



History Trip to Germany

On Thursday the History Department, accompanied by 47 eager pupils boarded a flight to Munich. This marked the beginning of a six-day trip across Germany from Munich to Berlin, via Nuremberg, from the Reichstag Dome to the Marienplatz and beyond.

The trip truly began on the second day, starting with a guided tour down the streets of Munich, in the route of the Munich Putsch of 1923 and ending in a thought-provoking and sombre journey through the former concentration camp of Dachau.

On the third day, we visited the city of Nuremberg and sites such as the Zeppelin field and NSDAP kongresshalle (inspired by the Colosseum of Rome). Towards the end of day, we briefly stopped at courtroom 600 in which leaders and those considered responsible for the atrocities of the Nazi regime were tried.

Days four and five were mostly comprised of an extended walking tour of Berlin stopping at points of interest like the rebuilt Reichstag building, the memorial to the murdered Jews of Europe, the Treptow Soviet war memorial and, of course, the Brandenburg gate.

The sixth day sadly brought an end to our trip but not before an intriguing, albeit macabre, tour around a former Stasi Prison in East Berlin and a quick viewing of the intricate murals of the East-Side Gallery.

The trip was a brilliant experience in both its utility for pupils and its constantly intriguing and entertaining itinerary.

Ms Worsfold would like to add that the Y10 and Y11 students who went on the trip were a real credit to the School. There were many compliments from guides, air stewards etc about their behaviour, manners and enthusiasm. It was a pleasure taking them on the trip.

On Friday, before we broke up for half term, our Careers Breakfast focused on the Healthcare sector.

We welcomed professionals and student ambassadors from across a wide range of roles: an Optometrist; Physiotherapist, Psychological Wellbeing Practitioner; Nurse; Sports Scientist, an MA pupils' Music Therapist from The Guildhall School of Music and Drama, a second year student Biomedical Engineer from King's College London, a final year medical student from St George's and an experienced GP. We were also lucky enough to cover Managerial and Leadership roles within the NHS.

Over the course of an hour, (and a croissant or two!) pupils met with each professional/student and chatted about their profession, what pathways exist in the sector and what the challenges and rewards of working in those roles are.

This was the fifth Careers Breakfast this year and next year we hope to grow these and add other opportunities for pupils to learn more about the world of work and develop their personal and employability skills.

Pupil feedback for the Breakfasts has been overwhelmingly positive and I have been particularly impressed by how enthusiastic our younger pupils in Years 9 & 10 have been in taking advantage of these opportunities.

Breakfasts are voluntary for pupils to sign up to and have been very well attended and it has been a pleasure to hear feedback from our visiting professionals who have consistently complimented pupils' engagement and intelligent questions. The most common feedback from pupils has been that they wish they had more time to speak or could meet more professionals, in more roles.

Signals Course

This year, two cadet Sergeants travelled to Blandford Military Camp in Dorset to represent Royal Russell CCF in a further Signals Course.

Before this, the entire contingent had learnt basic1 star and 2 star level signals content last summer, experimenting with small personal radios on camp. I throughly enjoyed the first stage as it was the first time the army section had used radios on a large scale, and so we volunteered to join others from different schools across the country and further our knowledge.

Making our own way there, we quickly got to know cadets from Norfolk, Liverpool, Scotland and even those who travelled 11 hours from Northern Ireland. That day, we had dinner, found our accommodation and had a relatively chilled evening to make new friends with the people we would be spending the next week with.

Throughout the week we spent a couple days in the classroom block learning 3 star and 4 star level theory, as well as playing with pieces of both "Don 10" and "Lightweight Quad" field cables that would have been used for undercover communications. We learnt to successfully fix, join, and crimp lengths of these cable as a military party would in the field. We also perfected our knots for tieing back the cables in the field.

Whenever we got the chance, despite battling with gale force winds and a few hailstones, we spent the day in a field called the Craddock, experimenting with "Don 10" cable and constructing various line crossings. Each crossing had to be checked for faults and eventually tested through a circuit of telephones; if you could communicate to your group mates across the field, you were successful!

For the next stage of communications over a distance, we also constructed 5.4m and 12m masts to mount our antennas. In a more realistic scenario, these same types of radio masts would be capable of receiving signals and talking to signallers all over the world, as far as New Zealand.

By the final day we were brimming with new information to bring back to our contingent, having successfully passed 3 star, 4 star and gained our cross flags badge. I look forward to teaching the younger cadets all we learnt and we may even join the advanced course in early summer - having the potential to be the top 1% skilled signallers in cadets.









Year 7 Chemistry Models

As part of their introduction to Chemistry and the exciting world of atoms, elements and compounds, Year 7 pupils were required to make a 3D model of a compound of their choice.

A huge congratulations to pupils for making a range of ambitious, creative and exciting models which have been on display in the Science Department this week. The time and effort put in by all pupils was excellent.

Biology Trip to Wakehurst Place

Year 13 A level Biologists visited Wakehurst Place as part of their practical endorsement.


They carried out genetic profiling techniques used for crime scene analysis and at customs to identify illegal trade of plants species under the CITES agreement. They also were able to carry out micropropagation, cloning cauliflower plants from small explants.

These are now growing in the science lab and will produce a cauliflower plant in 4 to 6 weeks. Following this the pupils visited the Millennium Seed Bank, which is the largest collection of seeds in the world and has been developed as a safety net for plant species at risk of extinction.

This gave the pupils hands on experience and an understanding of the use of the techniques in real life situations.


