EDITORIAL: GILES ENTWISLE

This Spring Term was a tale of two halves, so much activity packed into a short space of time means that no two weeks are the same, and there is always something really exciting for our pupils to engage with beyond the classroom on a nearly daily basis. And activities and events have not been limited to any one area of school life. We have enjoyed a Languages week, Science week, Galactic challenges, a marvellous year 3 and 4 play, an ancient Greek workshop, a cryptology competition, young engineers challenges, wonderful and engaging spring concerts, stunning LAMDA and music scholarship performances and a stunning choreographic competition, visits out of school, to the Downs and the beach, and the return of the LitFilm Fest after its outstanding debut last year. Just some of the activities which take place beyond the classroom.

The overriding sensation as Headmaster is one of being deeply impressed with each and every one of the pupils at Bede's. The performing and visual arts, through dance and music and theatre bring a critically important dimension to life and work at school. What impresses me most is our pupils' ability to adapt and to learn and to rise to a challenge. So many of the highlights mentioned above simply

happen as part of the waft and wane of school life; all within the context of lessons, assessments, scholarship exams, tutorials, sports fixtures and activities, punctuated with meals and play... Just try shadowing a pupil at Bede's for a day, most of us would give up by lunchtime and yet our pupils are able to participate, perform and deliver often without missing a beat. It's all very normal.



And then this. I have been quoted Vladimin Lenin a couple of times recently. "There are decades when nothing happens and there are weeks where decades happen at once". The suspending of lessons after the arrival of the Coronavirus put a temporary halt to activity at school, and pupils, parents and staff have had to adapt to a new way of learning beyond the classroom almost overnight. The last week of term was an incredibly steep learning curve for all involved and remote learning and teacher and pupil creativity has come to

the fore. In many ways the Easter holiday was suspended for staff, and as I write this editorial, remote learning forums are springing up amongst the teaching body as they embrace the challenges ahead through live video conferencing, screen casting, online collaborative projects, vlogging and so much more. Finding the right balance between on-line and off-line teaching and learning is another element of the remote classroom we are committed to getting right.



In just one week, where this practice is somewhat in its infancy, pupils have already shone. As with all challenges, they have embraced the new way of learning, and whilst only temporary, I am in no doubt that the digital literacy benefits, lessons learned and skills acquired will allow our pupils at Bede's to again raise the level of academic achievement and attainment once back in school. We look for the positives and opportunities and grab them with both hands. With every cloud...

BEDE'S PREP ANNOUNCES APPOINTMENT OF NEW HEADMASTER



Te are delighted to announce the appointment of Mark Hammond as the new Headmaster of Bede's Prep School. Selected from an impressive field of candidates, Mr Hammond succeeds Giles Entwisle and will take up his post at the start of the next academic year.



Mr Hammond is currently Headmaster at Skippers Hill Manor Preparatory School in Five Ashes, a post he has held with distinction since 2015.

Mr Hammond has a degree in English Language and Literature from Manchester University and, after finishing his PGCE at Cambridge University, he completed an MA in Education. During the early part of his career, Mr Hammond taught in a number of international schools across Europe and, latterly, was a Boarding Housemaster as well as Head of Day House at Junior Kings School, Canterbury. In 2012, he took on the role of Head of Pastoral Care at the Geneva English School before moving back to the UK to become Deputy Headmaster of Skippers Hill in September 2014 and then Headmaster a year later. Mr Hammond will be joined by his wife Sarah and their two children.

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In confirming the appointment, Bede's CEO and Headmaster of the Senior School, commented, "I am delighted that we have appointed Mark Hammond as Headmaster to lead Bede's Prep School. Mark is a highly accomplished educational leader, brings with him a wealth of experience and is a worthy successor to Giles Entwisle. I have no doubt that Mark will make a significant long-term contribution to Bede's Prep School,"

Commenting on his appointment Mr Hammond said, "It is a huge honour to be given the opportunity to lead such a forward-thinking. innovative and inspirational school. From our first visit, Sarah and I were struck by the warmth of everyone we met and I am looking forward to working with and serving the whole school community over the years to come."

