Linguistics Olympiad

The annual Linguistics Olympiad at Royal Russell turned 7 on Monday! And what a party we had to celebrate the occasion!

Distinguished guests in Years 6 to 13 came in early morning in parties up to four, representing well established Houses. Over 130 gathered in the Great Hall, all enthusiastic for the fun activities in store. And fun it was!

Not just with familiar or obscure languages, sounds and accents, symbols and writing systems, but discovering peoples, their countries and culture, interconnections and events that made history.

The entertainment was complete, and so was the eagerness to crack the codes.







Hello *Mango*! Wait a minute, what does a fruit do in a linguistics competition? Who would have thought the word denotes the language and people of the central Democratic Republic of the Congo!

400,000 speakers spread over a large area around the Congo river. Fun fact acknowledged, now to solve the puzzle. **Dutch** sounds familiar, being closely related to English, but **Norwedish**? These Scandinavian languages are quite similar! Further down in Northern Italy, we pick up a bit of **Ligurian** - got the stress on the right syllable?

We've all heard some Chinglish at some point, but what could *Chintang* mean? Spoken by about 5,000 people in Nepal, it is a Sino-Tibetan language, so it is related to Chinese and Tibetan. Next challenge is the *Idalion* tablet dating from the 5th century BC, written in the Cypriot dialect of Ancient Greek. Discovered by a farmer in 1850, this document was of crucial importance in deciphering the Cypriot script. Curious about the oldest known writing system in the world?

Cuneiform was invented in Babylon (modern Iraq) about 5,500 years ago and unlike Egyptian hieroglyphs, was used for writing several different languages - Babylonian, Assyrian and Sumerian.

Such was the menu of peculiar problematic party puzzles for this Linguistics Olympiad. Come join the party next time!


We think that it was quite tricky at times but we managed to get through it in the end. It was an enjoyable experience.




CCF Training Camp

Saturday morning saw us up at 06:00 hours and after a full English breakfast we had a short march to the Dismounted Close Combat Trainer which is a computerised indoor shooting range. This was our chance to gain some useful practise using laser rifles, whilst gaining valuable feedback on areas where we could all improve.

The accuracy is first class and our instructors could see any mistake we made - right down to pulling the trigger too quickly. Afterwards our five groups split off to do the



Once we were fed again, everyone was ready to take on a live shooting exercise and more background assignments. Through mixed weather conditions, each group tackled a command task to build our team working capabilities (for us that was transporting a golf ball across a field using old drainpipes and some ingenuity), a navigational challenge and Camp Marching drills ("always useful", according to Major Lacey).

Then finally we were on the field range using rifles and live rounds; shooting at full body targets from 25 metres. As expected, this got quite competitive between all the cadets to see who could get the smallest shot grouping and achieve the best score of the day.

Saturday evening's entertainment included a rather lively RR CCF Quiz Night between our five groups and the Officers and let's just say that the Officers did not win this time!

To get their own back, the Officers woke us up "SAS Who Dares Wins" style at 05:30 hours on Sunday, so we could clean and tidy up our rooms before heading off for the final field day of solid shooting practice at different distances. Well done to everyone who took part.


Global Politics Conference
