Creek Bed Exploration

ach year, the Kindergarten students spend a great deal of time enjoying the wonder of God's creation through a variety of unit studies including the Rock Cycle. Students learn and discuss the common properties that distinguish igneous, metamorphic, and sedimentary rocks. They are able to observe and handle large samples of these rocks in one of our campus gardens. Later, the students have the opportunity to hike through the expansive Grace Academy campus and explore the creek bed for stone treasures. There, they search for rock specimens, fossils, and shells to bring back to the classroom, examine, and classify. On some occasions, a high school science

teacher visits class to help identify a prized rock and talk about how it might have been created. It is our desire that through learning about these rocks students will develop a wonder of science and, even more, awe at the Creator who made them all.

he ancient Greeks and Romans valued highly the art of speaking well. Citizens who wished to promote their ideas not only had to have a deep understanding of the subject matter but also needed to present their thoughts with eloquence and rhetorical skill. The same is true today. Ideas that are communicated well have a greater chance of being heard, understood, and adopted by others.

In Grace Academy's School of Rhetoric, students learn to analyze and eloquently present their ideas, both orally and in writing. One of the ways this is accomplished is through the junior and senior thesis projects. During these years, students at Grace

Academy research, write, present and defend a thesis paper. Students first choose a topic that is currently being discussed in academia, the marketplace, the church, or broader culture and that relates to some aspect of their Grace Academy education. Over the course of the year, students research their topic and develop their own position. They then defend their position by writing a thesis paper which is 10-15 pages in length for juniors and 15-20 pages in length for seniors. All students must also prepare a bibliography which evidences the research they have drawn from books and peer-reviewed articles to support their arguments. After completing the thesis, students then present and defend their papers publicly.

The junior and senior thesis projects thus equip

They are taught how to research and organize a paper, how to argue persuasively, coherently, and concisely, and how to present and defend their

ideas publicly. They learn to apply the truths of Scripture to their topics and also how to respond to objections and opposing viewpoints. These projects are not easy, but they are an important step in a Grace Academy education that will prepare students for successful writing and speaking in college and throughout their lives.

Enter the Age of Castles &

Every year fourth grade students emerge from the Dark Ages and enter into the Age of Castles and Catapults. Students begin by learning about William the Conqueror, his claim to the English throne, and his subsequent victory over King Harold to establish the Normans as the ruling group of England. With William came the feudal system and the feudal hierarchy complete with king, vassal, sub-vassal, knight, freemen, and serfs.

As these lessons leap from the pages of their books, the students relish the opportunity to engage with iconic pieces of medieval life. First, they create their own heraldry shields to identify themselves on the "field of battle" and continue to explore the world of medieval England. The students also create weaponry in the form of catapults and ballista of various sizes. These mighty contraptions are destined to hurl everything from ping-pong balls to large grapefruits across our soccer field on catapult day. Robin Hood day, following the reading of Lincoln-green tales, allows the students a taste of archery and (ginger) ale.

The medieval cultural studies culminate with the building of fantastical castles. The students first engage in a lesson on medieval



architecture with the film "Castle" presented by David Macaulay. Students then divide into teams in order to design and build their own royal fortress. The designs reflect not only the essential elements of medieval castles, but also the great creativity of our students. Math, art, and history all must come together as students engage in hands-on learning. The results each year provide a wonderful display of the love of learning that exists at Grace Academy.

It is under her loving guidance that our art program has grown in form and beauty. Ms. McLaurin is a fount of inspiration with new ideas flowing out of her room and around our campus throughout the school year. The story of her journey as an artist offers a glimpse into the source of these inspirations.

Ms. McLaurin has loved art for as long as she can remember. As a little girl her parents gave her a set of paints for her birthday. Little Robin took this treasure box into her room and began to secretly paint the walls inside her bedroom closet. At first, her mother was not happy to find paint on the walls. Her father, however, recognized a gift blossoming and encouraged her to continue. Before long the entire bedroom was transformed into a lovely garden with little flowers painted all around the walls. This passion for art would eventually lead her all around the world.

Robin did not begin immediately pursuing an art career. Her parents encouraged her to instead pursue something more practical, and she chose education. As an education major in college Robin learned of the opportunity to teach with the Department of Defense Dependent Schools (DoDDS). This position allowed her to teach at a military base in Germany, where she lived within different cultures and experienced their art and music. As Robin visited the great museums and galleries of Europe, she felt again the calling of an artist. When her own children were in high school she earned her MS in Art Education. In 2014, she graduated from the Vermont College of Fine Arts with an MFA in Visual Art. Just as her first degree served as a vehicle for Robin to explore the world's art, the journey that came in pursuing her advanced degrees has given Robin a platform from which to share her art with the world. From this platform Robin has been given the opportunity to let her voice be heard in causes that weigh heavily upon her heart, exemplified by her portfolio selection displayed in this article.

The Heart Gallery works in conjunction with Texas State Adoption Agency to encourage the adoption of foster children, and Robin helps by taking photographs of these foster children.

Most recently, Robin staged an "Oak Galls" exhibition at the Miranda Arts Space Project, a gallery in New York. Along with her art work, Robin presented a lecture on the chemistry of the oak gall in paints.
