

Dear Parents and Friends,

I was delighted to take part in the Oxford and Cambridge 24 hour relay which ran over Saturday and Sunday last weekend. There were some heroic efforts from pupils, staff and Royal Russell families who covered more than 195 miles between them, raising over £600 for CALM in the process. My special congratulations to; Gordon Poon, Lucas Tan, Jasper Chong, Juno Chen who helped to ensure the success of this event and to Jamie McDowell, who ran 7 miles on Saturday afternoon.

I enjoyed watching a few minutes of the U15 Football on Tuesday afternoon, where the Royal Russell team finally won against Aldenham School, after both extra time and penalties. The U15s now progress to the semi-final of the ISFA Cup and will play Manchester Grammar School. There were also some very strong performances in our Senior Netball matches against Woldingham on Wednesday.

Thursday was undoubtedly one of the highlights of the term so far. On our first 'Challenge Day' we deconstructed the timetable for all pupils and introduced a whole range of activities and presentations with the overall theme of 'well-being'. Our Heads of Year had organised a suitably challenging programme which enabled all pupils to learn something new about themselves and their relationships with others. Year 7 and 8 were combined into groups and attended workshops on street dance and healthy living. Year 9 enjoyed their session trying to find out more about their future CGSE options and careers. Year 10 listened very carefully to presentations on life skills including finance, personal presentation and well-being before discovering more about writing their CV.

The focus for Year 11 was on practical well-being and preparation for their GCSE examinations this summer. They attended a study skills workshop along with yoga, healthy eating, art, music, mental health and positive thinking sessions.

Year 12 explored healthy relationships and Year 13 focused on preparations for their final examinations, including some study skills and 1:1 interviews reviewing their university and career aspirations. Their day concluded with a presentation on Finance from the Director of Operations, Mr Cufley.

I was lucky to be able to observe many of these sessions and was hugely impressed by the positive attitude and engagement of our pupils, by the excellent organisation and presentation of our own staff and by the willingness of our parent and Old Russellian volunteers. The sense of working together in a learning community was very strong and I congratulate both pupils and staff organisers for their input into the success of the day.

At our Assembly this afternoon, Mr Botting gave a presentation on the historical context of Brexit following the agreement signed earlier this week. We then awarded Effort Certificates to Eryk Trus, Jameson Wang and Maia Miller-Forkin in Year 10 and to Philip Stoychef and Emily Rickards in Year 13. Omar Nesbeth George then played a brilliant piano version of 'Pirates of the Caribbean'. In our Junior Assembly, Elspeth Gardiner beautifully performed 'Somewhere only we know' and Effort Certificates were awarded to Aleksei Vorontsov and Erynn Edney in Year 7 and Vrutik Patel and Emily Hayden de Carbonnières in Year 8.

We are sending a strong delegation to The Hague International Model United Nations (THIMUN) conference this weekend. The THIMUN conference is a five-day simulation of the United Nations for school students, which takes place in the World Forum Convention Centre in The Hague and attracts over 3,500 students from around the world. I look forward to hearing from our delegates on their return next week.

Our Lunar New Year celebrations have been in full swing today with a presentation and traditional food in the Library at lunchtime. This evening we will be enjoying a concert in the Auditorium showcasing the talents of our Boarding community before moving for a full New Year banquet provided by our Catering team.

# GCSE Geography Trip to Dorset

Lightning can't strike twice? Surely not? This was attempt two to complete the fieldwork for GCSE Geography along the Dorset coast. Last time we succumbed to horrendous winds, heavy rain and a broken down minibus! Two out of three of these you'd expect from a Geography trip!

However this time round we were luckier. We arrived at the Dorset coast at Milford on Sea and this time it wasn't raining and the bus was fine. The pupils were trying to establish whether coastal processes have been acting on the Dorset coast as theory suggests. We measured beach profiles and sediment sizes at two different points along the coast to test this; at Hurst Castle Spit and Barton on Sea.

We had the opportunity to also understand how people have controlled the environment to deal with changing conditions looking at coastal management.

After a long day working. We arrived in Swanage after fun and games driving to the field centre, where after dinner we undertook the customary two hours evening follow up. Many of the pupils were tired but managed to get through the session.

After a relaxing evening some awoke sprightly the following morning and some (Mr Parham) even went for a run!

We spent the second day writing up part of our study and visiting famous coastal landforms such as Old Harry Rocks and Studland beach. The walk onto the headland was not for the faint-hearted, with some steep drops. But it was great to see how all landforms had developed.

The trip was great considering our first attempt and the pupils endured their first (of many) experiences in the field.



# A Level Trip to Madrid

Last Friday, we travelled to Madrid in a group of four for the A level Spanish trip with Señora Missan and Señor Bueno in order to improve our speaking skills and learn about Spanish culture. We spent three nights with a host family where we ate dinner whilst practising our Spanish and we also participated in language classes.

On Saturday, we enjoyed doing an escape room as we worked together whilst testing our Spanish skills. Our favourite part of the trip was the amazing food in Madrid; we went out every day to try typical Spanish food including churros and tapas.

The churros were absolutely unforgettable! We also enjoyed exploring the local town and going to a variety of small cafes to eat cakes and pastries at the panaderías.

During the four days, we visited several monuments in Madrid including El Palacio Real (the Royal Palace) and El Reina Sofia museum where we saw the famous Guernica painting which we will be studying in Year 13.

We were also given free time to navigate the different shops on the high street and do some shopping for souvenirs. Overall, we managed to improve our speaking skills and cultural knowledge and we hope to return to Spain next year.

### Football

Aldenham had limited chances in the first half and only managed to have a wide free kick sale into the arms of Toby Mckimm in the Royal Russell goal. Score 0-0 Halftime.

The second half was very similar to the first, with Royal Russell trying to find a breakthrough, but with the Aldenham defence standing strong. We managed to break the deadlock with nine minutes to go, when a corner managed to drop kindly for Amir Muhammad Faruk on the edge of box, only to hit the keeper and fall kindly to George Newman who manage to tap in from a close range. Aldenham hit back instantly and managed to score with a free kick that was whipped in deep. 1-1.

Extra time was required. Despite the late setback Royal Russell took the game to Aldenham and once again, created the better chances of the additional 15 minutes. With one minute to go the opposition managed to counter-attack and the Aldenham went through one-on-one with Toby only to find his shot saved and tick round the corner for one last attack. The resulting corner led to Aldenham being awarded a penalty as the forward went down in the box.

The forward managed to put his penalty kick firmly in the bottom corner for a 2-1 lead with 30 seconds to go. Royal Russell showed a never say die attitude once again which proved to be the backbone of this team season and with literally the last kick of the game and with everyone forward the ball kindly brought to Tyrique George who smashed home a volley into the top right hand corner to make it to 2-2 and send again to penalties.
