We have experienced an extraordinary past few weeks. At our first virtual Senior School Assembly this morning, I spoke to an empty Centenary Hall, and I must say I missed the usual cacophony of boys' voices that traditionally starts the assembly. I also introduced the virtual Middle School Assembly to connect with our youngest members of the community. I hope all boys listening and watching from home still felt a sense of inclusion and belonging.

During both assemblies, I encouraged boys to monitor their health closely. I explained that the purpose of this isolation is to keep as many Australians as safe and healthy as possible, and I urged them to take care of themselves and each other (from a safe distance, of course). No matter what happens this year, they should be proud of themselves, their resilience, and their ability to adapt to extreme circumstances. I am proud of the way BGS students are coping with this crisis.

I sincerely hope our BGS families are safe and well and that each student has adjusted to studying and learning online from home. We have all been heavily impacted by the measures in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. I am grateful for your support and understanding, and I thank everyone for their hard work and patience as we transitioned to remote schooling. The positivity shown across our community has been outstanding, and I appreciate how everyone has worked together to get the job done.

Before we look to what might happen after the Easter break, it is important to acknowledge the achievements of this term and the effort we have put into cocurricular sports and activities. The GPS season came to an early end for Volleyball, Cricket, Sailing and Debating, but I commend our students on the effort shown during training and competition. Despite missing the final rounds, the GPS Association has awarded premierships to reward and recognise the hours put in by students, coaches, officials, staff, teachers and parents.

Congratulations to our volleyballers, who share the GPS premiership with Gregory Terrace and Churchie. It is also important to acknowledge our Rowing First VIII, who after months of training, had an undefeated season and won the GPS Head of the River. Our swimmers also had a chance to contest the championship, and we congratulate them on their second place. The GPS Sailing Championship is postponed until later in the year, with a date to be confirmed.

GPS sports and activities are suspended for Terms 2 and 3. This decision will be reviewed on Friday 1 May.

The School is preparing for several scenarios next term. Our first preference is to celebrate the students' return to campus on Tuesday 21 April. If that cannot happen, boys and their teachers will transition to a more wide-ranging online teaching and learning environment. It will be challenging, but we will support students and inform parents.

The Studies Directorate has liaised with the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA) to confirm the revised assessment requirements for Years 11 and 12. They have also formed a revised Term 2 timetable, should the delivery of online curriculum continue beyond the holiday period. A revised assessment calendar for all year levels is being developed, and we will advise students and parents in due course. Early in Term 2, we will conduct a parent survey to ascertain views about your son(s) online learning experience.

I assure you the School is doing everything it can to minimise the impact on the boys' studies and to keep them socially connected to the School by offering continuity of curriculum, access to teachers and modified assessment, among other measures. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact your son's Head of Year. If your son needs assistance, he can contact his Form Tutor, Head of Year, Assistant Head of Year or one of the School Counsellors in Student Services. Boys are encouraged to make use of our confidential counselling and wellbeing services. The School is here to support our students.

We are all overwhelmed with information about COVID-19, and it is important to get accurate information. Social media has been full of memes, and in some cases, risky home remedies and misinformation. The Australian Government has launched an official 'Coronavirus Australia' app you can download for accurate advice. More information is available here.

Throughout the term break, I will continue to take advice from government authorities and will update the community of any developments. Please continue to visit the COVID-19 Advice for BGS Community page on the BGS website for the latest updates from the School.

I hope you stay well and safe.

Resilience is a skill that all children need. It refers to their ability to cope and adapt in situations when confronted with challenges such as adversity, trauma, tragedy and stress. Resilience is essential to their mental health and wellbeing during their journey to adulthood and can be learned from an early age through the support of a positive adult role model.

Being resilient does not mean your child will not experience difficulties, but it will better equip him to manage difficult situations. Over-protective parenting can be viewed as being unhelpful towards building resilience. While it may be a natural instinct to over-protect our children, experiencing potential failure is part of their learning process. Encouraging children to take healthy risks will help them trust their capacity to deal with uncomfortable situations and increase their courage.