Since the announcement of his appointment, Mr Hammond has visited the Prep School in order to meet staff and participate in training sessions as well as meet some pupils and he is looking forward to meeting parents as soon as possible in the autumn term

PETER PYEMONT: 1939 - 2020 VISIONARY PREP SCHOOL HEADMASTER WHOSE PUPILS INCLUDED EDDIE IZZARD AND

CHRISTOPHER MARTIN-JENKINS.

Te went on to found Bede's Senior School, one of the most successful independent secondaries of the postwar period.

Peter Pyemont, who has died aged 80, was a pioneering and charismatic prep school headmaster who also founded one of the largest and most successful new independent secondary schools of the postwar period.

As headmaster of St Bede's Prep School, Eastbourne, Pyemont applied his conviction that education is about more than academic achievement and includes the development of emotional, social, physical, creative and spiritual faculties.

From 1964, when he took over aged 25, to 1998, when he retired as headmaster, numbers at the School – grew from 40 to around 400 pupils and the school became a charitable trust in 1971.

Among other things Pyemont encouraged pupils to become involved in discussing new ideas and plans for the school, and under his leadership it built an enviable record of success in prep school sport.

The cricket commentator Christopher Martin-Jenkins, a boarder from the age of eight, recalled how "the pain of being wrenched from home and parents had been eased, indeed forgotten, by a game of cricket with my older brother and his friends on the first evening in my new surroundings."

A highlight of the school year were the plays and musicals Pyemont produced, which left a lasting impression on pupils such as the actor Nicky Henson and actor and comedian Eddie Izzard. Izzard, who played in the school's first football XI, complained on his website that Pyemont "had a strong thing about not putting me in plays", but the pair became friends, and Pyemont gets a mention in the credits to Izzard's forthcoming film Six Minutes to Midnight.

Finding that many parents wanted their children to benefit from the same approach to learning throughout their school careers, Pyemont began to search for a site for an upper school, and in 1978 the St Bede's School Trust purchased an estate at Upper Dicker, to the north of Eastbourne, formerly the home of the MP, financier and fraudster, Horatio Bottomley.

The following year the Senior School opened with 25 pupils. It now boasts a total of 750 pupils and 223 staff.

One of seven children, Peter Pyemont was born at Notley Abbey near Aylesbury (later the home of Laurence Olivier and Vivien Leigh) on May 11 1939 to Wilfrid and Ruth Pyemont (née Johnson) and brought up in Eastbourne. His father was a stockbroker and keen tennis

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player who had competed at Wimbledon, and all the family were keen on sports.

Peter attended St Bede's Prep School, where he and his fellow pupil, the satirist Peter Cook, played together in the school's cricket 1st XI and shared an interest in theatre. Cook, Pyemont noted later, "laughed at you", while Eddie Izzard "laughs with you".

He went on to Marlborough, where he represented the school at hockey and cricket and reached the final of the Public Schools Rackets Championships. He did National Service with the Black Watch and the Royal Sussex Regiments, quelling the bullies among his fellow recruits, many of them poorly educated conscripts, by reading to them their letters from home; this experience shaped his thinking on the importance of education.

Pvemont began his career teaching history at Chelmsford Hall Prep School, Eastbourne, where he took a diploma in education, before being appointed in 1964 as headmaster of St Bede's, aged just 25.



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While there he played tennis, squash and hockey for Sussex, captaining the hockey team for several years. He also captained Eastbourne Cricket Club, played for MCC and was a first-class ski judge.

Pyemont carried on as head of the Prep School after setting up the Senior School, appointing Roger Perrin as its first headmaster. He retired as head of St Bede's Prep in 1998, but stayed on as head of history for a further 10 years.

In 1989 Pyemont had won the Frank Fisher Memorial Prize presented by the Ecclesiastical Insurance Company with a thesis on "What the West could learn from the East" and spent three months in Asia, teaching in schools and meeting ministers of education.

After the fall of the Berlin Wall, he travelled to the former East Germany and established a scheme under which parties of children and their teachers visit Eastbourne to experience life in an British boarding school and learn English.



