General - Introduction

We have the pleasure of presenting the 2019 edition of the Annual report of the Dutch International Primary and Secondary schools.

Again in 2019, international education has been moving to the centre of attention with an increasing number of Dutch international and national Schools. As you can see from the numbers of internationally mobile students attending our schools, DIS continues to grow. The general consensus amongst schools is that this is due to the international orientation of the (Dutch) labour market, the continued attractiveness of the Netherlands for international business and institutions and the solid reputation of the DIS.

As in previous years, the internationally mobile student population is becoming more diverse. Whilst the internationally mobile(expat) group continues to grow, there also is a growing group of (often non-Dutch) students who settle in the Netherlands (semi-) permanently, and who want to integrate in the Netherlands, learn Dutch without academic delay following an internationalised programme leading to a Dutch diploma. These students often have parents, who are on a permanent local contract, without tuition support from their companies. They know upon arrival that they will remain in the Netherlands for the duration of their children's school time.

Along with the growing (DIS) expat group of (largely short-stay) internationally mobile students and the students of Dutch national schools, we expect that this third group, a 'hybrid' of the two previously mentioned groups, will continue to grow too. The past years, school boards of DIS schools have developed hybrid schools, using the experience gained from their international schools to support subjects like Dutch language acquisition and global citizenship.

All DIS have an extra accreditation and/or authorisation quality control system in operation, making sure that Dutch international education will remain geared towards (global) citizenship and teaching for understanding difference and diversity. We feel reassured that the DIPS and DISS have never been more aligned in this common cause.

The diversification of internationally mobile students has challenged us to reflect on our role and position. What DIS does best is providing an international education, in English, for 4-18 yearold students of all nationalities in the Netherlands.

We understand and can support the cultural challenges of a mobile community, the need for mother-tongue support and ultimately the importance of international accredited programmes that ensure a smooth transfer for our students as they move on to their next adventure.

2019 was a year in which the DIS continued our struggle to safeguard sufficient space and resources to accommodate the growth of Dutch international and internationalised education. To this end, and to generally cooperate better at a regional level, we saw the executive directors of schoolboards formalise themselves in an Executive Directors Platform (EDP) in 2019. We are looking forward to work together with them, also in 2020!

General - Characteristics

About Dutch International Schools

- The Dutch International Schools receive government funding and therefore operate within the framework of the Dutch educational system. They differ in this way from private international and foreign educational facilities.
- The Dutch International Schools possess a number of distinguishing qualities in comparison with these other institutions, such as an active international character and that they are subject to the inspection carried out by the Dutch authorities.
- The Dutch International Schools use English as the medium for teaching their international curricula.
- Even though the government subsidy does not cover the costs, the Dutch International Schools are able to charge relatively low school fees in comparison with private international and foreign educational facilities.
- The Dutch International schools are affiliated to regular Dutch schools.

Dutch International Schools are, as such, acknowledged and funded by the Ministry of Education. As consequence, according to national regulations, a student can only be admitted to an international school if he/she complies with one of the following three conditions:

- The student has a non-Dutch nationality (or: also a non-Dutch nationality) and has a parent who is working in The Netherlands (or in a Dutch border region) for a temporary period;
- 2. The student has the Dutch nationality and has lived and gone to school abroad for at least two years because a parent was stationed abroad;
- 3. The student has the Dutch nationality and has a parent (with whom the student will be living) who will be stationed abroad within two years and for at least two years. This must be certified by a written statement from the parent's employer.

To the DP programme (last two years) of Dutch International Secondary Schools, students may be admitted who:

- have a HAVO-diploma or a certificate of advancement to year 5 in a VWO-school, and
- can demonstrate that they are sufficiently fluent in English, to the satisfaction of the international school.

General – Mission, vision and ambition

Mission and vision

The Dutch International Schools are united under the joint mission:

To provide international education for students (from 4 to 18 years of age) of all nationalities in The Netherlands.

To this end, the associated schools adhere to the following basic principles:

- the Dutch International Schools are guided by an international frame of reference (in accordance with the Dutch law, as far as required) when making choices concerning the organization of education;
- the Dutch International Schools consider themselves a vital part of the local international community.



Ambition

The Dutch International Schools have the following joint ambitions:

- to excel in the provision of international education, focused on student learning, in a national as well as an international context:
- to be acknowledged as centres of international education by national and regional/local authorities, stakeholders, other schools and organizations;
- to provide internationally-focused curricula in an international environment, embedded in a Dutch context;
- to provide quality assurance according to Dutch and international standards;
- to appoint internationally-minded staff;
- to maintain facilities at a high level;
- to ensure adequate government funding and to strive for affordable school fees (not to be considered as voluntary contributions);
- to represent the joint interests of the Dutch International Schools and be acknowledged as such by the Dutch government;
- to provide coherent international educational provisions for students aged 4 to 18 in all regions;
- to stimulate the cooperation between international primary and secondary schools at a regional/local level, respecting the autonomy of each individual school.





