Our commitment to upholding the British Values is included within this.


#### **CHILDREN AS LEADERS**

At Holmbush, we believe in giving children responsibilities and allowing their voice to be heard. Therefore, we work hard to make sure that children have opportunities to develop their leadership skills in a variety of ways including, but not limited to:

- each year, children in Year 6 apply for the position of Head Boy and Head Girl. Through this, the whole school learns about public speaking, debating and democratic voting.
- every class nominating two School Councillors. These children act as the voice for their class; passing their thoughts and views onto the Senior Leaders. They are involved in decision making and evaluating the work of the school.
- giving children ownership of the way playtimes are organised through the use of Play Leaders.

#### PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT

Children learn best when all their key adults are working together. At Holmbush, we use a variety of methods of communication with parents and carers. We use ClassDojo as a way of giving parents an insight into what is happening in their child's classroom on a daily basis; newsletters are used to celebrate all the great work that is happening in the school; parents are welcomed into the Academy at least once a term to share their child's learning journey; and every parent will have the chance to attend one of our celebration assemblies.



### **CURRICULUM AND LEARNING**

Holmbush Primary Academy is committed to meeting the requirements of the primary National Curriculum, reflecting its content and challenge. We believe in providing children with rich, broad and creative experiences in order to engage and deepen their learning within a culture of high aspirations and expectations.

The whole school community work together to ensure that our curriculum is engaging, relevant, and progressive. It develops the academic abilities of each child whilst keeping the Holmbush Values at the heart of everything it does in order to nurture social, moral, spiritual and cultural understanding.

Our curriculum is inclusive and is taught with the consideration of the needs of all our learners. Each child is seen as unique and we aim to provide equity of opportunity and a challenging curriculum that builds on strong foundations.

Teaching and learning takes place through a wide range of exciting topics, designed to be relevant to the pupils we teach. We believe in developing individuals who are committed to lifelong learning. To ensure our pupils achieve this we provide them with the knowledge and skills that are essential to future success. We encourage them to ask questions, apply their knowledge in different contexts, link their learning to real life experiences and solve problems.

Our focus is on developing outstanding skills in reading, writing and maths because we believe this opens doors to many life opportunities and enables pupils to learn effectively across a wide range of subjects. We use high-quality texts as a stimulus to engage and motivate learners.

We also recognise the importance of developing and unlocking our children's abilities and talents in areas beyond this. Therefore, these skills are embedded within the teaching of the arts, humanities, sport and modern foreign languages. Through this, we improve the children's knowledge and understanding of both their local community and the wider world. It is important that the children in our community understand a range of cultures beyond their immediate experience so this is included within our curriculum.

At Holmbush, we believe that learning should take place both inside and outside the classroom. Therefore, we use Forest Schools and other visits to enrich our curriculum and provide meaningful experiences for all our children.

#### **CREATIVE CURRICULUM**

As an academy we are able to enhance the curriculum in creative ways. We begin each term with a 'stunning start', designed to enthuse and inspire children and end with a 'fantastic finish' to celebrate achievement. Where possible we invite educational visitors, or go on an educational visit or exploration, to deepen the children's understanding of their topic.

Each term, parents are welcomed into our Academy to share their children's learning journey.

### SUPPORTING SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS AND DISABILITIES

Our aim is for all pupils including those with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) to achieve their very best and become successful, well-rounded individuals.

We believe that all children should have high-quality teaching and access to the curriculum adjusted to meet their individual needs. We have an inclusion coordinator who has responsibility for the SEND policy in the Academy: providing advice and support for staff, and working in partnership with parents and carers.

Pupils are regularly assessed so that SEND can be identified as early as possible. We follow an 'assess, plan, do and review' cycle to ensure individual needs are met.

#### WRAP AROUND CARE

We run a daily Breakfast Club which provides (for a fee) a child care service for children aged 4–11, in term-time only. Breakfast Club runs from 7.30am and children are offered breakfast and a drink.

Our After School Club runs on Monday to Thursday until 5.30pm. Children are provided with a healthy snack in accordance with our healthy eating policy, and take part in a range of activities. Parents can book their children in for a full session (3.15-5.30pm) or a half session (3.15-4.30pm). On Fridays children can attend our film club until 5pm.

#### **EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES**

We also offer a wide variety of extracurricular activities. These may include football, multi-sports, music and games. We have an active sports programme run by the Academy's Sports Coach and participate in the interschool tournaments.











### **GOVERNANCE AND OUR SPONSOR**

### Our governance arrangements are set by the University of Brighton Academies Trust.

#### **LOCAL BOARD**

We have a Local Board that contributes to our Academy's vision and future strategy. It is responsible for ensuring that our Academy maintains strong community links and effective communication with all stakeholders including parents and carers. It is also responsible for monitoring student wellbeing, admissions, complaints and concerns.

Local Boards include individuals from the community, including parents and carers. They are accountable to the Trust's Board of Trustees.

#### **BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

The Trustees are responsible for determining the Trust's strategic direction, including overarching responsibility for the three core functions: the Trust's vision, educational standards and financial performance.

Trustees are also responsible for ensuring the Trust complies with charity and company law, as well as its funding agreement with the Secretary of State. The Board of Trustees includes representatives from the Trust's sponsor and local people with a wide range of expertise.

#### **IN-YEAR ADMISSIONS**

The administration of these places is carried out on behalf of the Trust by West Sussex County Council. Details of these arrangements are posted on the Academy's website.
