Following his success in the BEBRAS Challenge earlier in the academic year, Ben (Year 11) recently competed in the TCS Oxford Computing Challenge.

The initial round was invite only and 24 Senior School students opted to take part in this challenging round held at the beginning of March. Ben scored 100% in the first round and was subsequently invited to take part in the finals, held at the end of March.

Ben placed in 5th position in the country for this final round. Only 10 students out of the initial 1421 students entered nationally were selected to compete in the final, so this is a really fantastic achievement for Ben. He completed the final at home under parental supervision, as did the other participants. Huge congratulations to him!

From our Chaplain


As a new term begins, Easter is already becoming a distant memory as we continue to try and live and work in very different circumstances. Our school community, for the main part, is hidden away from each other, and if we do meet it is in very small groups, for brief periods, behind closed doors perhaps with a sense of incredulity at the situation in which we find ourselves.

The Christian community will continue in its celebration of Easter for some time – albeit in a very different way. Last Sunday many of our Churches shared again the account of Thomas and his moment of doubt, though I wonder perhaps if that might be more appropriately called 'a moment of revelation'. The account of this moment - one of withdrawal, of a closed meeting, of strange anxious circumstances, of doubt and question, of evaluation and investigation and then revelation - is something which has always fascinated me.

If we apply the same circumstances to say, the current climate of medical research and the search for a vaccine for Covid-19, we can see these situational characteristics are the very same ones which might lead to medical breakthrough. Thomas has often been maligned and remembered negatively as being the doubter, and perhaps rightly so for Jesus commended those whose faith leads them to believe without question. But I wonder if this is entirely fair. In Eastern and Asian Christianity, Thomas is often viewed a little differently. For it is in the wonder and doubt, the withdrawal and searching, that we often see new things emerge and the moments of revelation are all the more clear and abrupt.

As a Dame Allan's parent, I see first-hand the efforts that are being made to develop and deliver a creative curriculum in new ways. There are teething troubles here and there, many staff have been exhausted at trying to get something up and running quickly, before then being able to go back and refine and develop. Their motivation might be said to be rooted in that same mentality that Thomas shared – not the doubting, but the characteristic of developing wonder, independent thought and critical thinking as they find new ways to develop young leaders of the future.

Perhaps the account of Thomas is one which might encourage us not to be afraid of the real human responses of doubt and anxiety, of wonder and of searching. In anxious times, may we not doubt, but continue to search for moments of revelation.

And finally...

Due to the ongoing social distancing measures and lockdown, our uniform suppliers Schoolblazer, Emblematic and SquadKit are not processing or delivering orders.

If you have any uniform or sports kit - for either Junior or Senior School - which your child no longer needs or has outgrown, please consider donating to our second-hand uniform supplies. We appreciate this might also affect you, our current parents and guardians, in terms of replacing old or outgrown items of uniform for the coming year. Until such time as the suppliers are up and running, if the official uniform cannot be worn, pupils can come to school in the following:

Junior School and Nursery

- Smart grey trousers, a plain red or black jumper and a white shirt (Boys)
- Smart grey skirt, a plain red or black jumper/cardigan with a white shirt or blouse (Girls)

Senior School

- Smart grey trousers, a plain black jumper and white shirt with the collar open (DABS)
- A smart grey knee-length skirt, plain black jumper and white, open-collared shirt or blouse (DAGS)

If you are unable to find any of these items, pupils should dress as smartly as possible for school until their uniform arrives (i.e. no hoodies, sports tops, jeans, trainers or boots).

For PE and games, pupils should wear any sports kit they have until such time as SquadKit can meet orders.

We will review this at the end of December 2020 with the hope that all will be in proper school uniform by January 2021.