Primary Schools – Board and curriculum

Association

The 'Stichting Dutch International Primary Schools' was founded in 1996. This foundation recently became an association and acts as a platform for the benefit of the primary schools to which an international department is linked. The association of Dutch International Primary Schools (DIPS) is also known under the Dutch name 'Vereniging IGBO': International Georiënteerd Basisonderwijs (International Oriented Primary Education).

The executive committee which is responsible for preparing these meetings is:

- Chair: Mr Boris Prickarts
- Secretary and vice chair: Mrs Barbera Everaars
- Treasurer: Mr Ton Wiegman

Just as in previous years, 2019 was for most of the schools dominated by growth. The number of students in total is still rising. The DIPS organization is also growing and in recent years has had to ask itself how to cope with this growth. The board of the association changed composition and the statutes have been adjusted in 2018. In 2019 the regulations for the association has been made.

- In 2019 the International School Rise (Salto) in Eindhoven and Amstelland in Amstelveen received the funding for IGBO education. These new international departments opened their doors at the start of the new school year 2019.
- In 2019 no applications were made for funding for IGO education. The board of DIPS didn't need to give an advice to the Ministry of Education, Culture and Science on behalf of the members of the association DIPS on the basis of the legal standards that exist in the "Wet op Primair Onderwijs". We therefore expect no new members to join DIPS in 2020.

Mrs. Roosmarijn de Boer and Mrs. Alinda de Beus MA (Organisation for Dutch Education Abroad, NOB) supported and advised the members and the executive committee.

Primary Schools – Highlights 2019

General

The DIPS association met four times. The first meeting was the two-day meeting in Zeist. During this annual two-day session, members invited an expert to feed themselves, in addition to sharing experiences, with knowledge that is specifically suited to school leaders from an international department.

The second meeting took place in March in Utrecht, following the joint meeting with the DISS. The third meeting took place in June in Eindhoven and the fourth meeting in September took place in Amsterdam. The June and September meetings take place at one of the members' schools the ISE and the AICS.

The DIS website got an extra role. On the website there is now a library. In this library the members of the DIPS and DISS can find the relevant documents from the association.

The working groups are re-grouped. This will be the base for the teachers conference November 2020.

Last year the Stichting became an association with this in mind the association has made new regulations.

The plan for 2020 is to position on DIPS and DISS in the landscape of international education.

Top of our minds

The topics that are most prominently discussed at the meetings are

- how do we deal with the growth of international education? The most profound development in the last three to four years is the exorbitant growth. Topics such as housing, recruitment of teachers and cooperation with local authorities were discussed.
- Due to growth, schools needed new school buildings. In many meetings the topic
 was how to deal with the local government about a new schoolbuilding and
 what is possible and necessary for an international schoolbuilding.

The challenge to hire good staff is a recurring theme at the meetings. Legislation was on the agenda several times, as well as the correct documentation and approval from the "DUO". How do we deal with the troubling teacher shortage that also affects the international setting as well as the staff of the international department? With this in mind we have set up a meeting with DUO in Groningen.

Dienst Uitvoering Onderwijs (DUO):

In March delegates of the DISS and DIPS board went to a meeting in Groningen, DUO. The topics of this meeting were: de taaleis en de diploma waardering. The presentation of DUO is spread under the members of the DIPS.

Ministry of Education, Culture and Science

The board of the association meets twice a year with the Ministry of Education, Culture and Science and if necessary, additional consultations take place.

Two consultations took place in 2019. The last of the two was a combined meeting with the board of DISS. In the future we will follow this line.

It has been agreed to give more attention to this agenda item in 2020, and in cooperation with DISS in 2020 the legal criteria will be clarified. A clear description of the advisory role of DIPS is also being sought.





Secondary Schools – Association and curriculum

Association

The government subsidised Dutch International Secondary Schools are formally associated within the association Dutch International Secondary Schools (DISS). Each school has its representative in the general meeting of DISS, which meets four times a year.

The general meeting appoints the board of DISS. In 2019 the board of DISS comprised:

- Chair: Mrs Rynette de Villiers (Utrecht)
- Vice chair: Mr Mike Weston (Groningen)(reappointed)
- Secretary: Mrs Rubin Borges (Almere)
- Treasurer: Mr Glyn Jones (Hilversum)

The board is advised and supported by Mr Jos van Elderen, external consultant employed by B&T Advies (Amsterdam).

In 2019 the administrative support was provided by Mrs Ingrid Wendel (SmilingFirst Agency).

In September 2019 two new member schools joined DISS:

- International (Secondary) School Delft
- International (Secondary) School Wassenaar

As from August 2017 the International School of The Hague offers the IB Careers Programme alongside the 'regular' IB Diploma Programme. The IB CP leads to a Havo level-certificate and is an alternative to the IB DP Programme.





