80 AND NOT OUT! By Andrew Foot (1951-1984)



Andrew Foot was 80 in February. On behalf of The Old Russellians, Julia sent Andrew a card to wish him a Happy Birthday and to wish him well. She also asked him to pen a few words for our next newsletter. Here is his response:

Julia has asked me to pen some memories of our life at Royal Russell School, but it

is difficult to select the most salient features. Our time was divided into three by the houses in which we lived. From 1951-62, we were in New Ballards where our two sons, Peter (53) and Simon (49) were born. For most of those years Kit and Crispin Smith and their two daughters lived below and, although we were desperately poor on £25 per month, we were very happy.

Until the 1980s the X1s played their matches every Wednesday and Saturday, and we lost very few cricket or hockey games though all our opponents were representatives from larger schools.

In 1962 we moved into Oxford House and stayed there until 1973. It was more convenient for me as housemaster, but Lorna and our sons regretted the freedom of the large garden at New Ballards. Our first neighbour was Christopher Tombleson, one of the great schoolmasters. It took some time to learn to know him as he was outwardly daunting, and he was as strict with young colleagues as he was with pupils. He was wholly dedicated to the school and his standards were immensely high. Essays had to be marked and returned within 24 hours! Many are the anecdotes about him and dear William Wright, art master and CCF commander - especially at the Surprise, the local to which they walked. We swore that we'd give up beer when it reached 2/- a pint.

Lorna and I spent our last eleven years in Hill View, the traditional residence of the Deputy Head. That followed the great crisis of 1972 when the governors of the time threatened to sell the school and staff were told they'd not be given references if they opposed the closure. We chanced it and the school was saved.

It is not possible to reduce 33 very happy years to a few words. Many of the pupils and staff would merit chapters to themselves. (60 of them still send us Christmas cards!) There are anecdotes which still reduce us to tears of laughter. We can only be grateful for so many happy memories and for so many good friends.



OBITUARY HARRY CRISPIN SMITH 1913-2007

Harry Crispin Smith was born on 25th October 1913 on St

Crispin's Day, so his history and poetry conscious parents christened him Harry Crispin, and echoes of Henry V's great speech before Agincourt resounded through his life. Educated at St John's, Leatherhead and Cambridge, he came to Russell School to teach History in 1935. When the war broke out in 1939 he joined the Royal West Kent Regiment, was commissioned and fought with them in two of the most significant battles of the War – El Alamein and Kohima. He was wounded, fortunately not seriously, in both, but returned to the staff at Ballards in 1945. He married Kit whilst on leave from the Army and they had two lovely daughters, Elizabeth and Caroline, whose early years were spent at Ballards. There was no counselling for soldiers in those days and Crispin very naturally was under serious strain, but his devotion to pupils was such that he did not give way, and he was promoted to Senior Master in 1946. He held that position until he retired in 1973, and his influence on staff and pupils was profound through his personality and very high ideals. One incidence of many was his annual Chapel address on Remembrance

'..... wasn't a very academic lad but was a keen games' player. He was burnt to death when his Lancaster was shot down', '....... had gained a university place but joined the Royal Navy in 1940. He was frozen to death when his ship was torpedoed'. Four or five such instances must have taught generations of O.R.s that war is not glorious, and that death in battle is not the clean, sudden occurrence that is portrayed in war films.

Sunday. He recollected for us, boys whom he had known before 1939

and he would go down the list, telling us where they had been seated in

Chapel and saying how they had died.

Notwithstanding, Crispin had a tremendous sense of humour and he had nicknames for everything from the stance of local cricketers (Addington Crouch) to one of the matrons (The Witch of Enda). A butcher boy, delivering at New Ballards, was severely frightened when Crispin, thinking it was me, stuck his head out at knee level, gibbering with his false teeth outside his mouth. His imitations of our then PE instructor, and his equally cockney ex-pugilist assistant, could reduce the whole Common Room to tears of laughter.

Crispin's love of his subject and cricket were communicated to generations of pupils. With very few honourable exceptions, they don't make schoolmasters like that any more - ones who spend their working lives devoted to the school and one who worked in it for, often, fifteen hours a day. Crispin was a great man and he enriched the lives of all of us who were fortunate enough to be in contact with him.

TRUSWELL BY FARR by John Farr (1935-1940) - Deceased May 2007

WILLIAM SIMPSON TRUSWELL

In the recent spate of reminiscences of life at Ballards there is little reference to the outstanding character whose name appears at the heading of this piece. I seek to redress by recounting a few memories of the man known as Trussie, but also as Bill or Old Bill portrayed in the Bairnsfather cartoons of the First World War.

Philip, one of the sons of Headmaster Roberts, told me that his father had taken on Trussie on the basis of his strength of character rather than his academic achievements, for he held only a teacher's certificate rather than a degree. However, it proved to be an inspired decision. Bill taught the junior forms English, History and Scripture quite brilliantly.

As Housemaster of St Andrews, where all new boys spent their first term, Bill had a big hand in deciding who was to remain and which boys would eventually go to the other two houses, Oxford or Cambridge. Such a procedure would try the integrity of a saint, which Bill was not, but he did it as fairly as he could and I was quite happy to be one of those to remain in St Andrews, which was situated in the finest part of the grounds.

Bill ran a very tight ship and one was well advised not to overstep the mark, but his bark was often worse than his bite. He devoted much of his time to the organisation of sporting events, especially athletics, and in the same season was regularly on the Top Field supervising and recording the tests for the Glanfield Shield.

In the First World War Bill joined the Public Schools Battalion and I believe attained the rank of Sergeant, but his active soldiering was cut short by the misfortune of being captured by the enemy and spending the rest of the war behind the wire of a German PoW camp.

He played no formal part in the Cadet Corps, but I remember one occasion when he could not contain himself from taking action. Bill was strolling past our squad where a senior cadet was attempting to teach us Arms Drill and making a bit of a hash of it. Bill intervened and, seizing a rifle, proceeded to show us how it should be done correctly.

In this sense he played a part in launching me on my subsequent military career.

Bill should be remembered for his organising and conduct of the field sports for the Glanfield Shield, which consisted of running within a certain time and jumping high and long above a certain minimum. Every boy was expected to try these tests and acquire points for his house. It would have been very boring for the organiser, but Bill, with stopwatch and measuring tape in hand, did it every year with enthusiasm.

For relaxation, Bill used to retire to his favourite haunt, the Sandrock pub in Shirley village. Among the regular customers with whom Bill had become friendly were several who were entertainers and Bill never missed the opportunity of getting them up to school to entertain us. In those non-television days such occasions were much appreciated.

Bill adhered to a code of conduct and a set of values which were quite normal in the Victorian times in which he grew up, but which are rarely observed today. The following story illustrates this point.

One evening after Lights Out a real rumpus blew up in Oxford and Cambridge, targeted at a certain master, and it spilled over to breakfast the following morning. It was of no concern to us in St Andrews and we stayed silent and aloof. After House Prayers that evening, Bill, pointing to a boy named Francis Anderson, said, "Why did we not behave like cads last night?" Anderson was petrified and stood transfixed like a rabbit caught in headlights, but no sound came. Bill's finger then pointed at David McKergo and he repeated the question. McKergo drew himself up and replied, "Because, Sir, we are not cads". "That", said Bill "is the answer I wanted to hear". Then, without further words, he strode out of the room.
