



Elizabeth I signed Mary's death warrant, but took a long time because she was unwilling


Elizabeth nearly died of smallpox

Dear Mr Evans

Firstly, let me introduce myself. My name is Sophie Long, I am 10 years old and I am currently in Year 5 at Royal Russell School. I am writing to you in the hope that I will be able to persuade you to invite six children in need of a safe school to join us here at Royal Russell. This is something that the Refugee Council would like all schools to do. I feel very strongly about the issues facing migrants and in particular those being faced by children of all ages from countries all over the world. I think that migrant children are really just like me and my friends although they have been through some truly terrible and frightening experiences. Some of the things they have seen and gone through, no-one particularly children should never ever have to face. For example, some children have had to leave their home country due to war and the hardship that has been caused as a result. For instance, I have heard stories of children travelling in the back of lorries and vans, cramped with lots of other children with barely any air to breathe and no food to eat or water to drink. I can only imagine the fear they must have felt. Furthermore, some have had to walk for miles on end on a seemingly never-ending journey to what they think will be a better place to live. In addition, others have had to go through violence and the destruction of their homes and villages giving them no choice but to leave.

Without a doubt, allowing migrant children and their families into our country will have a huge affect on their lives. They would be safe, away from possibly a war zone away from danger and conflict. They would be able to live in a proper home with running water and heating. Their parents would be able to find paid work to feed their family. These are all things that we take for granted on a daily basis.

We should treat all refugees how we would like to be treated ourselves because they are still human beings with feelings and emotions. Just because they may not be able to speak the same language as us and may have a different skin colour and religion they should still be treated as equals.

Undoubtedly, for these reasons I believe that as the Junior School Headmaster at Royal Russell you would be doing something really amazing if you were to allow six refugee children to join our school. I truly hope that I have persuaded you to take the next step in helping the refugee's journey to happiness in life.

After I met him I ran out of London to the blue sea until I met an old, dirty, greasy old man who was so unkind and mean so I just barely escaped from him and finally found London town.



There I saw my brother lying on snow, we were so happy to see each other but I went away to audition in a circus, the stunt was very scary but at last I did the stunt.

That's all I have to say. Bye!


