
3. V'AL KULAM


The setting is based on the traditional text, Hashkiveinu, found in the evening liturgy for Shabbat, festivals and weekdays.


9. OSEH SHALOM

12. SHOMEIR YISRA'EIL

Samuel Alman

Alman was Music Director of the Great Synagogue in London.

This setting was published in 1925, in a volume titled, Synagogue Compositions by Samuel Alman, Part I. Like many of Alman's masterpieces, his Shomeir Yisrael is marked by a deep reverence for tradition combined with rich choral harmonies.

The text is found both near the conclusion of the powerful and poignant Selichot liturgy, (Prayers of Forgiveness), which introduces the High Holy Day season, and near the close of the Tachanun liturgy, (Personal Prayers and Supplications), chanted on specified weekday mornings and afternoons.

"Guardian of Israel, guard the remnant of Israel; and preserve the people Israel, who proclaim: Sh'ma Yisrael.

> Guardian of a unique people, guard the remnant of that people; and preserve that people who affirm: Adonai is our God, Adonai alone.

Guardian of a holy people, guard the remnant of that holy people; and preserve that holy people who chant in praise of the Holy One: Kadosh, Kadosh, Kadosh."