Secondary Schools – Highlights

General

DISS focusses on cooperation and added value for the member schools in three areas:

- Knowledge sharing & professional development among the member schools
- External communication and branding concerning DISS and its member schools
- Lobbying on behalf of DISS and its member schools

Knowledge sharing & professional development

At each meeting in 2019 one of the schools was invited to present an innovative project. Doing so, the members were introduced in the Pathfinder project (International School of the Hague), technical innovations that were introduced by International School Eindhoven and the way International School Almere deals with media literacy.

Other management issues were on the agenda of the members meetings of DISS such as a newly developed (by the Ministry of Economic Affairs) Regional Prognosis Model, how to deal with new European privacy legislation and introduction of the new IB Maths syllabus. In 2019 separate meetings of the MYP and DP coordinators of all member schools were facilitated, as well as CAS coordinators and subject teachers. The plan for 2020 is to put all these kind of meetings in an overall agenda, facilitating and encouraging collaboration between educators from DISS schools across more areas. Preparations have started for the next DISS Teachers Conference which will take place on 12 February 2021.

External communication

For Dutch International Secondary Schools, in the area of external communications, acting as a group is one of the fundamentals. In 2019 DISS adopted Internal Regulations which clearly discribe the membership criteria of DISS, obligations and rights of member schools and a code of conduct on how to deal with students and members of staff transferring among Dutch International Secondary Schools. Also, the internal Agreement on School fees was updated.

Lobbying

In 2019 acceptance of IB students was again an issue at some Dutch universities. All individual cases were solved. DISS facilitated the universities by making up a comparison between the Maths syllabus of IB and Dutch VWO.

DISS welcomed a new civil servant at The Ministry of Education who has been assigned to work most closely with DISS, Mrs. Renate Dietvorst.

DP Exam results

Each year from a point of view of quality care the Dutch International Secondary Schools share the results on the IB Diploma Programme, among themselves and with the Dutch Inspectorate. The average passing rate among the Dutch schools is far above the world average.

Secondary Schools – Highlights (II)

MYP5/IGCSE school leavers

During the past years, there have been concerns among DISS and other international schools in the Netherlands regarding students completing MYP5 (or IGCSE) but not being admitted to DP. It was suggested that many of these students would try to gain entrance to Dutch MBO colleges. In the last five years Dutch International Secondary Schools carried out fact finding on where students end up after completing MYP5/IGCSE.

Executive Directors Platform

Dutch International Schools are part of the Dutch educational system. They are formally attached to regular Dutch schools and as such are part of Dutch schoolboards. These schoolboards sometimes cover one school, but can also comprise of several schools (up to 70). Dutch schoolboards are mainly managed by one or more executive directors. These executive directors are in close contact with the principals and heads of the schools within the schoolboard. Within a schoolboard the attention a Dutch International School gets from its executive director(s) may vary according to the total number of schools and/or the issues at international schools that ask for the attention of the executive directors.

Until some years ago Dutch International Schools were in contact with each other only through their principals and heads. In the circuits of DIPS and DISS schools are represented by principals and heads (formally under de ultimate responsibility of their executive directors). But with the upcoming growth of international schools and the attention this gets from local and national authorities, executive directors become more and more involved in the development of Dutch International Schools and in matters of housing and finance arising from this kind of education within the schoolboard.

As a consequence executive directors of schoolboards with Dutch International Schools started to meet in 2017, first only among a few secondary schools and not yet on a regular basis. In 2018 this Executive Directors Platform was expanded to representatives of all boards with Dutch International Schools, Primary as well as Secondary (27 at the end of 2019). In 2019 the Platform met two times.

The Executive Directors Platform is in a process of becoming a legal entity. In the summer of 2019 the first chair, Mr Maarten Knoester (Stichting Het Rijnlands Lyceum, Wassenaar) stepped down because of his retirement. He was succeeded as chair by Mr Bart van den Haak (AT-scholen, Hilversum). Mr Van den Haak was joined by two other board members, Mrs Ruth Kervezee (Esprit Scholen, Amsterdam) and Mr Meine Stoker (SPVOZN, Eindhoven).

The Executive Board Platform is in close contact with the boards of DIPS and DISS to coordinate agenda items and the chairs from DIPS and DISS attend the meetings of the Platform.

The Executive Directors Platform aims at knowledge sharing and lobbying on matters concerning Dutch International Schools that are of specific board interest. In 2019 the executive directors discussed f.i.:

- Government licences to new Dutch International Schools
- Tax matters (company tax and tax effects on exemption of school fees for staff)
- Involvement of the Dutch Inspectorate with Dutch International Schools
- Development of 'hybrid' international schools (formally regular Dutch schools with some kind of international image)
- Teaching qualifications for subjects that are not in the Dutch curriculum

It is non-selective; students have a right to attend the school if their parents work for a European Agency. Emphasis is placed on language-learning; all students study in their mother-tongue (L1) a second language (L2) and a third language (L3) until S6. From S3, humanities subjects are studied in the student's L2 with the aim that by the end of the 12th year of studying in a second language (L2), students are bi-lingual.
