

High quality Arabic language teaching in British overseas schools

Summary, from Dr Mark Evans and Madam Fatima Al Zayani

The course will cover the key knowledge, understanding and skills required to provide high quality Arabic language teaching in British overseas schools. These include child development, preparation for teaching, adhering to the Ministry requirements, the English national curriculum for modern foreign languages, the importance of self-reflection and classroom techniques.

The course is presented in English and in Arabic.

It is the first of three levels – introductory, intermediate and advanced. Each level is fully certified by Penta International.

Rationale

This level 1 course is an introduction to those skills needed for providing high quality Arabic language teaching in British schools. It is also suitable for teachers of Social Studies and Islamic Studies.

It does not lead to a generic professional qualification - there isn't one – but certification by Penta is recognised in schools and most countries around the world. It is a foundation course aimed at those who are already working as teachers or who wish to become teachers.

There is an examination process at the end of the course, which you may write in English or Arabic. Only those passing the assessment will receive a certificate of completion. Holders of that certificate will be able to proceed to the second stage of training, which focuses on a more detailed exploration of teaching techniques.

The course is hard work. We operate on the basis of 'British timing'. You cannot miss any part of it. You will need to work fast, sometime alone and sometimes as part of a team. There is 'homework', usually tasks which will be discussed with other members of group on the following day.

I hope you both enjoy and benefit from it.
