Fortunately this radical change was necessitated by circumstance, for few if any would have been bold enough otherwise to bring about so much change for so many in such a short space of The by-product, however, has been a time. wonderful unity of purpose within our community, and a very real sense of the need for us all as teachers to live out personally all those key skills that we seek to nurture in the boys; resilience, perseverance, innovation, commitment and teamwork. In every crisis there are hidden opportunities that only the bold will look for and grasp. Aldro has been bold in recent weeks, and the challenging despite circumstances, has embraced the imperatives and emerged the stronger for them. Suivez raison, indeed! Aldro Science Week 2020

This year's Science Week was like no other before and Aldro was a hive of scientific activity throughout the week. After the theme of 'Our Diverse Planet' was introduced by some wonderful outfits to join those of characters on world book day, the boys in all years enjoyed workshops and talks from a number of our parents whose work relies on using science.

On Monday our Form 7 and 8K boys were invited to a brilliant talk by Mr Templeton-Ward on his work as an orthopedic surgeon. He carried out a fascinating exothermic reaction to produce bone cement and had a really good insight into how science fits into all areas of an operating theatre and his work on reconstructing knees.





On Tuesday our Forms 7 and 8 were treated to a fascinating talk by Lt Col Davies on his work using science as an anesthetist both in the NHS and the army. He really intrigued the boys with how to use the science differently between the two areas of medical need and made it crucial to understand that the boys themselves have the ability to do these sorts of jobs in the future.



The Form 6 boys were treated to a super talk and workshop on how Mrs Jones and Mrs Carlier work on nutrition and digestion in the medical world. It was intriguing and inspiring to see how their work and food plays such an important role in peoples' lives.





Aldro Science Week 2020

On Wednesday Mr Latham wowed us with his work as a precious metals and materials mining engineer. The boys were taken on a journey through the earth to recognise the importance of the materials around us on the future of our planet. It was amazing to see how so much can be done underground without us noticing.



On Thursday morning the Forms 3,4,5 boys were off timetable on a carousel of whacky activities. Mrs Corfield led their rocket launching and there were some corkers apparently. Mrs Eves and her team of 8K boys created a WOW Chemistry experience where fire was made and wizards realms and Miss D took the boys on a journey of how to protect our Turtles.



Aldro Science Week 2020

On Thursday Afternoon Author and Astronomer Colin Stuart came to talk to the boys about the potential of going to Mars and living there. It was a great atmosphere in the CHC with the infrared lighting and he really made the boys realise that they are the people in this world who may be some of the first Mars explorers.





The week was finished off with super workshops from Mrs Davies (who is a dentist) for the Form 3,4,5 boys. She had the boys making fillings and looking at the anatomy of the mouth and it really was a great hands on way to end the week.

Form 3 boys were delighted to complete their plywood photo frames this term. They have not only learnt about working safely in the workshop but have been introduced to a whole range of hand tools and machinery, including pillar drills, scroll saws, electric drills and bandfacers which they have loved using.

Forms 4 and 5 have recently had the company of Mr Livermore, a playground designer, visiting our Saturday morning lessons. He has been helping the Form 4 boys with their 3D drawings as shown here, as well as assisting the Form 5 boys with their Megastructures project. This project first ran in 2017 when we made a large dome from A4 paper which could fit about 2-3 boys inside. In 2019 we used A3 paper and made larger domes to fit 4-5 boys in. This year we supersized it and used A2 paper. We were all really excited when we managed to fit the whole class inside!

Form 6 have started their Autumn project a little ahead of schedule to make use of the fallen silver birch to gather material we will be using for our Aldro Enterprise project in the next academic year. Although it was very sad to have lost this beautiful tree, we are pleased that we will be putting it to good use. We have asked the boys to now think of ideas for what seasonal items we could make from the material whilst they are learning from home.



Form 8 have been working hard to combine Electronics, Resistant Materials and CAD/CAM Graphic Products to create a colour changing LED bulb circuit, a finger jointed plywood frame and a CNC cut card shade. As you can see by this night time shot the outcomes are simply stunning!

A total of 21 boys represented the school's U13 A rugby team this year, showing just how much strength in depth is required to compete on our circuit.

This year was more of a challenge off the pitch than it was on the pitch. The boys were a very capable set of sportsmen, with an unenviable mix of power, pace, size, guile, agility and skill. The only thing lacking was self -belief. We tried to instil this, confident but not arrogant attitude. We know that everyone wants to beat Aldo and as such, we have to be at 100%, every game. This was evident most in the Highfield game, a cup final for them. Liverpool v Shrewsbury Town on paper, but in reality, a day where nothing clicked for us and everything fell their way. We had some astonishingly good performances along the way. The first half against Caldicott was arguably the best I have seen an Aldro side play.
