Using similes in poetry-

Another "tool" that poets use are similes. A simile is a way to compare two unlike things, and it gives meaning to a poem. The comparison is written with the words <u>like</u> or <u>as</u>, and it makes the description more vivid.

For example: She is as brave as a lion. In this sentence, 'she' is being compared to a 'lion' to show that she is extremely brave.

Assignment: Complete the *Simile Search* sheet that is in your folder. When you finish, create a poem on the Poetry Document that is in your Language Arts Classroom and try to add in one or two similes. Use your heartmap for inspiration. Remember, your poem can be about anything. I have attached a sample simile poem that I wrote to give you ideas. When you finish, please DO NOT hit the 'turn in' button. Writing: Another 'tool' that gives a poem meaning is <u>personification</u>. Personification is when you give an object human behaviors, thoughts, or actions in order to make the description more vivid.

For example: Lightning danced across the sky. (lightning can't really dance, but a person can)

I heard the last piece of pie calling my name. (pie can't really talk, but a person can) The moon played hide and seek with the clouds. (the moon can't really play hide and seek, but a person can)