EDDIE IZZARD

We were delighted to welcome Eddie Izzard back to the Prep School for a work-in-progress performance of Charles Dickens' Great Expectations. Eddie's first love was acting and this special evening merged actor and comedian in a reading/performance of this much loved classic. It was an intimate and immersive

experience with the audience delighting in his inventive interpretation and evocative characterisation.

The following morning Eddie was back to give a special assembly to our Year 7 and 8 pupils - a first for him and a complete delight for our pupils. Warm, inspirational, funny and totally engaging. Eddie spoke about his time at Bede's, his motivations and love for performing both comedy (in several languages!) and acting. It was a real treat for our pupils from the Senior Years and we are hugely grateful to the time he gave so willingly.

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In retirement, Peter and his brother Christopher, who had taken over as headmaster at St Bede's Prep School, set up a public speaking company, Talking Heads, and gave entertaining lectures on everything from the First World War to the history of skiing.

Pyemont became a founder governor of Gildredge House Free School, also in Fastbourne.

In 1962 he married Elspeth Grant, who survives him with their son and daughter.

The session ended with the whole class doing CPR on their manikins to the

music of 'baby shark'! A fun afternoon was had by all!

Year 7 created some very special Harry Potterinspired potions. Harrison (Year 7) explains, "For the bubbling Polyjuice potion we added some ground unicorn horn to a mixture of dragon blood and



basilisk venom, along with bat bones, stars and more! The result was a bubbling potion that overflowed out of the small glass bottle.

"The next potion, the Deluminator, magically put out any candle in its way! We sprinkled ground bat bones around the outside of a candle and then added basilisk venom, the candle magically went out! This was my personal favourite.

"The last potion we made was Helious potion. We added basilisk venom to ground bat bones, and put a balloon over the top of the test-tube. We sat back and watched the magic take place! The balloon inflated to almost full capacity!"

In Year 8, pupils were tasked with an engineering challenge. Megan and Jess (Year 8) explain: "As part of our exciting Science Week, one of our competitions was to construct a boat using four paper cups, four drinking straws, 50cm of duct tape and 30cm of cling film. The aim was to keep the boat afloat with as many 10 gram weights as possible. These boats were



constructed in our Science lessons and we worked in pairs or groups to win a prize. At the end of the competition we were able to see that there were many different designs and structures. Some boats were more practical but odd in appearance and others were more attractive but lacked in practicality."

Very well done to all who took part - it was wonderful to see so much activity and excitement surrounding STEM from all of our participating pupils!

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LOOKING TO THE STARS AT BEDE'S GALACTIC CHALLENGE

Bede's Prep sent a team of budding engineers to Bede's Senior School for the School's Galactic Challenge event in January.

The event saw 120 children from schools across Sussex and Kent join forces to design a tourist destination on the moon in 2069, a century after the initial moon landing.

The pupils were organised into five teams, Solaris Flight Systems, Columbus Aviation, Astrodyne Delta, Infinity Aerospace and Hyperion Space Ventures. Bede's



Sixth Form Space Design students took mentoring and technical advisor positions and led the teams. Each team was tasked with allocating a President and then Heads of Department to lead key areas of the design including Human Engineering, Structural Engineering, Operations Engineering and Management. The teams then collaborated to create a design proposal, which they then presented to assembled parents and a judging panel featuring prominent STEM ambassadors and experts from the UKSDC in the afternoon.

Following their presentations and Q&A's, the judges announced Solaris Flight Systems as the winning team, with each pupil receiving a certificate and medal. Mr Richards, Galactic Challenge CEO and Teacher of Maths at Bede's Senior School, says, "We were truly impressed with everyone's efforts and teamwork at this year's Galactic Challenge; for children of such a young age, the ideas, imagination and cooperation shown throughout the day was astounding, and all involved should be very proud of what they achieved.

"This was our biggest year to date in terms of numbers,



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and it is fantastic to see the event getting more and more popular year on year. As well as encouraging children to pursue STEM in their studies - and potentially future careers - the Galactic Challenge offers an opportunity for them to build teamwork, communication and leadership skills. We very much look forward to next year's event."
