Dear Parents, Faculty, and Staff,

Happy Easter! While our Easter celebrations looked very different this year, I hope you all had the opportunity to rest, relax, and enjoy some time off during Easter break. Today we start back to school for the last 6 weeks of this school year.

For now, the word school no longer refers to a building because school is happening remotely in each of our homes. There is a lot of media coverage about how and when restrictions will begin being lifted. We continue to monitor and follow government and health department guidelines.
