quality examinations to aid in determination of best intervention for the patient. Often the vascular sonographer is the first to document the pathological process; therefore, quality and accuracy is essential for the patient and for the physician.
