

Dear Members of the Lyme-Old Lyme Communities,

On February 5, the Region #18 Board of Education approved a \$35,066,107 budget for the 2020-2021 school year. This proposed budget, which will be voted on by the community in May, represents a 0.05% decrease over the prior year. We are not aware of any other time in the 47 year history of our district that we have had a budget decrease!

This decrease in the budget is in large part due to a significant drop in debt service payments for our outstanding bonds. Over the years we have refunded these bonds numerous times to realize additional savings for the district. In addition, our health insurance rates continue to grow at a pace that is far lower than the state average. These savings have allowed us to develop a budget that does not reduce or negatively impact any of our programs yet does represent a decreased cost to the taxpayer.

Included in the budget are two major capital projects; the renovation of the Lyme School gymnasium and the completion of the high school tennis court replacement, which is scheduled to begin in June. These two projects will provide a safer learning environment for our students.

Our proposed budget includes a number of enhancements to our already strong programs. Specifically, we are planning to replace our SmartBoards with digital display boards and purchase new musical instruments to replace some older pieces. We are continuing to grow our curriculum around the Next Generation Science Standards and are adding to our existing social/emotional learning programs.



RETURN On Investment

The Lyme-Old Lyme schools are proud of our success that is shared below.

Measurements of Success:

- SAT (the CT state standardized test for all high schools). LOLHS ranked 10th in the entire state in both English/Language Arts testing and Mathematics testing.
- SBAC (the CT state standardized test for all middle and elementary schools). Lyme-Old Lyme students ranked 2nd in fifth grade English/ Language Arts, 5th in fifth grade mathematics, 4th in third grade mathematics, and 6th in seventh grade mathematics.
- NGSS (the CT state standardized science test for all fifth, eighth, and eleventh grade students). Lyme-Old Lyme fifth graders ranked 1st, our eighth graders ranked 4th, and our eleventh graders ranked 20th.

- This fall, Newsweek, partnered with STEM.org, ranked LOLHS as being in the Top 10% of America's Best Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) High Schools.
- LOLHS was recognized as the 2019-20 CT Interscholastic Athletic Conference Michael's Cup Award Winner for their efforts in launching and implementing the CIAC Class Act Schools sportsmanship program which is designed to empower schools and specifically students to enhance sportsmanship.
- 16 students were accepted into the Eastern Music Festival. Four
 of those were selected for the All State Music Festival along with
 three others who were selected to participate in the All New England
 Festival. One student was selected to perform with the All-National
 High School Jazz Band in Orlando, Florida.
- Ten students were recognized at the Connecticut Scholastic Art Awards which included recognition for five Gold Keys, one Silver, six honorable mentions, and the Connecticut Art Administrators Association award for Best in Printmaking.
